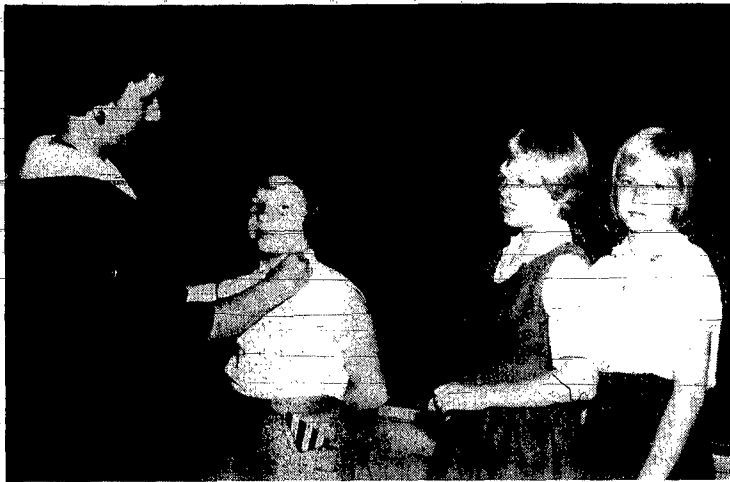

Ask Opinion Of Farmers Townspeople

Wayne's city council Tuesday night announced it is seriously considering installation of over 300 parking meters in the town's business district.

However, the council expressed the desire to obtain public sentiment on meters before proceeding with the project. A trial of the meters was strongly advocated by Mayor Willard Wittge and Councilman B. A. Meyer. The remainder of the council, however, expressed the wish for the public opinion before making a definite commitment.

A parking meter salesman submitted a possible installation plan to the council Tuesday night. It called for 300 meters on Main street and adjoining side streets throughout the entire business district.

Cost of such an installation would be about \$20,000. This amount, the salesman explained, would be paid through meter receipts. The company would receive 50 percent of the receipts until the installation was paid for. He estimated this would take 18 to 24 months.

In asking opinions on the meters, the council urged that residents of both city and the entire trading area make their feelings known.

The meter proposal called for two-hour meters with short period machines located at corners near the local banks. The salesman also suggested five-hour meters in areas more distant from the business district. These would cost approximately \$2,000 more.

Three other knotty problems also faced the council Tuesday night. They were construction of a well at the industrial site east of town, a request by the REA to run its own power lines to the headquarters building in Wayne and bicycle traffic hazards.

K. N. Parke and Elmer Harrison applied for Wayne Industries, Inc. to ask the council to issue permits for drilling a new city well at the industrial site. Council action was stymied when Attorney Budd Bornhoff gave an opinion that such a move would be illegal.

Bornhoff said he would like to see the action REA to run its own power lines to the headquarters building in Wayne and bicycle traffic hazards.

The council suggested the industrial group attempt to secure additional funds and drill well itself. Parke explained that one prospect has shown great interest in locating in Wayne. Plans for a required building are expected from the firm soon.

The firm would employ eight to 20 persons and would purchase agricultural materials for processing from area farmers. It would require 10 to 15,000 gallons of water daily.

REA Board President Alfred Sydow asked permission for the power district to construct its own line to the headquarters building in town. The REA now purchases power for the building from the city.

Sydow presented a copy of a motion picture by the Wayne city council in January, 1947. AS passed the motion granted permission for such a line if a headquarters building were ever erected in Wayne.

Final action on the permission was delayed until the next meeting. Bornhoff was asked to secure information as to whether the earlier council action is still binding on the present city administration.

The bicycle problem came up for discussion after a local woman, Mrs. Harry McMillan, was injured when struck by a bicycle near her home Sunday evening. Mrs. McMillan suffered a broken hip in a similar accident about six months ago.

The council seemed generally agreed that more rigid enforcement of city ordinances and rules for bicycles is in order.

