Incumbent Hans Tietgen, who earlier announced his withdrawal from the race, received 83. George Bartels, Wayne, received the Democratic nomination without opposition. He received 178 votes.

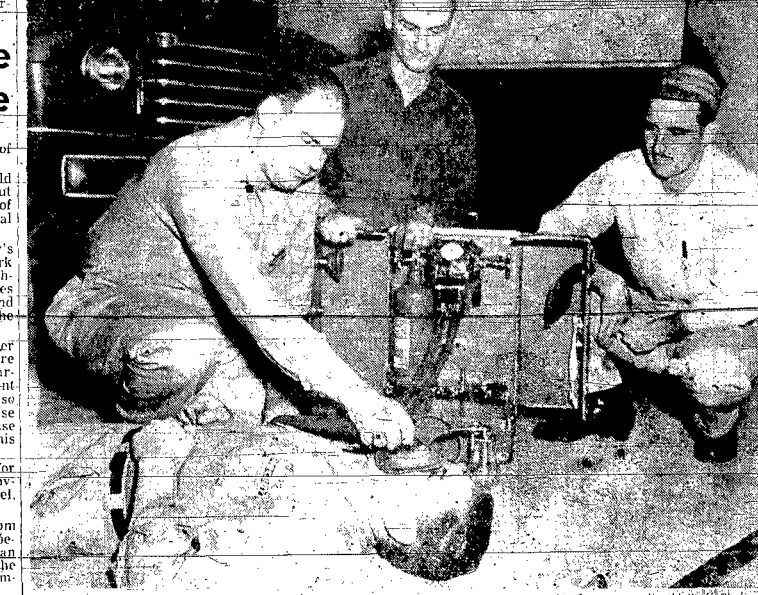

Firemen Demonstrate New Resuscitator



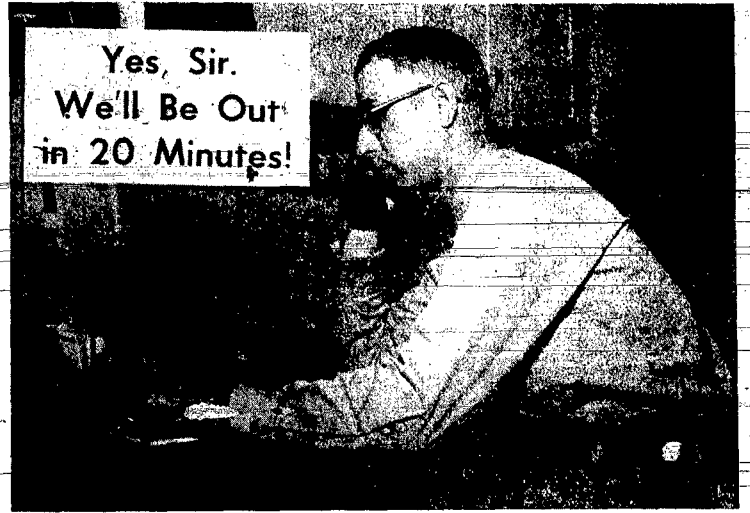

It is capable of giving resuscitation by inhalation to two patients and aspiration to a third at the same time.

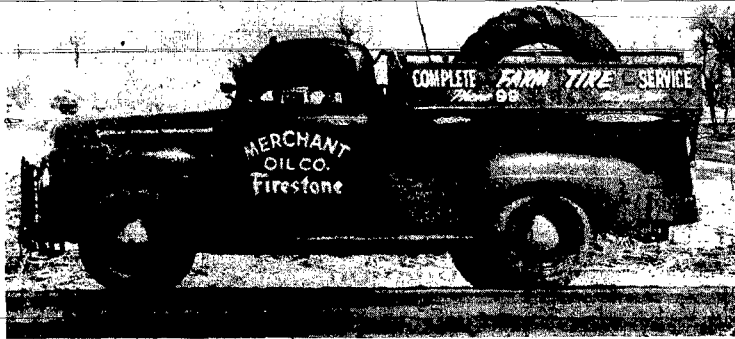


