Market Hog Class At Fair to Pay \$300 in Premiums

Several new features for the Wayne County fair, Aug. 18-20, have been announced by Fair Secretary Al Bahe. Newest addition to the fair will be a market hog class paying \$300 in premiums. All hogs entered must go for slaughter and will be paid for on a grade and yield basis.

Entries must be made in pens of three (barrows, gilts or both). Each exhibitor will designate the market hog of his choice. Carcass contest entry and will receive \$1 per hundred weight over the base live price.

Guernsey Show Cancelled. Wayne Gilliland announced this week that the Guernsey District show set for July 31 has been cancelled.

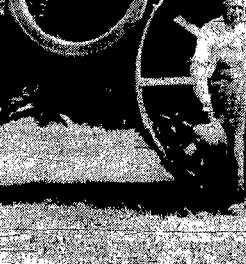

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New Tax May Be Set at 5.74 Mills

A tentative levy of 5.74 mills—a 7 mill decrease from last year—to meet the 1958 Wayne county budget has been calculated this week by county clerk C. A. Bard.

County commissioners will hold a public hearing July 30 on the budget proposal. The 1958 levy represents a drop of .7 of a mill from 1957.

This means taxes would decrease 70 cents for each \$1,000 of valuation. Taxes on a house assessed at \$5,000 would be \$28.70 as compared to \$32.20 in 1957.

The decrease was partially caused by an increase in the county's valuation. This year's total is \$26,457,335 as compared to \$26,189,125 last year. That each mill levied in 1958 will bring about \$26,457 as compared to \$26,189 last year.

County budget requirements are down about \$4,000 this year. Biggest factors in the decrease are a drop of about \$14,000 in the county's fund, an \$8,500 cut back in county relief and no asking at all in soldiers' and sailors' fund.

Only one fund is increased substantially from last year. That is about a \$7,000 jump in the road fund from \$37,391.23 in 1957 to \$44,894.18 for 1958.

Northeast Nebraska's farm experiment station will hold a special open house Sunday from 1:30 to 5 p. m. for farmers and others to view results of the 1958-59 oat drill box survey.

Dale Flowerday, station superintendent, reports that due to weather conditions, many folks were unable to view the plots at a regular field day held earlier in July.

Ninety-eight samples of oats farmers were planting last spring may be seen growing in plots at the station. Flowerday points out results of germination, purity and weed count tests will be available on each oat sample.

State Committee Approves Wayne - District 14 Merger

The State Reorganization Committee Thursday approved annexation of District 14 to District 17 (Wayne) and the first of two local hearings has been set on the proposal.

First hearing called by County Reorganization Chairman Gordon Nuernberger is set for 8 p. m. Tuesday in the District Courtroom.

This addition to the Wayne district would make a valuation of \$5,603,355, an increase of about \$300,000 over the present figure.

Petitions signed by more than 80 percent of District 14 voters were filed for annexation. Fifty-five percent is required by law to make the petition effective.

Addition of the district will not crowd the school. Wayne Board President Mrs. Don Wightman said, because District 14 is already contracting with Wayne and its children are in the system.

Earlier this year the Carroll district merged with Wayne, but its elementary students will attend at Carroll. Other Wayne county school mergers approved by the county reorganization committee—but not yet acted on by the state committee—include uniting Districts 12 and 13 and Districts 50 and 68.

All but two of the teaching posts in county rural schools are now filled for the 1958-59 year. Supt. Mrs. Gladys Porter said this week. Positions remaining open are District 18, east of Carroll, and District 73, southeast of Wayne. Rural schools this year will require 71 teachers. Only two schools call for more than one teacher. Both schools and District 28 have two teachers.