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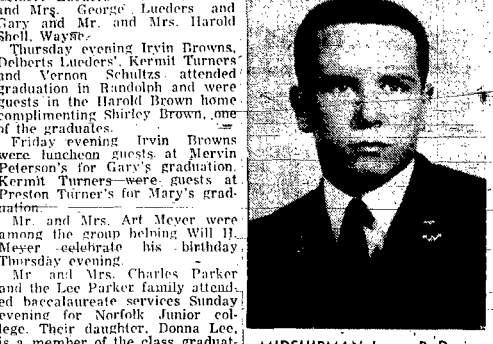

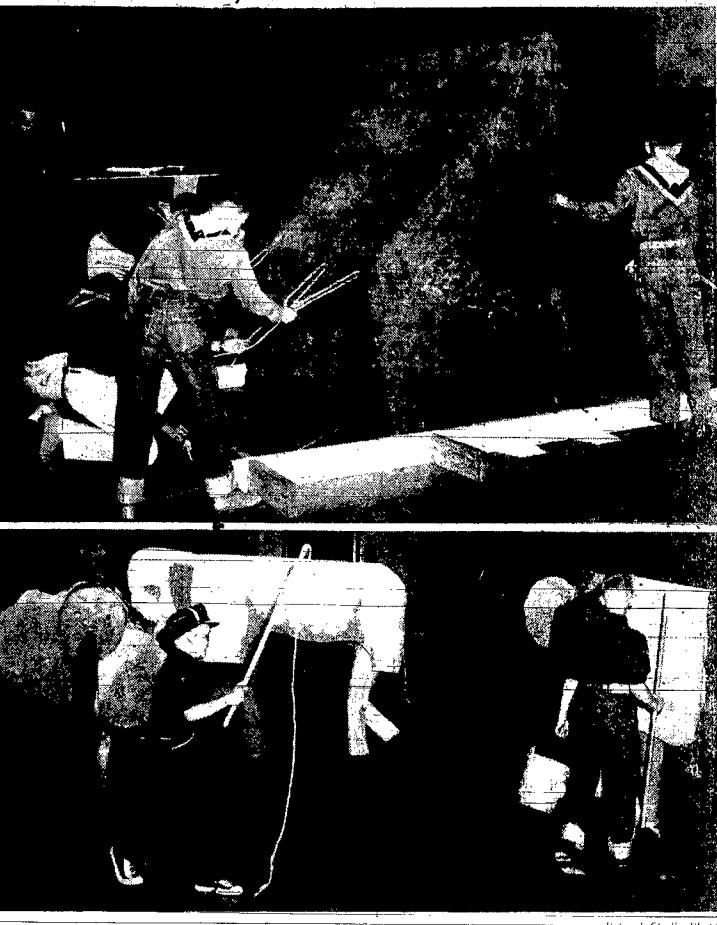

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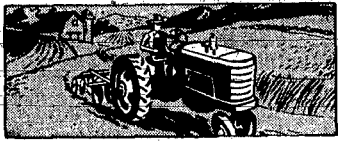

Trends of Integration in Agriculture

What will be the organizational pattern of the agricultural industry in 1975?

Who will own the resources, provide management and take the risks in agriculture?

Will integration result in accelerated technological progress, greater efficiency and improved quality of product?

Will integration make production more responsive or less responsive to price changes?

If benefits accrue will they be realized by the producer and the consumer of the product or by processors and distributors?

Answers to most of these questions lie in the future, but indications of possible trends can be seen.

Confusion and disagreement exist concerning integration of agriculture business. Some view this development as a means of promoting agricultural welfare and efficiency; others see it as a source of important social and economic problems.

Differences in views arise partly because of variations in interest people have in maintaining our present market organization and family-farm structure. But much of the controversy results from a lack of understanding of what integration is, or from disagreement on the amount of control to which agriculture will be subjected.

What Is Integration?

Integration in agriculture is not new nor should recent integrating activity be particularly surprising. The activities of firms which finance and sell supplies to farmers as well as the activities of processors and distributors of agricultural products are interrelated with each other and with agricultural production.

Because of this interdependence and in response to incentives from both the supply and demand sides of the market, links have developed between businesses operating in various stages of the produc-



tion and marketing of agricultural products. Establishment of these links is VERTICAL INTEGRATION.

Vertical integration might broadly be defined as formal coordination of management decisions made in two or more stages in production, processing and distribution of products. Coordination as used in this definition means something more positive and direct than the impersonal coordinating influence of the price mechanism of the market place.

In colonial times the activities of production, processing and distribution of agricultural products were, for the most part, closely integrated. For example, the farmer produced the feed for his draft horses, raised wheat, made flour, baked and sold bread.

More recently there has been increased specialization in the various stages of this sequence of operations. The oil company sold the farmer fuel for his tractor; the farmer produced the wheat; the trucker or railroad hauled it; the wheat was stored at a terminal elevator; the miller made the flour; the baker made bread; and the grocery store sold it.

