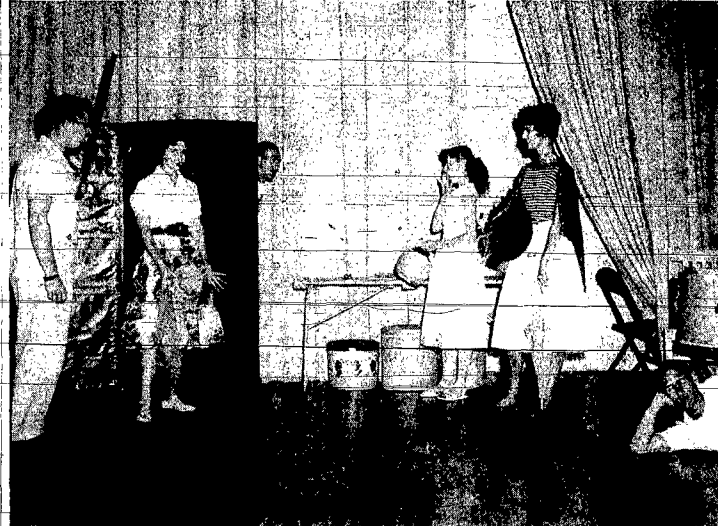

Bertha's Appointment Sign Of GOP Female Vote Drive

By Melvin Paul

Lincoln—Nebraska's first woman state treasurer Mrs. Ralph W. Hill, has plunged quickly into her new duties. Mrs. Hill was appointed by Gov. Victor Anderson to replace her late husband who died about a week ago.

One day after the funeral Mrs. Hill faced a battery of reporters and photographers in her late husband's office where she was officially sworn in by Chief Justice Robert Simmons of the Nebraska Supreme Court.

The appointment of "Bertha," as she is known in Republican party circles, where she has a long record of hard, rank-and-file work was politically significant. It gave official recognition to the drive in the GOP to place more emphasis on the role of women in politics.

An expert campaigner, Mrs. Hill will do much to attract the female vote in the November election. She has a wide background in women's affairs, within the party and in civic groups.

Two days after her appointment she sat in on the State Board of Equalization hearing on valuation of franchises for public utilities and assessment of railroad pullman cars. This is a complicated matter but she did not hesitate to enter into discussion of the subject.

She is the first woman ever to hold a Constitutional executive office in Nebraska as well as the state's first lady treasurer.

Mrs. Hill and Gov. Anderson had high praise for Deputy Treasurer Frank H. Johnson who has carried on since Mr. Hill's illness last December.

Oil Drilling
The boring into Nebraska soil for oil continued during the first six months this year, but at a slower pace than for a corresponding time in 1937. That is the report of Dr. Eugene Reed, state geologist, in a report on the reduction was not as drastic in Nebraska as in some states.

During the first Far East crisis, American oil production was boosted to provide fuel for Europe. When the crisis died down, there was a temporary oversupply. After that, Reed said, many states cut their allowable production which reduced oil activity.

During the first six months of this year there were drilling operations in 18 Nebraska counties, with 26 complete wells, of which 19 were new discoveries; 82 oil producers and 214 dry holes.

Pollution Problem
The newly-created State Water Pollution Council is hard at work in the battle against stream contamination. At its third meeting, the council approved construction permits for 11 sewage treatment plants during the next fiscal year, involving \$242,850 in Federal funds. The Federal money is 30 percent of the total cost of the projects. Remainder of the tab will be picked up locally. Priorities went to Ralston, Table Rock, North Platte, Arapahoe, Platte, Beaver City, Wilber, Omaha, Morrill, Hallam and Elkhorn. Between now and Oct. 15 priority will be given to any community sewage treatment project if its waste is polluting a stream.

Labor Payments
Nebraska will participate in a

program to provide temporary unemployment benefits to Korean war veterans and Federal workers. Eligible will be those who have exhausted their benefits after June 30. The State Labor department reported, Decision to pay the benefits came from the Attorney General's office.

Under terms of the agreement to be signed by the Nebraska department and the U. S. Labor department, eligible unemployed Korean veterans and jobless federal employees may qualify for as much as an additional 10 weeks of benefits after Aug. 17.

Intangible Property
The State Board of Equalization and its chairman, Gov. Victor Anderson, are concerned about the reporting of intangible property for taxation. Intangible property includes stocks and bonds, cash and accounts receivable. A large number of counties showed sharp drops in the intangible classification this year.

