### Reorganization Group Okays Merger of District 14, Wayne

#### Move Would Reduce Tax Levy in '58

A proposed merger of rural School District 14 with the Wayne district was approved at a meeting of the Wayne County School Reorganization committee Monday night at the courthouse.

The approval followed submission of petitions from the two districts requesting the merger. The Wayne school board signed the petition at a special meeting last Wednesday night.

The District 14 petition bearing signatures of 84 percent of the district's eligible voters was submitted Friday. Fifty-five percent is required by law to make the merger effective.

The merger proposal will now be sent to the State Reorganization committee for review and recommendations at its July 10 meeting. The plan will then be returned to the public for its approval to be held by the County Reorganization committee and County Supt. Gladys Porter.

District 14 would add \$300,000 to the valuation of the Wayne district. It will also turn about \$300,000 in its treasury to the Wayne district.

County Assessor Henry App released figures Wednesday morning on the tax assessed valuations for the Wayne district (including former Carroll district) and District 14. His figures give the combined district a valuation of \$5,693,355. Wayne has asked \$90,000 in local taxes for the 1958-59 school year. This means the tax levy for the combined Wayne-Carroll-District 14 school would be 16.07 mills. Wayne's school levy for the present year was 16.23 mills.

Commenting on the submission of the petition, Wayne Board President Mrs. Don Wightman said the merger "will not crowd us as District 14 is already contracting with us and its students are in our system."

In other action Thursday night, the Wayne board accepted the bid of the Superior Body Co. for a 48-passenger school bus body. The bid was \$3,342.88. Better appearance and more desirable features were cited as the reason for accepting the superior bid over that of United Equipment Co. of \$3,232.50. Badger Body Co. had a bid of \$3,428.

The board also authorized Herbert Kollmorgen to accept the lowest bid from district truck dealers on the two-ton chassis to accommodate the bus body.

He accepted the bid of Corvall Auto Co. for \$2,367. This was the lowest bid of six submitted. It was for a six-cylinder, two-ton chassis.

Other bidders and their quotations were: McCormick Farm store, \$2,425; Seyler Motors, \$2,632.05; Wayne Motor Co., \$2,893.70.

#### Grain Taxes Also Show Increases

Wayne county's 1958 assessed valuation is about \$26,400,000, County Assessor Henry App announced Wednesday morning.

He added that his office has still to receive railroad valuations from the state tax commissioner that will add approximately \$50,000 to the total.

The 1958 total is about \$160,000 over the 1957 total without the railroad valuation. The increase could result in lower tax levies in some taxing districts in the county.

App pointed out, however, that Wayne's city valuation will be below the 1957 total and will probably mean a higher levy.

The assessor also pointed out the new grain tax law will result in more taxes for the county than the method used for taxing grain and seed in 1957.

App said the tax on grain and seed produced in 1957 will amount to about \$14,600. This compares with \$18,300 a year ago under the old taxing method.

The new law taxes the grower for all grain and seed produced. Previously the owners were taxed only on the amount of grain on hand Mar. 1.

App said about 4,200,000 bushels of grain were reported on personal property schedules this year. This is about four times the 1,050,000 bushels reported a year ago.

Wayne county taxpayers were reminded this week that the second half of 1957 personal property taxes will become delinquent Tuesday. County Treasurer Lorna Bahde said delinquent taxes will draw seven percent interest until paid.

#### Applications for Remedial Speech Clinic Now Ready

Applications for treatment at WSTC's annual remedial speech clinic should be made by Tuesday. WSTC Special Services Director Max Lundstrom announced today. The clinic is scheduled Aug. 4-20 on the college campus.

The clinic is open to children between ages 5 and 18 who have functional or pathological speech disorders and are in need of speech therapy. A charge of \$15 is made for each person receiving treatment.

Under the direction of Dr. John Wiley, University of Nebraska speech therapist, and other University staff members, the clinic will include diagnosis and treatment of speech defects. Methods of treatment will be observed by the college remedial speech classes.

Dorothy Holland, State Education department consultant in speech and hearing therapy, will be on campus July 15-16 to screen applicants. All children will be examined and a preliminary diagnosis made at that time.

The clinic offers three hours college credit to the students and teachers in the remedial speech class, who will have the opportunity to learn fundamentals of speech correction, Lundstrom said. They also will be able to observe the specialists and work with the children under supervision.

June 30 is an important date for many disabled people. Norfolk Social Security Manager Clifford Kittelson said today.

Some disabled persons have neglected to apply under the disability provisions. Seriously disabled people who have been disabled for over a year have until June 30 to apply without penalty for losing some or all of their rights.

Those who qualify a person must have worked under Social Security at least five out of the last 10 years before he became disabled, as well as 1 1/2 years out of the last three. Farmers, for example, who first came under Social Security in 1955, won't have five years in until the end of 1959.

Those wanting to check their status should contact the Norfolk office by Monday, Kittelson advised.

