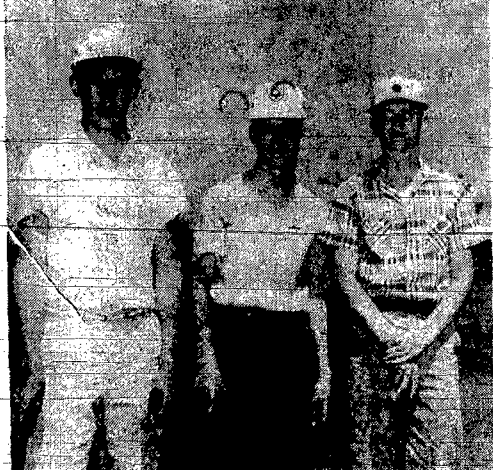

Nine Youths Win Prizes in Jaycee Bike Event Sunday

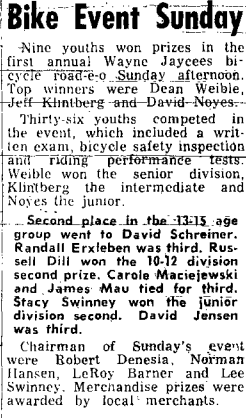

The Carroll board will hold its annual meeting, June 9, to complete the 1957-58 fiscal year's business. The group will then meet with the Wayne board to examine the financial report.

Current obligations of the Carroll district will be met with funds received from free high school tuition. This would balance the books for the 1957-58 term and allow the district to merge with Wayne with no outstanding debts.

May 31 Date To Appoint Successor

Emil F. Meyer, chairman of the Wayne county board of commissioners, eight years, Monday announced his resignation from the board effective May 31.

Meyer was elected by Lee Swinney, Wayne, for the Republican nomination for First district commissioner in last week's primary election. The vote was 325 to 222.

The board chairman said his decision was prompted by disappointment over what he considers a lack of appreciation for his work on the board.

His letter of resignation submitted at a board meeting Tuesday read:

"Last Tuesday's election revealed the non-interest of many voters of District 1 in their county government by the support I received."

"I feel that my services are of no more value. Therefore, I will resign as County Commissioner of District 1 effective May 31, 1958 at 6 p. m."

Meyer was elected county commissioner in the 1946 general election. He took office in January, 1947 and has served the post nearly 11 1/2 years. His present term will not expire until Dec. 31.

A successor to fill the remainder of the unexpired term must be appointed by a board composed of County Clerk C. A. Bard, Treasurer Leona Bandy and Attorney Charles McDermott.

A similar appointment was necessary in February when Ed Glassmeyer resigned as Third district commissioner and Henry Hohnke, Hoskins, was named to fill the vacancy.

Bard announced Wednesday morning that the committee will probably make the appointment of Meyer's successor May 31.

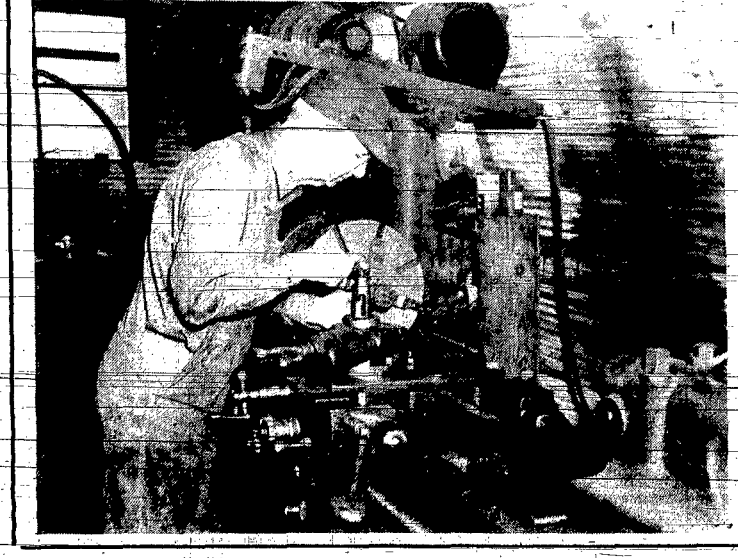
