Merger of Wayne and Carroll Schools Completed, Seek Bus

District 14 Asks Talk on Annexation

Wayne school board Friday night moved to complete the merger of Districts 17 and 52 (Carroll) with acceptance of a financial report from the Carroll district. The change became effective Monday. Carroll's balance showed the school district still had nearly \$900 after all bills were paid for the current year. With the annexation, Carroll school board records will be turned over to Wayne. The Carroll board also reported that practically all summer maintenance work required on the Carroll school building was paid for except a coating of tar on the roof. No leaks had developed, they explained, but the custodian had recommended a mopping of tar. In other business the Wayne board discussed the size bus needed for the district and instructed Herb Kallmorgen to get bids for a 48-passenger bus. Also discussed were tentative plans for revamping the present school building and a proposed new building. Wednesday the board was again slated to meet to look over school bus bids and to discuss possible annexation of rural School District 14.

Wayne Soldier Narrowly Misses Capture by Reds

Pfc. Terry Wehrer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Wehrer, narrowly missed being aboard a U.S. Army helicopter which was shot down in Communist East Germany Saturday. The eight officers and a sergeant aboard the plane are now being held by East German police and the Communists have demanded full diplomatic recognition by the U.S. before the fliers will be released. Wehrer, a member of the 503rd Aviation Company of the 3rd Armored Division, was aboard the helicopter when it left Frankfurt for a flight to Grafenwoehr to fly observation for artillery units. In a letter to his parents, Wehrer said he was aboard the helicopter for part of the flight but he and other enlisted men were taken off to make room for the officers before the forced landing occurred.

Local Mother Charged for Mail Fraud

Mrs. Marian Rosacker, Wayne, was freed on \$1,000 bond this week after she waived indictment by Federal grand jury in Omaha.

20-year-old mother of two, she was charged with scheming to defraud by using the mails on a shopping swindle. Rosacker, according to the government, netted more than \$1,000 in five months with her articles from Omaha, Lincoln and Sioux City department stores. A spokesman for a Sioux City protection agency said his firm had been working on the case since the latter part of April in cooperation with F. W. Anderson, chief of the Omaha postal inspector's office. The spokesman alleged that Mrs. Rosacker would obtain a postoffice box under an alias, then shoplift merchandise from a department store, subsequently returning the merchandise with a letter claiming the articles had been given to her as gifts and that she wanted a refund. He added the refunds would then be mailed to her postoffice box being used by Mrs. Rosacker. According to his statement Mrs. Rosacker used as many as 11 aliases. The agency representative indicated that investigating analysis coupled with close cooperation with Omaha and Lincoln authorities, resulted in apprehension of Mrs. Rosacker recently at her home in Omaha. Mrs. Rosacker was totally unaware of her wife's activities.

State Board Flays Action By Schools

Public hearings on two proposed mergers of Wayne county school districts are scheduled Monday night at the Wayne courthouse. The hearings will be held in the County School Redistricting committee. Petitions requesting the mergers were accepted at a committee meeting last Tuesday night and were reviewed by the State Reorganization committee Friday. A hearing on the merger of District 12 and the south end of Wakefield will be held at 7:30 p.m. The other for Districts 50 and 68 will be held at 8:30 p.m. District 12 proposes to merge with District 11 and use the latter's building. Seventh and eighth graders will be sent to the Wakefield school. District 50 and District 12 had been contracting part of its students with Wakefield during the 1957-58 school year. A similar move will merge District 50 to District 68. The new enrollment of District 50 will be 500. District 68 will have an enrollment of 1,200. The district will be merged with District 68 during the 1957-58 term. Following Monday's hearings, the county committee must hold public hearings in days to allow the county voters to receive the proposals. The proposals will be filed with County Supt. Gladys Porter who must schedule public hearings to determine validity of the petition signatures. State Reorganization committee members voiced disapproval of the mergers. They recommended the district vote on plans to become part of districts which are able to offer a complete program for their children. The committee's recommendations were stated in a letter to the county board received Wednesday. It read in part: "The state committee voted to express disapproval of action which will merge with a Class I district a district which has been contracting with a Class III district. It does not appear to be in the interest of children to cause them to take part in an educational program less complete than that which they have been attending. It is recommended that these districts begin plans to become part of the county of children to cause them to take part in an educational program less complete than that which they have been attending. You should proceed with the hearing prescribed in the law and continue toward the completion of the mergers. Please inform this office of the final action taken by you on these mergers."

Tax Pot Continues to Simmer; May Reach Boil by Year's End

Lincoln—Nebraska's tax pot continues to simmer and promises to reach a boil before the end of the year.

Democrats, meeting in state convention in Omaha June 21, are sure to make tax reform a solid plank in their platform for the fall election.

Just what the party will recommend as an improvement is the big question posed for the convention.

There are indications some party leaders would prefer to stand on the decision of the "tax-brother" within the present structure.

They reportedly feel this would be better than a head-on endorsement of a "broadened tax base" such as a sales or income levy.

Democrats will have one eye on the decision of the Nebraska Tax Equity Council to give up its petition campaign to put the broadened tax issue on the fall ballot.

The drive has been lagging and its sponsors conceded their organization was too little and too late.

The NTEC, however, said it will continue as a fact-finding and educational organization dedicated to improving the tax situation.

It would take the form of a counter-balance to the Nebraska Citizens Council, a tax study group firmly opposed to broadening the tax base.

