Council Passes Hospital Bond, Board Ordinances

Lease Plans Tentatively Approved

Wayne council members Tuesday night authorized Attorney Buco Bombolt to take steps necessary to exercise the city's option to buy Bentback hospital immediately.

The authorization followed passage of two ordinances concerning the city purchase of the Bentback facilities. The first approved issuance of \$150,000 in bonds for the purchase. The second established a five-member hospital board to supervise operation of the city-owned hospital.

Mayor Willard Wilts tentatively appointed the five-member board. Those named and the year their terms expire are Mrs. W. G. Schulz (1959), Edward Grubb (1960), Henry E. Ley (1961), Carl Nuss (1962) and John Carhart (1963).

The appointments will not become official until the ordinance establishing the group becomes effective on June 1. In the meantime, appointments, one new member will be named each year.

The council also agreed with a board recommendation that the hospital facilities be leased to Dr. Walter Bentback until such time as he completes construction of a new clinic.

The lease proposal would let Bentback operate the present facilities in return for his paying the interest of the hospital bonds until he vacates the building. This interest would amount to approximately \$350 a month.

During the lease period the hospital facilities would be open to the public and used by other physicians for their patients.

The ordinance establishing the hospital board also provides for an annual report to not to exceed two miles for maintenance of the hospital.

A Worthington representative told the council his company is going to replace the base under the Bentback building with the original base proved faulty and will be replaced at no cost to the city under the warranty. The replacement will probably be made this fall.

In other action Tuesday the council approved purchase of a gun-type trailer sprayer for use at the airport and city parks and in mosquito control. The implement was purchased from Brandstetter Implement for \$750. A request for sidewalk on a half block on Ninth street between Logan and Nebraska was received from Otto Heithold and Robert Rinehart.

Wayne Jaycees were granted permission to hold a bicycle rodeo on Second and Logan streets May 2.

The council also reorganized for the coming year. Everett Rees was re-elected president, Mayor Willard Wilts renewed all his appointments of city officers.

They included Walter Bressler, clerk and water commissioner; L. W. Elus, treasurer; R. H. Hansen, police chief; Budd Bornholt, attorney; Henry Victor, street commissioner; Dr. Roy Matson, physician, and N. H. Bruggler, engineer.

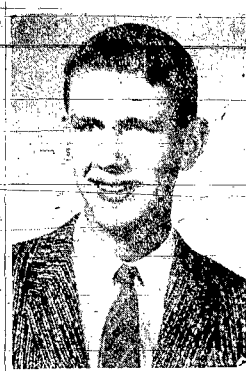

Farmers Urged To Check '57 Corn on Loan

Wayne county farmers who have 1957-crop corn on questionable keeping quality under loan-storage loans have been alerted to their responsibilities in protecting their own and the government's interest.

County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell said checkers will start making checks on the quantity of corn under the loan this week.

He reminded producers that they are responsible for the condition of corn stored under price support loans. Should spoilage take place, the producer will be charged for any loss in the value of the corn.

According to Sundell, many farmers in the county have some 1957-crop corn under loan which may need special attention because of its high-moisture content. With warm weather coming on, definite steps should be taken to keep such corn in good condition.

Producers with high-moisture corn were reminded a few weeks ago to check the condition of their farm-dried corn periodically so that prompt action could be taken by them to recondition the corn whenever it appears necessary to avoid deterioration and assure safe storage.

Gives Health As Reason For Decision

Sheriff Hans Tietgen threw the race for the republican nomination in the May 13 primary election wide open this week with the announcement that he would not seek reelection.

The incumbent had filed earlier and his announcement Monday did not come in time to have his name left on the primary ballot. Other republican names for the nomination are Donald "Butch" Weibull, Winside, and French Penn, Wayne.

In making the announcement, Sheriff Tietgen, who will complete 14 years in office this year, said: "Due to the present condition of my health and upon recommendation of my doctor, I have decided not to seek the Republican nomination in the coming May 13 primary.

"I want to express my sincere appreciation to the citizens of Wayne county for their loyal support during my term of office. I feel it was a real honor to have been able to serve them during the past 13 years. I shall continue to do my best in the office until a successor assumes the post next January."

George Bartels, Wayne, is opposed to the Democratic primary ballot for the sheriff's position. Bartels will oppose the non-political ballots in the primary. Incumbent Henry Art, Wayne, and Alred Eddie, Wayne, are vying for the Republican nomination for county assessor. Lee Swinney, Wayne, will oppose incumbent John F. Meyer for the nomination for First district commissioner.

A three-way battle is in progress for the First district commissioner nomination on the Republican ballot. Seeking the call are Henry Honneke, Hoskins, appointed early this year to fill the unexpired term of Ed Gassmeyer, and Harold Shipley, and Melvin Franzen, Winside.

Contesting for three seats on the Wayne County Public Power district board of directors are incumbent Jack Swengard, Winside, Marjorie Longe, Wayne, and Robert Longe, Wayne. The two elected will serve six-year terms. Incumbent Lawrence Ring did not seek reelection.

