

We Oppose Parking Meters in Wayne. What's Your Opinion?

Wayne's city council asked local citizens and customers at its last meeting to voice their opinions on installation of parking meters in Wayne.

Since that meeting we have tried to sound out the opinions of Wayne businessmen and those concerned. The majority of businessmen feel that Wayne's parking problem is over-exaggerated and that there is no need for installation of the mechanical devices.

Most people are of the opinion that parking meters would provide a good source of revenue for the city (despite the fact revenue is turned over to the school district) but that city coffers are not in need of monies by this means. They feel there is no need to charge local customers \$20,000 a year to shop in our city.

The \$20,000 figure is no figment of imagination. A parking meter salesman told the council last week the cost of the installation of meters (\$20,000) could be repaid in 24 months if his company took half the annual revenue from the meters.

To more accurately find out the people's feelings toward parking meters in downtown Wayne, we have furnished a ballot on the front page of today's Herald so readers can express their desires on the problem. We want everyone to fill out a ballot and return it to The Herald so that we may know your wishes.

After considerable deliberation and a great amount of visiting with merchants and farmers alike, The Herald has come to the conclusion parking meters offer Wayne more headaches than parking space.

A poll similar to the one mentioned above was conducted by this newspaper only a few short years ago. Its results were overwhelmingly against meters. Only one of eight persons favored their installation.

It is our opinion that nothing can ever be done in Wayne or any other small country town to park all the cars that come to town on Saturday night and park all those cars right on MAIN STREET. It is physically impossible—we folks have too many cars. We think the people who come here or to any other small town realize the fact and meters won't change it materially.

It is apparent Wayne's parking problem is over-exaggerated. On Saturday night cars are seldom parked more than two and rarely up to three blocks away from Main street. Omaha or Sioux City would brag out loud if they could get all their customers that close to the main business block.

Wayne, like most other county seat towns, experiences its worst parking problem in a short period of about two or three hours on Saturday night. Is it worth all the headaches that enforcing parking meter time limits causes, the fines and hard feelings that such fines bring? We have enough trouble trying to enforce other laws within the town. What would it be with parking meters? And parking meters are useless unless accompanied with rigid enforcement.

A city like Omaha or Sioux City with daily crowds can get away with meters without much difficulty. But in a town like Wayne the relationship is on a much closer and intimate basis, which makes enforcement more difficult.

Parking meters do not make more parking space available; they do (if enforced) give turnover of space. But, the biggest point meter salesmen make is that they pour money into the city treasury. Wayne's financial standing is one of the most solid in the state. The city is not in dire need of the extra monies parking meters would furnish.

In our opinion, the trade area does not favor parking meters. If the farmer doesn't feel that parking will be benefited, then why should Wayne undertake the proposition? What good town doesn't have some parking problem on Saturday night?

Present parking regulations should be rigidly enforced and off-street parking for businessmen and small business made available.

Another idea that has been kicked around is that if we merchants want turnover of space on Saturday afternoons and evenings, the council could easily place a two-hour parking limit in the business area on Saturday. It would take an officer to check the time. That can be done without meters and it would give Saturday turnover if that is what is wanted. It could get rid of the all-afternoon and evening roosters. Is it worth a try?

You folks who read this and wish to express your opinions—we'll be glad to publish them. We are not trying to convince anybody to think as we do on this subject. We are heartily in favor of anything that will make shopping in Wayne easier and more pleasant. We believe we have one of the top towns in the state and one of the top trading centers.

We enjoy good business relations with the people who live in the territory adjacent to Wayne. We want to make it still easier and more convenient for them to trade in Wayne.

We are sure the businessmen of Wayne have the same ideas. But we have not been convinced parking meters will help in any great way. Towns around us have meters. Why not let us advertise the fact you can still drive to Wayne and shop without paying a parking tax.

Hansen said several complaints have been received on violations and strict enforcement will be the rule. Violators are subject to court action, he said.

City ordinances specify bicycles cannot be ridden on the sidewalks in the fire district which comprises the business area.

School Board May End Contracting After Next Year

Wayne's school board Monday night served warning that it may not be able to continue contracts with rural school districts after the 1958-59 school year.