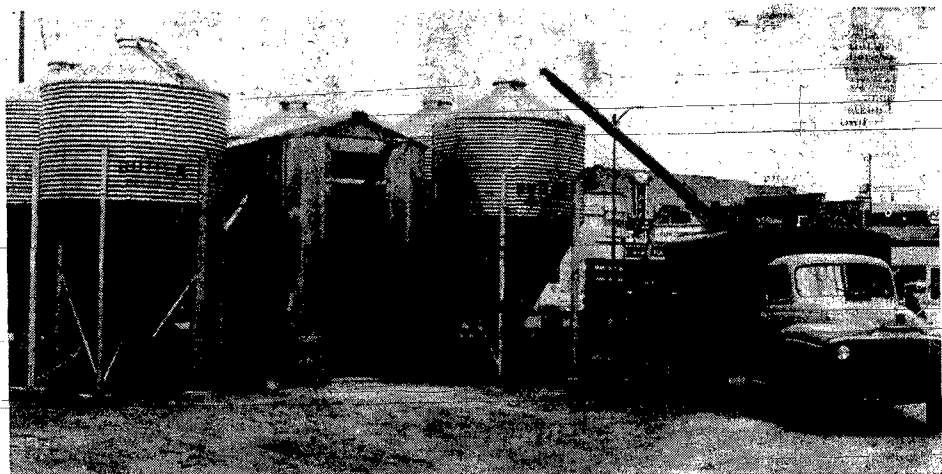

Spelts Denies Sherman Adams Business Threat to State GOP

Lincoln—Will the Sherman Adams business affect Republicanism in Nebraska?

The head of the state's GOP party, Richard E. Spelts, Jr., Grand Island, says "no," because members at the state and national level will run on their records.

Spelts says "cattle prices are high and there will be a big wheat crop. As a result, he reasons, farmers are happy and they're not going to vote against Republicans."

Spelts predicts the GOP will take 70 percent of the vote this November and that every Republican nominee will be elected by a substantial margin.

The Republicans contend Nebraska party members can, and have, cut themselves loose of national controls and be elected while Democrats claim the accepting of gifts by Sherman Adams from a Boston industrialist will certainly reflect in the vote.

A survey of the gift situation in the statehouse didn't turn up any venal gifts.

It did show that apparently few gifts are given and those of the candy and cigars variety at Christmas.

Gov. Victor Anderson says he started early when he took office in 1955 that only "nominal" gifts could be accepted during the holiday season and only if there was reasonable belief that no strings were attached.

Elected officials appeared to follow the same general policy as outlined by the governor for appointive departments.

Mentally Retarded
New attention will be paid to the mentally retarded child at the Nebraska Psychiatric Institute, Omaha.

The University of Nebraska Board of Regents, which co-sponsors the institute, received a \$35,150 gift from the Carl and Caroline Swanson fund.

The money will permit construction of a rehabilitation facility for mentally retarded children. Facilities will consist of a one-floor addition to the newly planned two-story research pavilion.

There has been increasing interest in mentally retarded children, both at the private school and at the governmental level. The 1957 legislature took official notice of the problem by authorizing the Board of Control to set up a mentally retarded residential school.

ed Cozad as the site and the Board set about immediately to determine how much it would cost to set up such an institution. Now mentally retarded are cared for at the Beatrice State home and in several private institutions throughout the state.

It may well be that if the pilot project authorized by the Legislature is successful, more could follow as an effective means of teaching those able to learn as much as possible about caring for themselves.

Also, a recent screening of inmates at Beatrice produced several who had been confined that could now live outside the institution either with or without supervision.

Officials expect more endeavor in the near future with the problem of the mentally inadequate child.

Taxes Lower?
With the jinking of a drive for a tax other than on property, more attention will be focused in the next Legislature on the problem of money.

The Tax Equity Council gave up a petition drive aimed at abolishing the state property tax in 1959 because of financial problems.

Therefore, any political battles on this question in the fall will be on how and what to do with the present system to make it work better.

A matter of interest, although it is small part of taxes Nebraskans pay, is the question of state property tax levy to be set in a few weeks.

Gov. Anderson has expressed confidence the state levy, now at \$8.23 for each \$1,000 worth of property on assessment rolls, can be cut. But, he says, it is too early yet to tell how much although he is greatly encouraged that first-year figures from the counties indicate value of property will be up this year.

If the trend continues it most certainly will mean the State Board of Equalization, of which the governor is chairman, will move to cut the tax levy for this year. This besides being practical, statehouse officials commented, would also be good political ammunition for the Republicans to use in the fall.

Politics
With the State Democratic convention at Omaha a thing of history, the political pot is not expected to get boiling again until sometime after the middle of September.

On Sept. 15 at Alliance, the state GOP holds its annual convention. Shortly thereafter both parties are expected to go after each other in earnest, building up to the November general election. It is expected the Republicans will hammer away at their record which they claim has been efficient, scandal-free and economical.

Democrats, on the other hand, probably will snipe at the state's property tax problem and possibly that the GOP had held such a tight rein on spending that progress of the state has been impeded.

Republicans claim they will sweep the state, while Democrats who can view the situation with clarity will say they have a good chance at some offices, especially lieutenant governor and first district Congress.

Keep Purebred Records

A \$53,000 budget for the 1958-59 school year has been adopted by the Winside school board. This represents an increase of approximately \$3,000 over the previous year.

The new budget includes a tax request for \$30,000, approximately \$5,000 over the request for the 1958 term.

Based on last year's total valuation, this would mean an increase in the Winside school levy of 3.20 mills. Last year's levy was 3.20 mills.