Touching off the latest tax hassle were statements by Ralph Brooks, McCook, Democratic candidate for governor, that he knew of two men who owned large amounts of stocks and bonds and had gotten tax benefits from Nebraska laws.

He later said his information came from State Sen. Terry Carpenter, head of a legislative council tax study committee.

Carpenter then named the men as Arthur A. Yost and E. C. Ames of Lincoln, both of whom died last September.

After checking the cases, Lancaster County Attorney David Yost filed a claim for \$545 against the Yost estate for taxes on unreported holdings.

This procedure, said State Tax Commissioner Fred Herington, is not unusual. He estimated that \$20,000 to \$30,000 is collected in Lancaster county each year from such estates.

Until an estate is inventoried by the county after a person's death, there is no way to determine the taxable property, such as stocks and bonds, that he owns, Herington explained. He also pointed out that state law does not require taxes to be paid on the value of stock owned in several types of corporations.

trouble in Scotts Bluff county. That happens to be the home of Sen. Carpenter, the governor's severest critic on tax matters.

Anderson got only 57 percent of his party's vote in Carpenter-land despite the fact that the only other man on the ballot, Louis Hector, Lincoln, did not campaign and showed a little strength elsewhere.

The canvass report revealed that Lt. Gov. Dwight Burney had the most trouble of any winning candidate on the state ticket. He nudged Challenger Marvin Griswold, Lincoln, by a scant 575 votes to win the Republican nomination.

Burney carried only 30 counties and rode to victory largely on a 3,000-vote bulge in Lancaster county.

Rep. Phil Weaver had some trouble retaining the Republican nomination in the First Congressional district. He edged Carl Demaree, tax collector, and rode to victory largely on a 3,000-vote bulge in Lancaster county.

Clair Callan, Odell, came in with a 3,400-vote lead in the First district Democratic race. However, 90-year-old Samuel Freeman, Fairbury, who was declared "unqualified for office" by party leaders, carried four counties: Clay, Fillmore, Nemaha and Saline.

Frank Morrison, Lincoln, showed statewide strength in winning the Democratic nomination for U. S. Senate. He carried all but two counties outside the Second Congressional district, which formerly was represented by his main opponent, Eugene O'Sullivan, Omaha.

Ralph Brooks turned in a 6,000-vote victory over Edwin Bosak, Lincoln, for the Democratic nomination for governor. But Dosek, a veteran campaigner, took 19 counties including such Democratic strongholds as Butler, Colfax, Howard, Sherman and Saline.

Parole Officer The State Board of Pardons and Paroles has started its search for a new chief parole officer. They will have to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Caryl Steyer from the post.

However, Victor Anderson indicated the board will not be in a big hurry to make its selection. Steyer, he said, has agreed to stay on until a replacement can be found. Steyer recently turned in his resignation from the \$5,400 state position. He will become Dodge county youth director at a \$7,500 annual salary.

Insurance Gains Nebraskans are buying more insurance. And Nebraska-based companies are selling more all over the nation. That was revealed in the State Insurance department's summary of last year's business.

Residents of the state expanded their life insurance with all companies by nine percent in 1957, the report showed. Fire and casualty premiums paid in the state increased by five percent.

Nebraska firms did nine percent more business in both life insurance and fire and casualty coverage. State Insurance Director John Binning added that "Nebraska companies, percentage-wise, are growing more than the national average."

County Agent's Column ... Unprotected Pigs Heighten Danger from Hog Cholera; List Borer Control Rates

A recent survey shows that less than 40 percent of all pigs are now being vaccinated against hog cholera. Prior to 1952, more than half of all pigs were vaccinated.

The more pigs unprotected, the greater the danger of epidemic. Vaccine manufacturers produce supplies in accordance with the demand of users.

In case of serious outbreaks there might be a shortage of vaccine. The annual losses from cholera in the U. S. run into millions of dollars.

Cholera could wipe out your entire pig crop in a matter of a few days. It becomes more important since hogs are bringing good prices. Can you afford to ignore this relatively inexpensive insurance against death?

Watch For Borers Lloyd Morris brought in corn leaves showing signs of corn borer eggs. Samples from other fields show the same condition.

Shortly thereafter the little borers will begin to feed on the leaves. This first brood causes the greatest reduction in corn yields.

Controls should begin when 50 to 75 percent of the plants show evidence of feeding in the whorls.

Recommended control materials and rates are these: DDT, five percent granular—20 lbs per acre; Ioxophene 10 percent granular—20 lbs per acre; heptachlor five percent granular—20 lbs per acre; DDT Spray 25 percent emulsifiable—three quarts in 10 to 20 gallons of water per acre.

Earlier Oat Harvest The use of crop drying equipment on combined oats provides a means for eliminating the added expense of windrowing. Early combining of oats with moisture contents of 18-20 percent has proven very effective.

Fields with a few weeds can be successfully combined and the crop dried with drying equipment available on most farms.

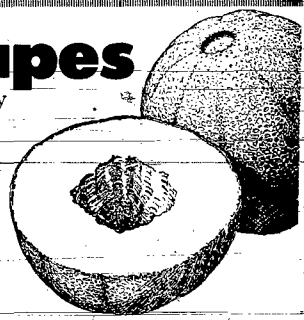

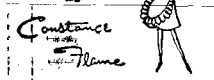