Gov. Anderson commented that taxpayers should take notice that the board is going to be tough next year on the intangible question.

State Tax Commissioner Fred Herrington said he thinks some of the counties didn't report a higher intangible assessment total because they were waiting for a stockholder's list from his office.

Each year the list gets longer and therefore it does not get to the assessors in time for them to make their report to the state. In some counties, Herrington said, assessors do not force the taxpayer to list his stocks. Instead, the assessors get his list and then add the tax amount for the stock on the taxpayer's schedule.

If that is the case, Gov. Anderson commented, it should be stopped and a 50 percent penalty provided by law against the intangible total.

The governor, president of a Havelock bank, said "bank deposits are up in this state and this should be reflected in higher intangible tax collections." Nebraska wants to be fair in its taxation, the governor commented, but state officials won't stand for evasion.

County Agent's Column
New Weed Pest Found on Deer Creek Precinct Farm; Urge Grain Examination

Observed a native pasture on Deer Creek precinct where a white blossomed weed had almost completely taken the high ground. It has been identified as hoary alysium—much like perennial pepper grass, except it continues to grow and produce seed until frost.

The best control measures aren't yet known but I would recommend that the crop be plowed and reseeded with a completely eliminated grass, plowing and reseeding will be required.

Mid-summer plantings of many garden crops can supply lots of fine eating. As early planted crops are harvested, the same space can be utilized for such things as beans, beets, carrots, parsnips, cucumbers, turnips, lettuce and radishes. Seed should be planted and covered a bit deeper than early plantings to prevent drying out. A mulch is desirable to cut down evaporation loss and help keep the soil cooler.

The quality of garden products maturing in the cool fall days is often much better than that of midsummer.

Examined Stored Grain
Stored grain including oats should be checked for insect infestation. A sample of oats brought in this week was literally alive with borers.

One hazard to be watched is that of storing new grain on top of old grain which may be infested. All bins should be thoroughly cleaned and treated with an insecticide before storing grain.

Methoxychlor or malathion are two of the recommended materials to follow manufacturer's directions for application.

Annual Ram Sale

Farm News and Views . . .
Moisture, Prices Brighten Outlook for Area Farmers

ABUNDANT SUPPLIES of feed and pasture, excellent moisture conditions and favorable meat animal prices add up to a fairly bright outlook for farmers in Nebraska, the Kansas City Feed Reserve bank reports in its July report.

Cash receipts from farm markets in the district states were nearly one-fifth higher during the first four months of 1948 than during the same period last year. This compares to an increase of eight percent for the nation.

Several factors are significant in accounting for the differences. Nebraska, Kansas and Colorado harvested record grain and sorghum crops, had substantial numbers of cattle on feed in dry lots and pastured relatively large numbers of cattle and sheep on wheat pasture during the past fall and winter.

Also, the grain sorghum harvest in these states was delayed because of wet weather. Much of the crop was marketed early this year. Furthermore, increased cattle marketings during the first four months of this year occurred when cattle prices were at the highest level at the past five years.

Although numerous events could occur that would change the current evaluation, the farm outlook for the district states is more favorable than at any time since 1952, the article states. It would take an unusual shift in regional agricultural conditions to prevent a substantial improvement in farm income relative to that for the nation during 1958.

FARMERS ARE ADVISED to use caution in the face of the midwest crisis, say economists and price researchers. When such world tensions as the present crisis develop, farm prices are often affected. However, it is too early to reach any specific conclusions concerning the effect of the present situation on farm price movements.

Price specialists have reviewed the price movements which occurred during the 1956 Soviet crisis and taken another look at commodity price changes during the Korean War. In each situation they say one fact stands out clearly—a period ranging from one month to a year or six months was needed after the first action for significant changes occurred in prices of commodities such as wheat, soybeans, rice, cotton, flax and rye. Livestock prices were even more sluggish than the grains.

Exports are much less significant to international tension except for the protein meals made from soybeans, flaxseed and cottonseed.

Based on these past situations it appears a major change from normal conditions in pricing practices would be premature at the present time.

Wheat prices began their upward push even before the Midwest action as farmers found storage space for a surprisingly large portion of the huge crop. Rains throughout the entire area were abundant and wheat is ready for harvest here.
