### Funeral Rites Planned Today For Victim of Sunday Accident

#### 1958 County Highway Toll Reaches Five

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. today at Grace Lutheran church for Arthur Meier, 39, who was killed about 6 p. m. Sunday in a two-car accident eight miles south of Wayne on Highway 15.

Mr. Meier was killed in a collision with a car driven by Gayle Wehrer, 22, Wayne. Wehrer and Mrs. Meier were still hospitalized Wednesday morning at Bentback hospital.

Mrs. Meier suffered a fractured breast bone, fractured jaw, lacerations and bruises. Wehrer has cracked ribs, a fracture of a man wrist bone, lacerations and bruises.

Mr. Meier died enroute to the local hospital. He had been thrown from his car, which remained upright in the center of the road.

The Meier car was traveling west on a county road. Wehrer, who was alone, was northbound. The Wehrer car traveled about 300 feet after the collision and overturned in the ditch near the Phil Damm farm lane.

The death raised Wayne county's 1958 highway toll to five. It was the twelfth in the 14 counties served by the Norfolk Highway Patrol as compared with six a year ago.

Rev. E. J. Bernalth will officiate at the Meier services today. Robert B. Meyer will sing "Asleep in Jesus" and "Abide With Me," accompanied by Mrs. Bernath.

Palbearers will be Willis Meyer, Harry Gus, Louis Geewe, Marvin Korn, Warren Baird and Horace Arthur. Burial will be in Greenwood cemetery.

Arthur Meier, son of Henry and Rosella Meier, was born Oct. 7, 1898 at Perryville, Mo. He came to Nebraska as a young man and married Emma Holst, Feb. 21, 1924 at Wakefield. He had been a member of the Grace Lutheran congregation since 1948, having previously joined St. Paul's Lutheran church, Wakefield. The Meiers operated a farm southwest of Wayne.

Survivors include his widow; a son, Marvin, Wakefield; two daughters, Mrs. Harry Bargholz and Mardelle Wayne; a sister, Martha Meier, Farmington, Mo.; three brothers, Valley, Perryville, Mo. and Otto, Hayes, Wayne; and two grandchildren.

#### Exams Open for Postmaster at Hoskins Office

An examination for postmaster at Hoskins will be open for applications until May 27. The Civil Service commission announced today.

The Hoskins post office was vacated by the death of Gilbert Fleisher. The position carries a \$4,190 salary.

Competitors for the vacancy must show they can deal with the public agreeably and effectively and they are reliable citizens who would command respect and confidence of postoffice patrons. They must also show their background will enable them to maintain simple records of accounts or that it has given them a knowledge of postal procedure.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, ability and character.

There is a one-year residence requirement and applicants must have reached age 18 on the closing date for receipt of applications. Persons over 70 may not be appointed.

Complete information on the examination requirements may be obtained at the Hoskins postoffice. Applications must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service commission, Washington, D. C. and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.

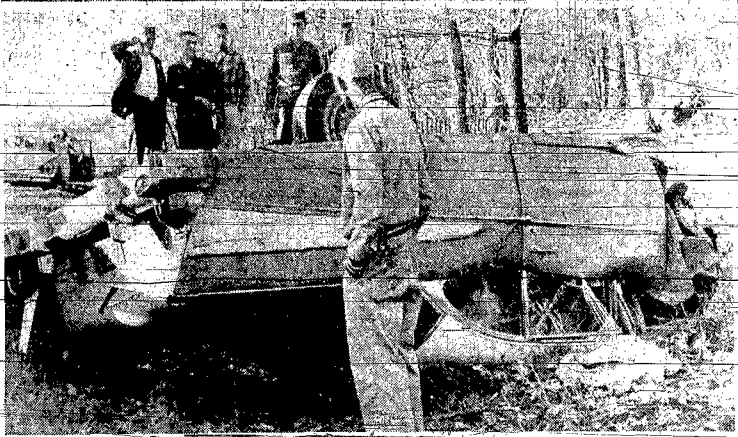
#### Speakers Named for Graduation Exercises

#### Voters Will Decide Five Local Battles

Interest in five races for county offices is expected to heighten interest in the primary election Tuesday.

County voters will decide contests on the Republican ballot for sheriff, assessor and first and third district commissioners. A three-way battle for two seats on the Wayne County PPD board of directors will also be decided.

The Republican nomination for sheriff took on added interest last week when incumbent Hans Tietgen announced his withdrawal from the race because of poor health.

Tietgen's announcement did not come in time to have his name removed from the primary ballot. Seeking the nomination are Donald "Butch" Weible, Winside, and French Penn, Wayne. George Bartels, Wayne, is unopposed for the Democratic nomination.

Alfred Eddie, Wayne, is opposing incumbent Henry Arr for the Republican nomination for assessor. There were no fitnes for the office on the Democratic ticket.

First district voters will decide the race between incumbent Emil F. Meyer and Lee Swinney on the Republican ballot.

A three-way battle is in progress for the Third district Republican nomination. Seeking the call are Henry Bohneke, Hoskins, appointed early this year to fill the unexpired term of Ed Glassmeyer, and Harold Simbley and Melvin Frizon, Winside.

Contestants for the two Power district seats are incumbent Lock Swanson, Winside, and Marvin Frank and Rollo Long, Wayne. The two elected will serve six-year terms. Incumbent Lawrence Rice did not seek re-election.

Republican and Democratic races on the congressional ticket are expected to add interest to the election.

Incumbent R. L. Harrison, Norfolk, is opposed by Merle A. Hansen, South Sioux City, and Charles C. Christensen, Fremont. The Democratic nomination for Third district congressman.

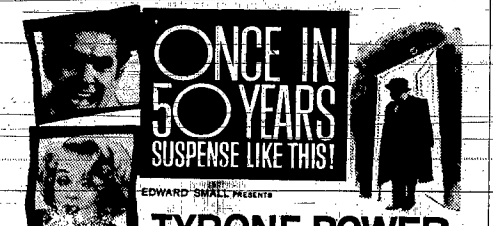

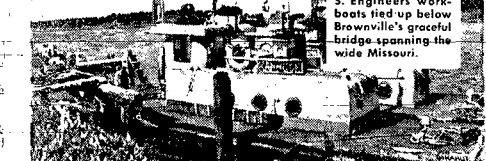

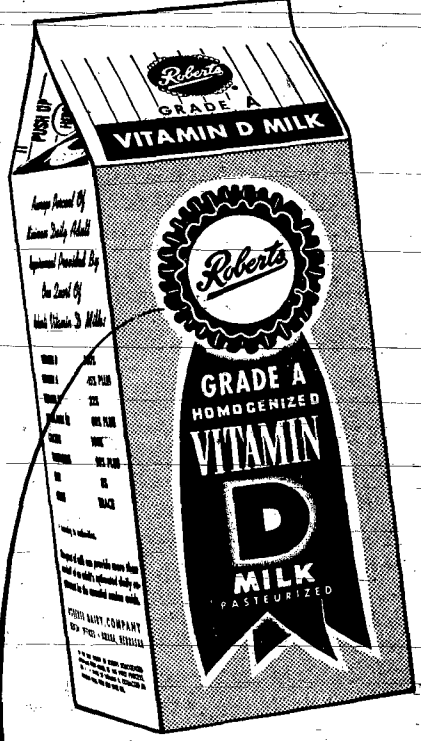