The board voted to continue the contracts in 1958-59 with district presently contracting, but said crowded facilities may force cancellation of the contracts.

Heavy enrollments in the first six grades and kindergarten will move up through the school. First grade will be split in two sections for the 1958-59 year.

The board also voted to invest about \$5,000 of school funds in interest bearing bonds as permitted under a new law, LB 351 passed by the last Unicameral permits "treasurer of any district of education to invest the funds of the district" in securities designated by Nebraska statutes.

Interest received on any investments must be credited to the fund from which the money was drawn.

Money to be invested will be taken from funds allocated to a hot lunch program in the 1957-58 budget, but not used.

In other business the board allowed bills totaling \$3,100 and read a letter from the state accreditation committee which stated Wayne High had been continued on the list of Class A accredited schools for the 1958-59 year.

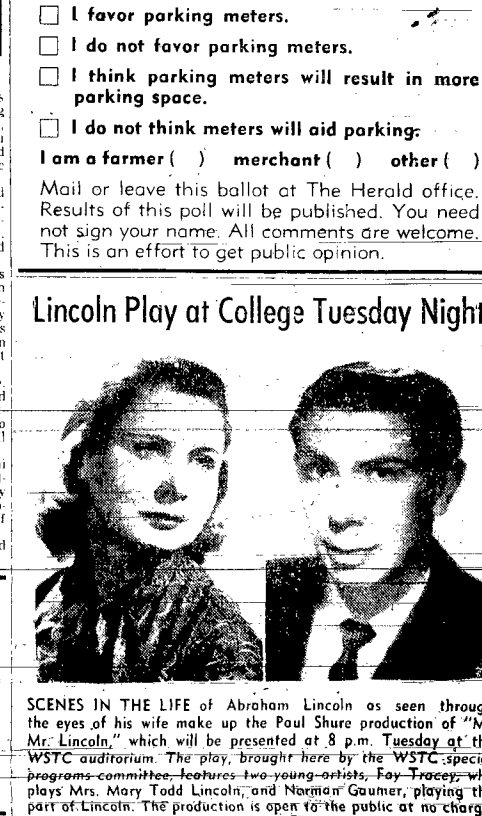
June 14 Clinic for Crippled Children

Capitol News

Democrats Have Tough Row to Hoe; Expect Stormy Campaign

Lincoln—Skids are being greased for what could be a stormy fall election campaign. Delegates to the state conventions of both parties have been selected. Republicans meet at Alliance Sept. 15 and the Democrats at Omaha June 21.

The Democratic candidates, namely Frank Morrison, Frank Sorrell and Ralph Brooks, are expected to be vociferous as they try to oust the Republican team. Sen. Roman Hruska, Gov. Victor Anderson and Lt. Gov. Dwight Burney Morrison are running against Hruska, Sorrell against Burney and Brooks against Anderson.

Brooks, a widely-known after dinner speaker and president of McCook Junior college, will probably attack Gov. Anderson on the basis of his stand on taxes. The chief executive has called for better enforcement of assessments at the local level, stating that if these are not forthcoming the state will have to step into the picture and take control away from the local level.

Gov. Anderson said he is not for this approach. He would rather have local officials handle the local taxation problems under an adequate set of state laws.

Sorrell is expected to attack the statehouse administration in general. Morrison, on the other hand, has indicated he is going to attack Hruska's record and what he terms failure to protect Nebraska interests.

The Democrats have a tough row to hoe. They lost percentage-wise in the size of the vote in the primary, while the GOP piled up a wider margin than two years ago. Gov. Anderson and Hruska are popular party leaders. This, plus the fact they are in office, are difficult obstacles for an "out" party trying to make the grade.

Democratic leaders have tried unsuccessfully to lure Gov. Anderson into a series of debates with Brooks. But the governor has declined, stating he would rather use the free enterprise available to every candidate—the press and advertising media.

Morrison has indicated he is going to try to get on the same platform with Hruska to talk about issues. Morrison did not use the word "debate" but referred to "joint discussions."