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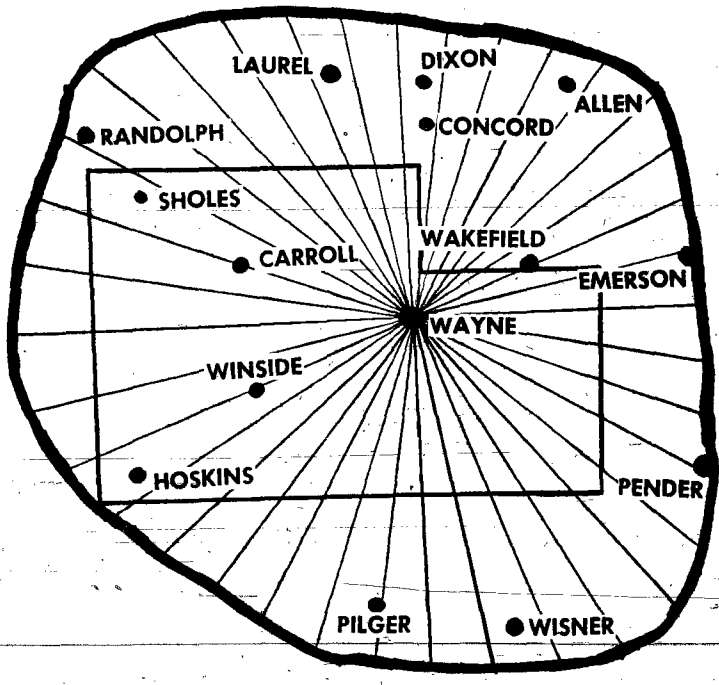

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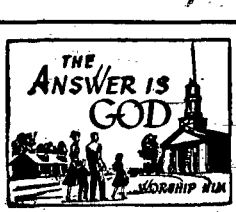

Capitol News

Many Counties Show Increase In Cattle Value; Feed Down

By Melvin Paul

Lincoln—Why is a county called before the State Board of Equalization to explain changes in taxable value of property? Every year about this time the board, which determines how much state property taxes Nebraska will pay—begins questioning several counties. Values are sent in by the county assessor on various classes of property.

From these totals, and values the board places on railroads and utilities, that the state levy is determined. The board, by law, must equalize among the counties—that is, see that no one county is out of line with another. Figures are reported to the State Tax Commissioner on sheets of paper called abstracts.

These abstracts are revealing. For instance, many counties show a sharp increase in the worth of cattle for tax purposes this year. But, there was equally sharp decline in the value of feed.

Generally, such counties would have to explain, either by letter, or by sending representatives, personally to appear before the board. Other discrepancies produce the same results—such as drops in value of farm or town land, farm machinery, business inventories, stocks and bonds.

There is no formula for determining the level of value of the classes of property scrutinized by the state board, except in the case of railroads and even that is not closely followed.

The equalization board is composed of the governor, secretary of state, auditor and treasurer in addition to the tax commissioner.

Comments Rees: "It is sometimes difficult to convince highway delegations that their particular highway is not necessarily the most important in the state. All-urgently needed improvements cannot be accomplished overnight, the engineer stated.

He puts it this way: "With the limited revenues we have, and considering the amount of work highway contracting firms can do in a year, it is rather obvious that we must do first things first—improving the most inadequate highways as soon as we can, and scheduling the remaining work as our budget allows."

New Signs There will be some new signs showing up on state highways soon. They are "yield right-of-way" signs. Use will be at state highway crossings where traffic volume is not high enough to justify a stop sign. However, motorists approaching a yield sign must give the right-of-way to the vehicle on the state

highway. Violations could result in the same type of charge as if a motorist failed to stop at a stop sign, according to the highway department.

Point Law Many Nebraska drivers commit a traffic violation and suddenly wind up with their license revoked, wondering what happened. The director of the financial responsibility section of the State Motor Vehicle Department, says there is much confusion about the traffic point law.

Maurice Jacobson, the director, said motorists do not know when the two year period—during which a driver cannot collect 12 points or lose his license—begins. The period starts when a driver is first convicted for a traffic violation. Revocation of a permit, upon getting 12 points, is for one year, from date of conviction of the last offense. The number of points for each type of offense is set by law.

Nursing Rule A public hearing will be held at the statehouse at 10 a.m. July 30 on a controversial fire regulation for nursing and rest homes. State

Fire Marshal E. C. Iverson has proposed that such homes be in direct contact with a fire department or other location where fire alarms are dispatched.

After an informal meeting with home operators, Iverson agreed to include a provision that the regulation need not go into effect until Jan. 1, 1960. Operators had protested cost of such a fire alarm system would be prohibitive.

