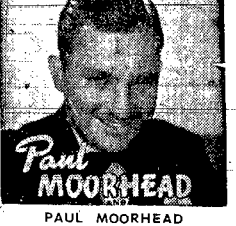

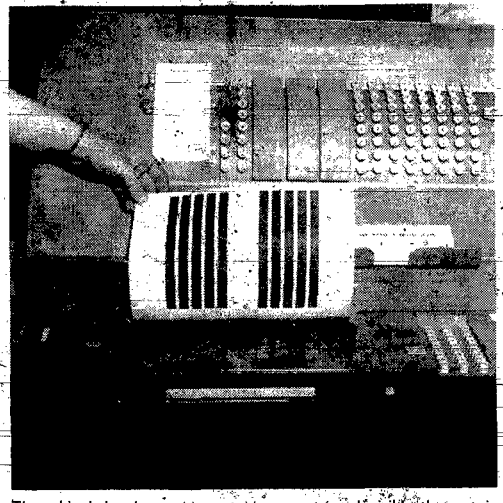

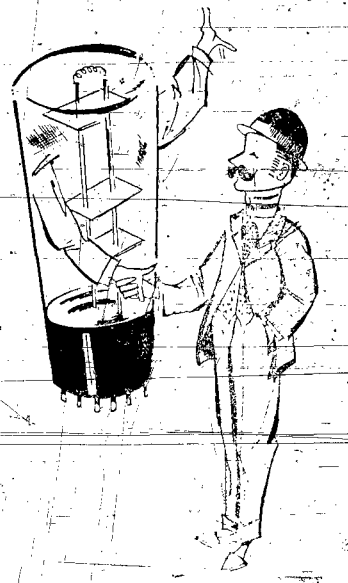

Capitol News

State, Vehicles, Capitol Room Complaints Signs of Spring

By Melvin Paul Lincoln—When things get hot around the statehouse a never-say-die problem always comes up—the matter of state ears.

Usually, complaints about the vehicles are among the signs of spring. Another harbinger of the heating of winter is the problem of space in the Capitol, which is rapidly becoming jam-packed.

The problem of what to do about mileage payments for state-owned cars, who is using them illegally, when they should be traded, and why the vehicles aren't marked are the most typical headaches.

State Purchasing Agent Tom Coffey made a study of when the state vehicles should be replaced. His conclusion: There is no hard and fast rule.

Coffey surveyed department heads and found vehicles driven 20,000 miles per year should be traded the fourth year. Vehicles that make 30,000 miles per year should be replaced in the third year of operation.

Coffey got the usual complaints about marking of the vehicles. He said this is being done as rapidly as possible and unmarked vehicles are not being used.

The name of the department to which cars are assigned must be clearly legible on a state-owned vehicle, which also, by law, must sport a two-inch-wide white stripe between the top and the body, of reflectorized paint.

And, there are the usual attempts of departments that do some inspection or law enforcement work to try to get cars with eight cylinders and more horsepower. Normally, the state purchases six-cylinder autos for economy reasons.

On the question of space, Gov. Victor Anderson and some of his top aides made a swing through the statehouse in the annual spring hunt for more room for offices where space is needed.

This time it was the central accounting office, where centralized automatic machines take care of work for a lot of state departments. It is being cramped. The survey showed no space is available and that the office must tighten up its belt.

Clean Bees If you are in the market for bees, the word from the statehouse is: don't buy any unless they have been state inspected and declared free of disease.

State Entomologist C. J. Walstrom said persons offering bees for sale must furnish the buyer with a valid certificate of inspection. Spreading of disease by bees, who pollinate many crops, could lower an already short population, the expert said.

Weather Control May 13 there will be a special election on whether a North Platte Valley Weather Control district should be established.

Petitions calling for the election, which will be on the same day as the Nebraska primary, were declared valid by Secretary of State Frank Marsh. The district would encompass Scotts Bluff, Morrill, Sioux and Banner counties.

Grandsinger Case The case of Loyd Grandsinger, sentenced to death in the slaying of a safety patrolman, has gone through another court. This was the U. S. Court of Appeals in St. Louis, Mo. It ruled the Wewala, D.D. native must have a new trial within six months or be freed.

Atty. Gen. C. S. Beck said the state will take the case to the U. S. Supreme Court.

A district court jury in Cherry county convicted Grandsinger of killing a safety patrolman in 1954 and sentenced him to death in the electric chair. The Nebraska Supreme Court affirmed the lower court decision. But a Federal Court held that Grandsinger did not have proper representation by counsel and was denied his constitutional rights.

Road Wages The running controversy over wages to be paid on Interstate 480 is still being fought.

County Agent's Column ... New Ogallala Strawberry Is Home Garden Triumph

New Strawberry A new hybrid strawberry, Ogallala, has just been released and is tailored for an area from Central Iowa to eastern Colorado and north from Kansas to Canada.

Ogallala is a real plant breeder's triumph. More than 100,000 plants and 20 years of research went into it. The result is an ever-bearing combining the aroma and hardness of the wild Rocky Mountain strawberry with size and quantity of cultivated varieties.

Ogallala was released by Nebraska's North Platte station, where the final selection was made. It is a home garden berry for fresh use and for shipping. It holds its shape in canning and makes a superior frozen product.

Fertilizing Lawns A simple formula has been established for determining the amount of fertilizer to apply to your lawn.

Dr. N. D. Weldon, University of Nebraska, extension agronomist, says the first step is to figure the number of square yards in your lawn. Then, divide this number by the percent of nitrogen in your fertilizer. This answer will give the pounds of fertilizer to apply.

This formula is calculated for application of fertilizer three or four times a year, Weldon said. "Many people prefer to apply a complete fertilizer containing phosphorus and potassium in addition to nitrogen, but the formula still remains the same."

Weldon noted that the use of complete fertilizers is usually not necessary more than once a year, and in some cases, may not be necessary more than once every two or three years.

Farm Briefs Twenty years of research at the Nebraska Agricultural Experiment station show that the period from Mar. 10 to Apr. 10 is the best time to plant oats in the Northeast Nebraska. The importance of early seeding of oats cannot be over-emphasized.

Plantings made after this optimum period—Apr. 1 to Apr. 10—suffered a yield reduction of about five percent for the first week of delay. There was an additional 10 percent decrease in yield for successive weeks of delay.

Therefore, yield reductions of 25 percent can be expected if planting is delayed beyond the first of May.

Research at Nebraska, South Dakota, Kansas and New Mexico shows that there are no significant differences in performance of light and dark colored Hereford cattle.

This data indicated that the inherent rate and efficiency of gain and ability to fatten quickly, cattle of good and poor performance were found among all the color groups.

Old diseased twigs and limbs should be pruned from apple and pear trees before growth starts. The first glaucous green leaves over the winter in the cankers of diseased limbs of these trees.

Dutch elm disease is not known to be present in Nebraska. When it does occur in the state, it will not wipe out all elm trees. It will kill many of them in some localities regardless of what is done.

When the disease does occur, the spread will likely be very slow, so there will be plenty of time for communities to prepare to slow the spread. Control measures cannot be expected to prevent the disease entirely.
