Science Lecture, Demonstrations Set at College

Wonders of science will be revealed in a special WSTC convocation at 8 p. m. Wednesday in the college auditorium when Ervin H. Hoffort presents parts of his lecture-demonstration series.

A former York science teacher, Hoffort is one of 10 traveling science salesmen touring the U. S. to "sell science pure and simple." He is demonstrating on behalf of the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies, the National Science Foundation and the Atomic Energy commission.

Hoffort has stated in his demonstrations that there is simple explanation for everything. In one of his demonstrations, a spinning bicycle wheel is held by a student standing on a free turning disc. By changing the angle on the spinning wheel, the student spins, changes direction, stops and starts. This is the basic gyroscopic principle used in rockets and space satellites.

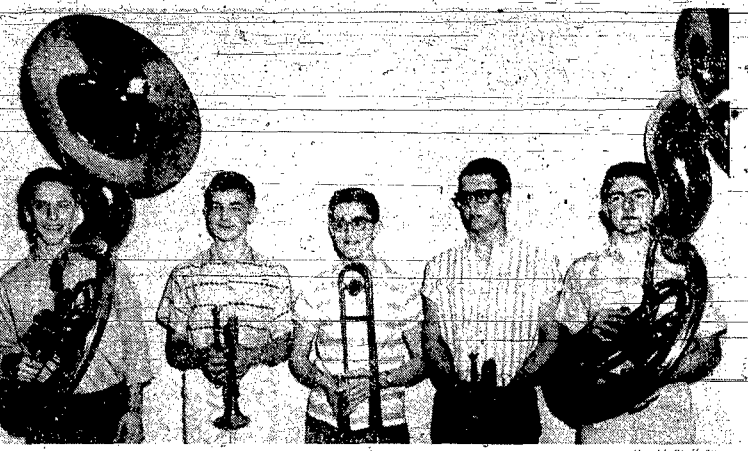

Notice is hereby given that the Articles of Incorporation of the Commercial State Bank, a Corporation of Nebraska, have been amended and the amended articles of incorporation are hereby published for the purpose of giving notice to the creditors of the bank of the amendments. The amendments are as follows: 1. The name of this corporation shall be Commercial State Bank. 2. The principal place of business of this corporation shall be in Hoskins, County of Wayne, State of Nebraska. 3. This corporation is formed to transact a commercial banking business as provided by the laws of Nebraska. 4. The authorized capital stock of this corporation shall be \$50,000.00 of which \$30,000.00 has been paid in. It is represented by shares of the par value of \$10.00 each. No transfer of the stock of this corporation shall be operative until entered on the books of the corporation. 5. The corporation commenced business on the 6th day of July, 1917, of as soon thereafter as authorized by the Department of Banking of the State of Nebraska, and shall have perpetual existence. 6. The affairs of this corporation shall be managed by a Board of Directors consisting of no less than three nor more than a shareholder whose term of office shall be for one year or until their successors are elected. 7. The Board of Directors shall elect from its number a president, a vice-president and a secretary. 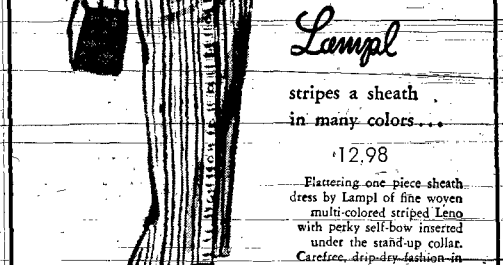

Farm Housing Loan Program Expansion Set

An expanded farm housing loan program designed to speed up farm building construction and improvement as well as act as an anti-recession measure was announced today by FHA County Supervisor Lawrence R. Fuchs, Hartington. An owner of a farm in agricultural production and on which the operator plans to produce at least \$400 worth of farm commodities for sale or home use may qualify for the four-percent, long-term housing loan, provided he meets other eligibility requirements. Formerly an eligible applicant had to own a farm that produced a more substantial part of the operator's annual cash income. Borrowers may use loan funds to build, improve or repair farm houses or other essential farm buildings and to provide water for farmstead and household use. Fuchs said that in addition to financing major construction, the

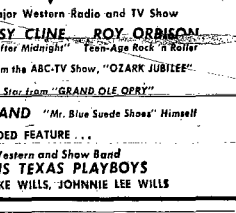

Corn, Alfalfa Basic Feeds In Creep Ration for Lambs

Creep-feeding lambs will result in extra returns for farm flock owners. Rate of gain and economy of gain is best at the time the lamb is young and nursing. Growth rate decreases as they approach heavier weights.

Factors such as parasites, summer heat and dry pastures will also slow rate of gain. On the average, milk production of the ewe slackens after about six weeks.

Corn or milo and alfalfa hay are the basic feeds for creep rations. Milo or corn can be fed ground or whole and good alfalfa hay fed in a rack. If ewes are poor milkers or high quality alfalfa hay is not available, then a protein supplement should be added to the grain ration.

There's still some question as to whether adding antibiotics will pay when feeding them to healthy lambs still nursing. There is no conclusive evidence supporting the use of stibestrol on nursing lambs.

Soil compaction is an increasingly common farm problem and probably will be especially important this year due to the plentiful soil moisture and late season.

Check Grassed Waterways Now is the time to check, repair and maintain your grassed waterways. Early spring freezing and thawing damages many waterways.

If the ditches are relatively small, a manure loader, a spade or shovel, a few chunks of sod and a little labor can mend the damage in a short time. Place the chunks of sod from 5 to 10 feet apart and tramp them in the rear tractor wheel.

Grass is similar to people—it likes to eat. Fertilizing grassed waterways with barnyard manure at the rate of five to eight tons per acre or with commercial fertilizer as soon as possible is recommended.

Prevention is the best way to deal with soil compaction. Here are several tips offered for avoiding this difficult problem.

1. Don't carry out machine operations while the soil is wet.
