Wayne's 1958 tax levy for operation of the city government will be 19.2 mills, an increase of 4.7 mills over the amount levied in 1957.

The new levy was adopted by city councilmen at their meeting Tuesday night. The increase will cause a \$23,000 hike in local taxes. The jump is \$4.70 per \$1,000. Thus taxes on a house assessed at \$4,000 would increase \$18.80.

The increase in the levy was required to pay off municipal hospital bonds authorized by local voters in an April election to purchase Benthack hospital. Four mills are needed to pay the hospital bonds and another mill was approved for maintenance of the

Without the five mills needed for the hospital the council reduced the levy three-tenths of a mill below the 1957 figure. Both levies were based on a valuation of \$4,880,000. This means each mill-levied