Each of these businesses customarily dealt with the others by competitive buying and selling in the markets, but the natural interdependence of their activities remained essentially unchanged.

By vertical integration some businesses have reduced their dependence on the vagaries of the open market.

All integration activities are not vertical integration. Much of the coordinating activity is more properly called HORIZONTAL INTEGRATION.

Horizontal integration, as distinct from vertical integration, involves the formal coordination of the management decisions made in several individual farms or non-farm businesses engaged in one stage of the production, processing, or distribution of a product.

For example, in a Grade A milkshed all milk producers are required to meet certain uniform standards of production. Decisions relative to price and quantity are also made on a group basis. In other words, the milk production and marketing activities of all the members of these cooperatives are integrated, horizontally.

Such a group may also vertically integrate. For instance, they might jointly own and operate a milk processing firm. In similar ways,

non-farm businesses which, through contractual arrangements, vertically integrate into farming also horizontally integrate the activities of the producers with whom they contract.

Incentives for integration exist on both the demand and supply sides of the market. Significant forces exerting influence toward integration are at work on the farm. Modern mechanized production has encouraged large-scale, specialized operations with heavy investments and high cash expenses. Such operations require large amounts of capital and are particularly vulnerable to price risks.

A contract which provides for financing and also guarantees a minimum price or premium above market price is particularly vulnerable to price risks.

A contract which provides for financing and also guarantees a minimum price is particularly attractive to this type of producer. The scale and efficiency of his operation often permits the specialist to produce a uniformly high quality product. The contract may give him the opportunity to re-

ceive a premium price usually unavailable through regular market channels.

On the buyer side of the market the chain-store, supermarket system of food distribution has caused food processors to place increased emphasis upon uniform quality and volume purchases of farm products.

Buyers for food distributors seek large, stable supplies of food products. They want products which are uniform in size, weight and appearance, and which possess the characteristics sought by the housewife. They are willing to pay a premium to assure such a supply.

Demands of these buyers are met more easily under a coordinated system in which products are produced under specified conditions and assembled in large quantities for frequent and regular delivery.

As an example, this search by food distributors for a large, stable supply of uniformly high-quality broilers, along with the attempts of feed companies to gain a large and stable market for their feeds, and the efforts of processors to maintain a stable flow of products has encouraged contracting in the broiler industry. Similar incentives are present to encourage the development of integration in other enterprises.

What Forms May Integration Take?

Vertical integration may involve no more than the combining of stages of production on one farm. For instance, the addition of a hog-raising enterprise to consume farm-raised grain. Or it may involve two farm firms such as a rancher, and a cattle feeder integrating their cattle raising and fattening activities.

But the coordinating activities which are of greatest current interest and concern are those which involve farms and non-farm firms.

Integration between agriculture

and business may take any of three general forms as follows:

- (1) direct ownership and operation by one firm of two or more plants engaged in the same or successive stages of the production, processing and distribution of farm products;
- (2) contractual arrangements between farms and non-farm firms (often called contract farming), and
- (3) cooperative action by farmers. But within these three forms there are almost innumerable variations.

The prevailing belief of farmers and many others associated with agriculture seems to be that "independence" and "integration" are two mutually exclusive methods of operation—that if one integrates even to the slightest degree, independence of decision making is lost. Many seem to believe that in order to remain independent one must fight integration at all costs. But "integration" is not an absolute term. The various integration schemes encompass all degrees in the range and rigor of control which is obtained and exercised over farmers.

An integrator may influence management decisions in only two stages of the production, processing and distribution of an agricultural product; or he may control several stages, or he may control a product from the original producer to the ultimate consumer.

Even under contractual arrangements there are wide variations in the extent of control over agriculture which is obtained or exercised. In the broiler business, which is now concentrated in the southeastern and middle eastern sections of the United States, farm supply and marketing firms have taken over from the farmers part of the financing, most of the managerial functions and have assumed nearly all of the risk.

That integration activities will persist and spread seems highly probable. Attempts to maintain the status quo will likely be futile. Agriculture is changing—the important problem from the farmers' standpoint is how to participate in influencing or shaping the nature and characteristics of the agricultural industry of the future.



Vertical Integration in Livestock Production

Feed and livestock processors probably would not seek integration contracts with feeders of livestock if they faced more perfectly competitive markets. Theoretically, price regulates the activities of buyers and sellers, and price performs this coordinating job perfectly. With price as their guide, farmers produce the right livestock products with the right amount of feed at the right time in response to consumers' demands as reflected perfectly through all stages of the marketing system.