Thomas said labor unions no longer are controlled by the laboring man, but are being taken over by "corrupt left-wingers." These leaders, Thomas charged, are quietly and efficiently gaining control of Congress by selecting their

candidates in marginal districts, financing them and getting out the registrations to elect. Thomas said he is touring the country to alert the businessmen that they must get into politics to save the free enterprise system, which he said the Republican party represents.

New Air Case
Nebraska now is involved in a new case before the Civil Aeronautics board concerning local airline service. This case is called the Kansas-Oklahoma area investigation. It is separate from the so-called seven states case under which Nebraska got service for 17 cities. Service in the seven states probably will begin this fall.

In the Kansas-Oklahoma matter, it probably will be a year or more before the evidence gets before the CAB. However, Nebraska will present its case July 15 to an examining board in Topeka, Kan. The state has recommended five routes. Major steps would include: Omaha to Lincoln to Beatrice, Topeka and Kansas City; Omaha to Lincoln, Beatrice, Fairbury, Manhattan, Salina, Hutchinson and Wichita, Kan.; North Platte to McCook, Garden City, Dodge City, Wichita, Kearney to Hastings, Salina.

County Agent's Column
Agronomist Cautions Against Spraying Oats Crop Before It Reaches Boot Stage

Recommendation for spraying weed-infested oats or barley with 2,4-D come from John D. Furrer, University of Nebraska extension agronomist.

To reduce damage from 2,4-D to a minimum, don't spray before the oats crop reaches the boot stage. Farmer warns, Garden City. Earlier spraying would be justified only if weeds threaten loss of the crops.

Spraying during the seedling, tillering and jointing stages of oats has resulted in varied degrees of damage. From year to year, the yield reductions vary from 75 percent. The amine form of 2,4-D is safer to use on oats.

Spraying during the most susceptible stages at recommended rates will probably cause less than a 10 percent reduction in yield. The safest times to spray with 2,4-D are: during the jointing stage (after the tillering stage) or from the milk stage to maturity.

Light doses of 2,4-D will often kill or seriously damage garden crops and legume crops such as alfalfa and clover, sweet clover and soybeans.

Recommendations on the rate of application of the three types of 2,4-D for a specific field crop may be obtained from county extension agents or by consulting Extension Circular 198.

Side Dress Corn Now
Corn or sorghum can be sidedressed with nitrogen fertilizer immediately after planting. Fertilizer applied at any time after planting will be ready and waiting when the corn roots reach it.

Experiments by the University of Nebraska's outstate testing service have shown that nitrogen fertilizer for surface planted corn is equally effective, whether applied before plowing, after plowing, before planting or as sidedressing after planting.

Nitrogen sidedressing is usually effective, whether applied before the crop is up or after it is laid by. Thus, there is a period of six to eight weeks for the application of fertilizer for corn or sorghum. The man who waits until the corn is knee high may find it impossible to get the fertilizer or the equipment to apply it.

Delaying the application of anhydrous ammonia until the corn or sorghum is a foot or more high is not good, because the knives may cut many roots and the ammonia kills all roots within 3 or 4 inches from the point where it is injected. This loss of roots is especially serious on dryland corn or sorghum. Early sidedressing with anhydrous ammonia is advised.

Rotary Hoe Best
After you have obtained a good stand of soybeans, the following suggestions will help produce a good, clean crop. For economical and practical control of annual weeds in row-planted or solid-seeded soybeans, the timely and effective use of the rotary hoe (or other shallow cultivation tool) to destroy small weeds is basic. This may be repeated one to three times. In row-planted beans a follow-up with row-planted or two shovel cultivations will be necessary.

In general, herbicides for weed control in soybeans should be considered as supplements to good cultural practices—not as substitutes.

Orchard Spray Schedule
Control of insects and diseases of the home fruit planting is essential in production of fruit of suitable quality. In order to produce clean fruit, home orchards should be sprayed several times during the season. One or two sprays will not provide satisfactory results.

Several "all-purpose" or "one-pack" fruit sprays are available commercially. These contain both insecticides and fungicides and are recommended for those who have only a few fruit trees. Most general purpose fruit spray mixtures have spray schedules on the labels. These schedules should be followed.