County officials unopposed for the Republican nominations are Clerk A. Bard, Clerk of District Court John L. Bressler, Superintendent Gladys Porter, Attorney Charles McDermott and Treasurer Leona Bahde.

Third of County Farms Take Part In ACP Program

Over 550 Wayne county farmers have reported completing their 1957 ACP practices, ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell reported this week.

This indicates a total participation in the 1957 ACP of 33 percent of the county's total of 1,649 farms. Participating farms contain 37 percent of the county's farmland.

The average cost-share for conservation under the 1957 program is expected to be about \$1,276 per farmer, including increases for price cost and advance purchase for conservation materials and services.

Major conservation accomplishments established with the assistance of the 1957 ACP include 14,100 acres of cropland, 100 acres of sod waterways, eight water storage and erosion dams, 181 acres of new or improved permanent grass or legume cover and 10,046 increased acres of grass or legumes in rotation.

Soybean Growers Asked to Watch Market Price

Growers with soybeans under 1957 price support loans were urged today to watch market prices closely during the next few weeks so that their crop may bring them the best possible return.

ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell reminded farmers that frequently they can get a better price for their soybeans by paying off the CCC loan and selling the crop on the market.

Price supports were available on 1957-crop soybeans in Wayne county at \$7 per bushel. The price on soybeans in Wayne Wednesday was \$7.06 per bushel. Interest on loans would partially offset the difference in the two prices.

Since soybean loans mature May 31, however, any redemption of beans under warehouse loan must be completed before that date. Soybeans under farm-stored loan may be redeemed at any time up to the transfer of title to CCC which occurs at the time of dumping at a commercial warehouse on CCC bin on delivery orders from the ASC office.

County farmers currently have about 4,100 bushels of 1957-crop soybeans under farm-stored-price support loans. Farmers who intend to deliver purchase agreement soybeans to CCC are also reminded they must file their intention to deliver during the month before the May 31 maturity date.

Nuernberger said the county committee had no choice but to accept the petition. "In any case, he said, if the petitioners should withdraw their names from the application prior to its being filed with Mrs. Porter.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

On the front page of today's Wayne Herald Sheriff Hans Tietgen announces his decision to withdraw from the race for sheriff and to retire at the end of his term Jan. 1.

This will mean an end to 14 years of service. Sheriff Tietgen has given to the county. The decision followed doctor's recommendations that Tietgen retire from active service.

During the past few years Wayne county has enjoyed one of the lowest crime rates in the state. It is pleasant to consider this when the crime rate in many areas is climbing in alarming proportions.

During his time in office Sheriff Tietgen has probably made more friends than arrests... but this is the way we would rather have it. Police officers are in a peculiar position, in that we would prefer they prevent crimes rather than solve them. The record indicates that during the past 14 years crimes have been few in Wayne county.

The office of sheriff doesn't pay an attractive salary. Certainly a man is to be commended who will serve the public all these years despite the fact the job was a threat to his health.

Capitol News

Nature Has Solved Fluoride Problem for 14 State Cities

Lincoln—Will the question of whether to add fluoride to municipal water systems ever be solved? The question is just as controversial today in most quarters as it was when the theory was first advanced.

But, in some cases, nature has solved the problem for a community with many citizens unaware of it. The State Health department said that at least 14 cities have as much natural fluoride in drinking water as recommended for adding by the artificial method. Three Nebraska cities—Fairbury, Nebraska City and Superior—add fluoride to the water artificially.

These towns have the chemical in the water naturally. The department said Verdel, Winnebago, Benkelman, Macy, Maskell, Moon, Lyman, Alliance, Herman, Stratton, Trenton, Walthill, Whitney, Craig, North Platte, Haigler, Hubbard, Jackson, Oakland, Bushnell, Indianola, Waverly, Aradog, and Imperial. However, only the first 14 have more than one part of fluoride for each million parts—minimum amount recommended for artificial addition.

The director of the Health department's division of dental health said "every effort" will be made to advise communities where needed to have the fluoride level of their drinking water adjusted to maximum protection against tooth decay. Dr. Mark P. Muffley, the director, made that comment at a State Board of Health meeting.

Studies show a tremendous amount of difference in tooth decay incidence where a community has fluoride in its water, Muffley said.

The director of the Health department's division of dental health said "every effort" will be made to advise communities where needed to have the fluoride level of their drinking water adjusted to maximum protection against tooth decay.

Joseph J. Brown, state railway commissioner, said a public utility body such as the Railway commission must see that companies earn a fair return.

If not, he told an annual convention of the Nebraska Telephone association, it fails to properly protect those who depend on regulation to see that they receive efficient and dependable service. Such service can't be given, Brown said, unless a utility is in a "consistent and sound financial condition."

Meanwhile, regulation of trucks and procedure relative to rates was the subject of an opinion from Atty. Gen. C. S. Beck. He said a tariff bureau or an association of common carriers can go before the commission for a rate change if it is properly represented by an attorney.

And, said the opinion, the association does not have to list all its members unless this is required by commission regulations.

