THEY SAY THAT MOST ADULTS STOP READING because it requires too much effort on their part. Perhaps it does require effort to read a book like John Gunther's "Inside Russia," but if more Americans would make the effort the world picture might be changed. County Agent's Column

Corn Borer Infestation Reaches Serious Proportions; Need Immediate Treatment

First brood corn borer infestation in Nebraska this year promises to be the largest since the destructive pest invaded the state in Wayne county most corn 49-50 inches high with the leaves extended has 55 to 100 percent infestation now.



Presence of corn borers can be detected by the feeding signs on the upper leaves. After hatching, little borers feed on leaves for some time before boring into the stalks. Pinhead sized holes appear in the leaves, not in a definite pattern.

Early planted fields or taller corn should be treated with a recommended insecticide to 75 percent of the plants showing these feeding signs. To be effective, treatment should be applied as soon as possible after 50 percent or more corn plants show feeding by the borers. Later applications may result in insufficient insect control, especially in eastern Nebraska, where corn borers usually develop a few days earlier than in the western part of the state.

The heavy infestation apparently has resulted from a good reason for not doing so. Gas Tax Refund
 Farmers and ranchers can apply after June 30 for a refund of the three-cent per gallon Federal tax on gasoline used for farming purposes. The gasoline to be included is that purchased before July 1, 1958 and used on a farm or ranch for farming purposes after June 30, 1957 and before July 1, 1958. Farming purposes mean operations involving the raising of stock production. Gasoline used in vehicles used on the highway or for personal purposes must be excluded.

Claims should be filed on or before Sept. 30, 1958, for the period July 1, 1957 through June 30, 1958. Claim forms and instructions will

be mailed directly by the Internal Revenue Service to farmers and ranchers who filed claims last year. Application forms are now available at the county agent's office to those filing refund claims for the first time or who have misplaced the ones they received.

The claims must be sent to District Director, Internal Revenue Service, Federal Office Building, Omaha 2, Neb. Farmers and ranchers who file claims must be able to support with records the amount of refunds claimed. The return on gasoline used by a custom operator is claimed by the farmer on whose farm the work was done.

Farm Briefs
 Many cows on Nebraska farms could be classified as dependents, even though their owners can't declare them as such for income tax purposes. They are dependents because they don't produce enough to pay for the feed they consume, the housing they require and the hours of labor spent in taking care of them.

A herd of 12 cows, for instance, might produce more milk if one poor producer were culled and her feed divided among the better producers.

Farm News and Views
 LAND PRICES for the next 12 months can be expected to hold relatively stable, forecasters predict. The long-term upward trend in land prices will then resume, but at a lower rate than in the past few years.

The average value of land now is \$100.39 per acre, an all-time



high. This compares with \$94.52 per acre a year ago, \$64.96 at the start of the Korean War and \$31.94 at the start of World War II.

PROFITABLE HOG PRICES are seen for the remainder of 1958 by market forecasters. The spring pig crop report issued recently by the USDA shows last spring's pig crop was only two percent greater than in 1957, which isn't enough increase to cause any sharp drop in pork prices.

Markets next spring could be a different picture, though. Farmers say they intend to increase farrowings this fall by about 13 percent. This would cause a big increase in finished hogs on the market during the late spring months of 1959.

LOW JUNE TEMPERATURES may have set the stage for more

soft corn this fall. Past studies of the weather have shown that in every soft corn year since 1900 June temperatures have been below normal.

Early July weather also influences rate of corn growth so the next week or two may be decisive. A good way to check your corn's progress is to note the day 75 percent of the field is silking and ask your seed corn dealer to find out the number of days from silking to maturity on the varieties you have planted.

By the time the plant is completed in 1962, Holifield predicts, many new uses will have been discovered for the radioactive by-products coming from the Hallam plant. To be built by Consumers Public Power district, Columbus.

This could mean plenty to Nebraska in the form of new industry and thus new jobs and more payroll money into trade channels.

None of the new plant will be Sheldon station in honor of C. C. Sheldon, Columbus businessman and long-time power leader.

Nebraska becomes a pioneer in another field — atomic energy. At ground-breaking ceremonies this week was mentioned many times and likened to the opening up of the territory which produced the state of Nebraska.

Although the completed plant will employ about 70 men only, the industrial potential from the by-products could produce a heavy swing from Nebraska's basic agricultural economy.

Liquor Revenue
 Revenue from the tax on liquor is running ahead of the first six months of 1957. The State Liquor Commission says the total this year is \$1.5 million, compared with \$1.4 million for the same time in 1957.

Chadron Repairs
 About \$207,000 worth of repairs at Chadron State Teachers College has been given the approval of Gov. Victor Anderson. Funds from the state's institutional building fund levy will be used to remodel the heating plant and electrical and water distribution systems. The governor also will look over bids on the work when they are received.

Interstate Speculation

State Engineer L. N. Ress says "land grabbers" are at work in Nebraska along the Interstate highway he isn't aware of it.

Robert Armstrong of the Nebraska Citizens council, a taxpayer group said in a speech in Louis that speculators are attempting to move in on Nebraska Interstate. Armstrong also said there is "political jockeying" on placing of connections to the Interstate.

Ress said there isn't any of that out in Nebraska and won't be as far as he is concerned. The engineer is a member of the powerful design committee of the National Association of State Highway Officials. That is the group that makes recommendations to Congress on design of the Interstate highway.

Armstrong spoke at a Middle States taxpayers conference. He said one of the most difficult problems in Nebraska is acquiring right-of-way at "reasonable prices."

Ress said he anticipated trouble in getting right-of-way when Nebraska got into building the Interstate highway because it takes a minimum of the width of a football field for the route. "People just don't like to sell their land," he added.

The research director for the Citizens council, Leonard Bronder, meanwhile, discussed the subject of Nebraska's approach to mental health problems, also at St. Louis. The key to Nebraska's approach, Bronder noted, is training psychiatrists, which are in short supply nationwide.

Tight now there are 24 trainees at the Nebraska Psychiatric Institute, Omaha. At the end of three-year resident training, they will serve at least two years in one of the state's mental hospitals or clinics.

Bronder said in the last three years the number of patients in the state mental hospitals dropped from 4,781 to 4,391. He commented that Nebraska was a leader last year nationally with a 5.4 percent reduction in mental patients hospitalized. The national cut was 3.9 percent.

Also, the state was a leader in the field of first admissions to institutions, with a drop of 14.6 percent, compared with 3.9 percent nationally.

Bronder said the more money spent now by governments in mental health work will save tax dollars in years ahead.

Gas Collections Up
 There has been a whopping increase in collections of the seven-cents-per-gallon tax on gasoline in Nebraska. The State Division of Motor Fuels reports collections since Jan. 1 totaled \$17.7 million compared to \$14.6 million for the same period in 1957. Reason for the boost is a change from a six to seven-cent tax, the division explained.