But the real world departs from this theoretical ideal. Today, imperfect markets are the rule rather than the exception. Market knowledge is usually imperfect, and packer buyers are often few, not many. These market conditions and changes in the technology of processing feed and slaughter animals have encouraged vertical integration of farm production with the non-farm processing of meat and formula feeds.

Two technological conditions encourage processors to seek contractual agreements with feeders. Processors experience a need for lessening market uncertainty. Changes in the food market have increased the buying power of a relatively few large retail chains and groups of independent retailers. Retailers are now making an effort to influence the character-

istics of the farm products offered to them.

As a result, the demand for agricultural products both at the processor and the farm levels has changed.

Retailers demand a much narrower range of product qualities, since only one or a very few are customarily chosen by the retailer. Many of the desires of retail organizations—such as uniform availability of large volumes of meat—can be had only through close coordination of farmers and the processors of meat and formula feed. The growing sensitivity of farmer and processor incomes to decisions of the other has encouraged vertical integration. Processors become more certain about what to expect from farmers if



amount of the total supply available in each terminal market, he could buy as much as he wanted without affecting the price. But in today's markets of relatively few buyers, this is no longer true.

Meat packers recognize that price competition for slaughter animals at the central market will only bid up prices and will not appreciably increase total supplies in the short run.

Therefore, rather than be content with playing a passive role in accepting a share of the available supply, meat packers have a strong incentive to make special ties with feeders and interior dealers apart from their limited central market purchases.

The meat processor's problem is even more difficult because maximum efficiency may be obtained only if the output from a large number of separate farms is coordinated. The farmer side of the livestock market is characterized by a large number of relatively small feeders and a lack of farmer-sponsored horizontal integration to coordinate their offerings.

This leads to the central question still to be answered: What determines whether such integration results in control (over meat supply, quality, and seasonal production) in the hands of farmer groups or in the hands of processor firms?

The Challenge of the Future Of Integration in Agriculture

Integration in itself is not a cure for all the problems of agriculture. In fact, integration may create new economic problems. There is no justification for complacency among leaders of cooperatives. Integrated operation does not come easily nor cheaply. Large capital investment is required to perform processing functions.

Integrated operations cannot be efficiently conducted except by means of adequate facilities and organization. Partially used or seasonally operated facilities would increase costs and reduce efficiency. If possible, plant and capital equipment should be kept at work the year around.

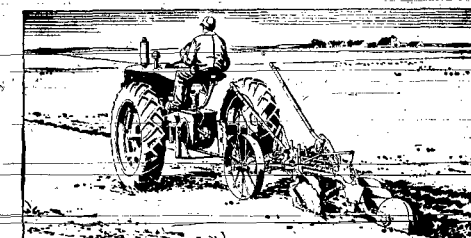
High-caliber management and well-trained personnel are essential also. More training and know-how are required to operate integrated business enterprises involving a wide range of economic and technical services.

If agriculture expands into business integration involving the processing of more farm products, it must have leadership and management at least as strong and as progressive as that of non-agricultural business firms.

For agriculture, vertical integration is one of the greatest challenges of the mid-twentieth century. There are clear indications that more vertical integration will develop in the food-fiber sector of the economy.

If more growers of farm products decide to roll up their sleeves and make a determined effort to capture the forces now pulling in the direction of further integration, agriculture may then retain control of its own production functions.

On the other hand, if vertical integration steadily spreads under the impetus of controls from outside of agriculture, the functioning of agriculture will change. Control goes with decision-making.



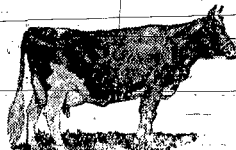

The above uncertainties associated with price, product quality and seasonal production are amplified by the existence of relatively few processors as sellers of formula feed and few packer buyers of slaughter animals.