Mobile X-rays
A familiar sight—presence of a State Health department mobile x-ray unit at a high school or college—may be no more, at least temporarily. The State Health board was asked to confine mobile x-ray units to adults, eliminating high schools and colleges.

Dr. E. A. Rogers, state health director, said the state faces a cut of several thousand dollars in Federal aid for the x-ray program. Service, therefore, must be curtailed, he said. The board took no immediate action on the request.

Past records show Rogers said that incidence of tuberculosis in younger age brackets is small and of little clinical value. He suggested efforts be concentrated in adult population areas or where disease incidence is high enough to warrant expense of operation.

State Assistance
There are fewer aged getting aid from the state now than at the same time in 1957. That's the report of the State Board of Public Welfare. It reported 10,567 cases on the rolls in March, compared with 17,155 a year earlier. Total payments this March amounted to \$1,083,945, as against \$1,053,895 in 1957. The average cost per case rose from \$61.43 a year ago to \$65.43 in March, 1958.

Aeronautics Commission
The State Aeronautics commission voted to allocate \$98,000 to North Platte for improving its municipal airport. Of the amount, \$18,000 is state money, the remainder federal.

The city will put up about \$62,000 more. Work will include ramps, taxiways, lighting, clearing trees and felling.

Commission Chairman Mike Meyers, Omaha, said with the possibility of local airline service being authorized for Nebraska, there will be a lot of other cities wanting aid. He told the commission it should allocate funds wisely in view of the pending case.

Hearing Set
A hearing has been set for May 5 on a request by Atty. Gen. C. S. Beck that the State Supreme court cite a district judge for contempt. The judge is James English, Omaha.

Beck charges English violated Canon 35 of the code of judicial ethics and permitted taking of pictures and sound broadcasts while a trial was in session. The motion to be heard May 5 is one by English, asking more time to prepare his case.

Bingo Petitions
The state VFW believes it has sufficient signatures to put on the November ballot the question of whether bingo should be authorized in Nebraska. The game now is forbidden by the Nebraska Constitution and the VFW has been circulating petitions to change the Constitution. Signatures must be filed with the Secretary of State by July 3. A total of 57,000 valid names is needed.

County Agent's Column

Separate Application Aids Control of Corn Rootworm

If insecticide for corn rootworm is applied in combination with starter fertilizer, poor results in insect control may be expected if fertilizer is placed as recommended.

Robert E. Roselle, University of Nebraska extension entomologist, points out that placement of fertilizer to the side of and below the seed is the best method, but puts the insecticide in the wrong location for good rootworm control.

If starter is applied in this manner, Roselle continued, another method of applying soil insecticides should be used.

Corn rootworms can be controlled with several insecticides placed in the soil before or at the time of planting. Aldrin, heptachlor or BHC are recommended. All will provide equally good control if used properly, the specialist said.

Broadcast application of insecticides with a weed sprayer, followed immediately by disking, is probably the most reliable method. One pound of actual aldrin, 3/4 pound of actual heptachlor or 3/4 pound of actual BHC are recommended per acre. Applications may be made anytime before planting in April or May.

Row applications at time of planting may be applied by spray or with granular forms of aldrin or heptachlor. BHC is not recommended for row treatment because it may be affected if too much BHC is used.

If sprays are used, adjust the nozzle so that a band about six inches wide is sprayed into the row and covered with the seed, use 1/2 pound of actual aldrin or heptachlor per acre. If granular forms of aldrin or heptachlor are used, apply a minimum of 2 1/2 pounds of 20 percent granules per acre with special applicators.

Soybeans or Corn?
The climatic adaptation of soybeans is about the same as that of corn. The soil requirements are also similar, except that properly inoculated soybeans may do well on soils in which corn would show serious nitrogen hunger.

On dry land, soybeans seem to be about as drought-resistant as corn. Soybean yields commonly are 30 to 50 percent of those produced by corn. In 1957, the average yield of soybeans in Nebraska was 27 bushels, higher than in any other state. Nebraska corn averaged 45 bushels.

Soybeans produce a lower cash return per acre than corn, but this loss is offset in part by the higher yields of other crops following soybeans. There are lower costs for fertilizer and insecticides for the soybean crop in comparison with

corn. Soybeans make the best yield when planted in rows 20 inches apart. Despite a reduction in yield, most soybeans in Nebraska are planted in 38 to 42 inch rows because the crop can be planted and tended with farm implements.

Soybean production requires close attention, complete weed control and special tillage before and after planting.

Feeders Day Reports
Substretro fed or implanted regimens in greater gains ranging from 5 to 20 percent in various cattle feeding trials. The most advantage shown was had with yearling steers on full feed which received 24 milligram implants plus 5-milligrams fed daily. Substretro gave the least advantage where cattle received 2.5 pounds daily of dehydrated alfalfa.

Applications Due May 20
Certified seed growers are asked to submit applications for seed certification by May 20 on oats, barley, bromegrass, wheatgrass, sweet clover, vetch and first crop alfalfa seed.

Application blanks are available at the county extension office. It is suggested that all certified seed growers clear their applications through the extension office in order that a local record may be available as to who is growing certified seed of the various crop varieties.
