City Water Use Sets Record; Tuesday Rains Relieve Heat

Soaking rains and cooler temperatures Tuesday night and Wednesday morning brought temporary relief from a weekend heat wave and gave a more optimistic outlook to the NE Nebraska crop picture.

The rains also partially decreased the demand for electricity and water in Wayne after new records were established Tuesday.

Hot winds Saturday, Sunday and Monday soared temperatures near the 100-degree mark. The mercury peaked at 100 degrees Monday and Tuesday.

Water consumption skyrocketed as sprinklers were turned on to save lawns and flowers. An all-time high of 1,168,000 gallons was pumped at three Wayne wells Monday, Light Plant Supt. N. H. Brugger said. The previous high was slightly over 700,000 gallons over a 24-hour period.

When a motor is repaired on the fourth Wayne well there should be no danger of a water shortage, Brugger stated. This pump can deliver 720,000 gallons per day.

Power use, too, was high as air conditioners were put into full operation. Last July's peak load of 1,800 kilowatts was equaled Tuesday, Brugger said. Daily consumption reached 28,600 kilowatts compared to the top day's total of 29,400 in 1957.

Wayne's power supply was bolstered this week by the arrival of a 500-kilowatt mobile generator. The unit was furnished by Worthington corporation while the big Worthington generator is being repaired at the light plant. The engine corporation is furnishing the mobile unit free. Repairs on the generator are also being borne by

the firm under the original guarantee.

A new base for the damaged engine is slated to leave Buffalo, N. Y. today by truck and should arrive here in a few days. Completion of the repairs will probably take until September, however.

Farmers throughout NE Nebraska received widely varying amounts of rain. While many reported a half-inch to three-quarters of an inch, Bob Thun, reported 4.13 inches on his farm northwest of Wayne and Rex Frank said a deluge of six inches fell on his farm near Allen. Weatherman Archie Wert said .66 inch was recorded in Wayne.

The rains gave a vital boost to corn, slowing the ripening of oats which were beginning to suffer from the extreme heat, and perk up pastures throughout the area.

Wool Incentive Payments Started to County Farmers

Wayne county wool producers will receive checks for their 1957 marketings under the wool incentive program within the next 10 days, SAC Chairman Carl O. Sumrell announced today. Payments are expected to total about \$4,200.

The Department of Agriculture announced earlier that the 1957 marketing year payments will amount to 15.5 percent of the dollar returns each producer received from the sale of shorn wool. This will result in an incentive payment to producers of \$15.50 for every \$100 received from the sale of shorn wool.

The department also announced the payment rate on sales of unshorn lambs will be 23 cents per hundredweight of live animals sold.

Applications for payment were filed with the county ASC office by Apr. 30. Payments will be made only on shorn wool and lambs marketed between Apr. 1, 1957 and Apr. 31, 1958. To be eligible for payments, the lambs must never have been shorn.

Deductions of one cent per pound from shorn wool payments and five cents per 100 pounds of live weight from lamb payments will be made for advertising, promotion and related market development activities on wool and lambs. The deductions were approved by producers in a 1955 referendum.

The shorn wool payment was determined on the basis of the difference between the average price received by producers for shorn wool during the 1957 marketing year and the 52-cent per pound incentive level announced in October, 1956.

The average price producers received from shorn wool during the 1957 marketing year was 53.7 cents per pound. The wool incentive rate of 15.5 percent is the amount needed to bring the average return for wool up to the incentive level of 62 cents.

To determine the wool incentive payment for each producer, the 5.7 percent rate is applied to the dollar return each producer received for wool after paying marketing charges.

Producers who sold their wool below the year's national average will get less than the 62-cent incentive level. For example, a grower who sold his wool for 40 cents per pound will receive a payment of 6.2 cents per pound. This will give him a total return of 46.2 cents per pound.

A grower who sold his wool for 60 cents per pound will receive a payment of 9.3 cents per pound, giving him a total return of 69.3 cents per pound for his wool.

Substantially the same program as in 1957 is being continued in the 1958 marketing year, which began Apr. 1. The wool incentive price is being continued at 62 cents per pound gross basis.

Each producer who owns lambs for 30 days or more and sells them unshorn is eligible for a payment. Producers or feeders who buy unshorn lambs and later sell them unshorn or shear them and sell the wool will have their payments adjusted downward by the amount of payment due on the weight of the unshorn lambs purchased.

Camp activities will include orchestra, band and choral work. The schedule provides a series of daytime group and individual rehearsals and a program of evening recreational and social events including picnics, mixers, amateur nights and faculty programs.

Coney was westbound and Wegner northbound. Coney's car was about through the intersection when the collision occurred. The point of impact was above the rear wheel of the Coney car, State Patrolman Carl Scheel said.

The Coney car, which spun around and rolled over in a ditch, was demolished and the Wegner machine was about \$400.

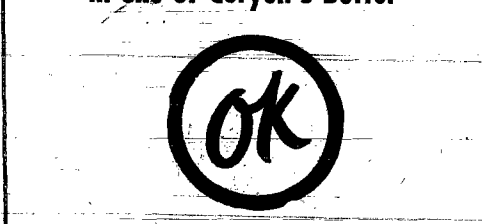

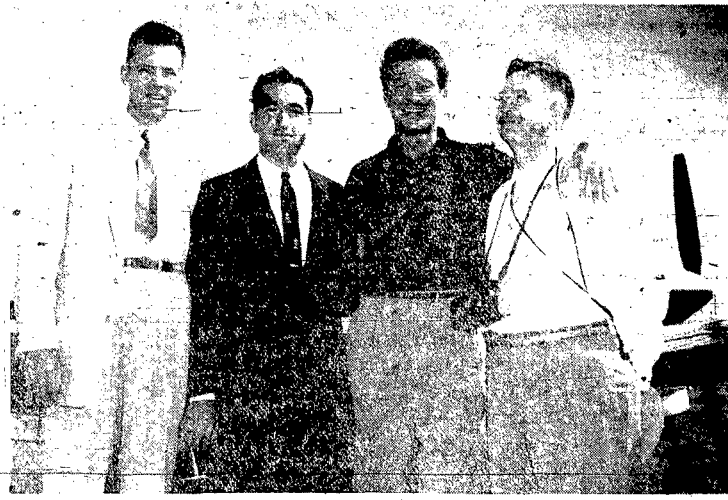