For example, when a meat packer purchases an insignificant

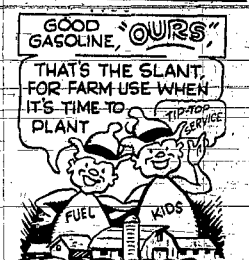

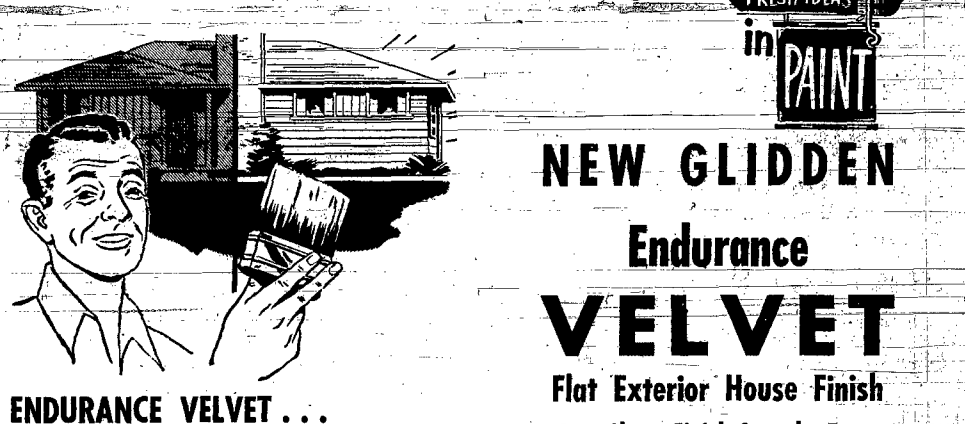

17 Nebraska Cities Face Big Job on New Airlines Support

 Lincoln—Starting this fall, 17 Nebraska cities and communities in their immediate trade area, have a big job. They will have to keep up the volume of traffic on new local airlines authorized for the state by the Civil Aeronautics board in Washington.
 Actually affected are Lincoln, Omaha, Sidney, North Platte, Imperial, McCook, Kearney, Hastings, Grand Island, Alliance and Scottsbluff. Those cities are located on either the northern or southern Nebraska routes authorized by the CAB on a temporary basis.
 The CAB will review the situation between the seventh and eighteenth months of operation to see if the volume on the temporary routes justifies their continuance. The eye of the CAB will be on the results of the operation of the two marginal routes. If they are successful, as the state maintains they will be, the result could be a changed concept of local airline service.
 In the past the CAB has authorized only routes that it felt would be a substantial producers of revenue, thus cutting the Federal government subsidy. But, in Nebraska, the state took over a traffic stimulation program at Norfolk on an experimental basis. The results were overwhelming. Applying the same type of operation to the remainder of the state could produce a going network of at least twelve daily round trips at each of the 17 cities, the state believes.

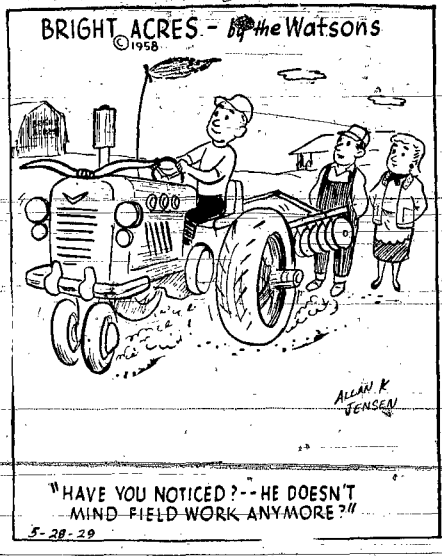

Mrs. Bowen was always interested in history, the Civil War and the South in particular since her ancestors came from Virginia. If you are interested in reading about this phase of history you will enjoy this book very much. County Agent's Column
Dairy Calves Can Be Raised on Ration of Skim Milk and Simple Grain Mixture
 Dairy calves can be successfully raised on dried skim milk mixed with water after they are two weeks old. One pound of dried skim milk should be mixed with nine pounds of warm water. The temperature of the water at 100 degrees should be the same from one feeding to another. It is possible to use more than nine pounds of warm water for one pound of dried skim milk, but the same amount should be used all the time. The solution should be fed in clean utensils.

Oats Good Silage Crop
 Your best return may be in harvesting oats for silage or using it as a pasture crop for dairy cattle. In tests conducted at Perdue university, 30 acres of oats can give 50 cows a grain ration for 50 days. Tests showed that the oats pasture should be grazed when the heads are just emerging from the boot. Oats is a palatable and productive feed for cows, whether it is used as pasture or silage. Wisconsin agronomists point out that getting the grain off the ground earlier gives the new legume grass seeding a better chance for growth. Oats compete for soil moisture, they say. Thus, early harvesting of oats makes badly needed moisture available to the legumes.