Lot of Names A lot of names have been looked at by personnel of Secretary of State Frank Marshall's office in the last two months, the office has scanned 200,000 signatures on petitions to legalize bingo, elect the

education commissioner, and change tax payments for Consumers Public Power District. The job is a drain on manpower at the office and a tedious task. As many as six persons have been at the job at one time. The education petitions took three days to complete, or roughly 130-140 man hours.

Deputy Roland Luedtke said the number of petitions that will be on the November ballot will be a modern day record.

County Agent's Column Fair Directors Announce a New Division; Report Shows Butter Production Down

A new division for "pen of three market hogs" is planned for this year's county fair. This year's fair, coming from Frank Gilbert, superintendent of the swine show. Substantial premiums will be offered for both the live hogs and the following carcass contest.

This show will be open to all hog producers in this area. Details will be included in the fair premium lists which will be available soon.

Changing Farm Living Farming is more and more becoming a "way of making a living," rather than a "way of life." In this respect it is getting more like other business enterprises. The people who manage farms or businesses are less easily identified.

Then too these people are living side by side in newly "urbanized" communities. Farm leaders say that these trends will be accelerated. They predict that investment per farm business will continue to grow. That the trend toward larger and fewer commercial farm units will continue.

Management will be the most important factor in successful farm operation. Farms will become more like manufacturing establishments.

Less Butter Production Butter production in Nebraska during the first four months of

1958 was 13.3 percent less than during the corresponding period of 1957.

Decline in butter consumption and distance to fluid milk markets have caused a marked decline in the percentage of the nation's milk produced in Nebraska and neighboring states.

Consumers continue to find milk and other dairy foods an economical buy, particularly from the standpoint of protein. The dairy industry, however, is slow to recognize the value of the non-fat portion of milk and continues to base values largely on butterfat.

The average housewife spends about 15 percent of her food dollar for milk and other dairy products in return for about 25 percent of the protein in the family's diet. Use of dry skim milk and other low-fat dairy products is becoming increasingly popular.

Two Nebraska creameries formerly handling only farm-separated cream have started buying whole milk for a butter-powder operation. A number of creameries in central and northeast Nebraska are giving careful consideration to the possibility of buying whole milk.

Farm News and Views North Bend Farmer Uses Ladybugs to Fight Corn Borer; Cheaper than Spray



GALE WINKELMAN, North Bend farmer, is shown releasing Ladybugs in his corn field to fight off Nebraska's worst corn enemy, the corn borer. Each box contains one gallon, or about 135,000 dormant Ladybugs which become active in search of food within minutes after being released.

Gale Winkelman, North Bend farmer, has indicated a new method of combating corn borers. He uses imported Ladybugs. The ladybugs, released in the corn fields at the proper time, will feed upon the eggs of the corn borer and destroy them, according to Winkelman.

The tiny orange bug has long been known as a friend to the farmer and gardener. She is absolutely harmless to crops and according to Winkelman, the distribution of the "bug" in sufficient quantities to control corn borer infestation is done with less cost per acre than is possible with sprays. Winkelman started selling the bugs two years ago and this year noted that more than 4,000 acres in eastern Nebraska have had Ladybugs released for the first batch of corn borers.

WIDESPREAD USE of the new hay conditioner is being reported from many states. These machines crush the stem so that hay dries more rapidly with less loss of leaves.

WARMER WEATHER in early July produced spectacular corn growth. Southern Minnesota reports as much as a foot increase in four days. Northern Illinois beats this with five inches per day in early July. But these sensational growth rates are marred as the great corn state of Iowa reports the corn crop lagging in its growth behind the 10-year average.

CORN REPORTS from a leading hybrid company indicate most corn is still "green" and only "excel-

TALL, NARROW SHADES will do a better job of cooling livestock than low, broad shades. USDA and California researchers found that allowing more open area to the cooler northern sky could lower temperatures as much as 20 degrees. Additional shade height allows freer air movement. Recommendations are to build shades at least 3 feet high on the low side and preferably 10 feet. The high side of the shade should face the north.
