Prizes for the main parade entitled, "Out of This World," went to The Roadside Dairy, Winside, with its "Purple People Eater"; St. Paul's Lutheran Ladies Aid Society, second; American Legion Auxiliary, third, and Trinity Lutheran church, fourth.

Judges for both parades were William Vonderlage, Burlington, Kans., Mrs. George Noakes, Wayne and Mrs. Harry Strate, Hoskins.

Postmaster Gives Late Warning on New Postal Rates

A last-minute warning that new postage rates will go into effect tomorrow was issued today by Postmaster Don Wightman.

Wightman cautioned that regular first-class letters will require four cents postage an ounce; air mail letters seven cents an ounce; air mail postal cards five cents each, and regular postal cards three cents each.

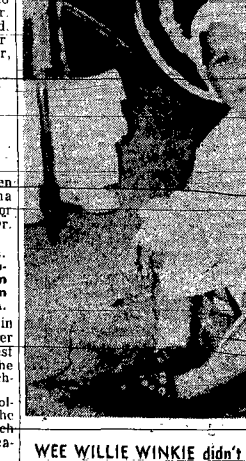
He added that if mail users still have a supply of three cent stamps, two cent post cards, four cent air mail post cards and six cent air mail stamps, they may be used by adding an ordinary one cent stamp.

Plenty of these are on hand at the local post office, he indicated, plus large supplies of all the new stamp and card issues. He added that stamped envelopes are also available, both in the four cent and seven cent air mail letter sizes.

Rescind '42 Council Act

Considerable discussion, but little action was the net result of a Tuesday night meeting of the Wayne city council.

A request by the Wayne County Public Power district for permission to erect its own line to the headquarters building in Wayne was discussed for the third time.

City Attorney Budd Bornhoft informed the council that neither he nor REA Attorney K. M. Olds was able to obtain an attorney general's opinion on the legality of granting such a request.

However, the council did pass unanimously a motion which rescinded a previous council motion passed in 1942. The earlier motion had granted the REA permission, if a headquarters building were ever erected in Wayne.

Councilman William Koerber in introducing the rescinding action Tuesday made it clear that this was not a move to deny the REA request, but merely to free the present council of any binding action by an earlier council. He said the decision should be reached by the present council solely on the merits as they exist at the present time.

Bornhoft earlier had given the council an opinion that granting the REA request was not within the council's legal power since it in effect turned city streets and alleys over to private business.

Alvin H. Herington again requested permission to remove eight pine trees located on East 10th street at the north edge of his property in Pine Heights addition. The permission was granted with the provision that the project be at Herington's expense.

A petition from residents throughout Pine Heights and Hillcrest additions asking the council to deny Herington's request had been filed at the July 8 council meeting. It was not mentioned in Tuesday's discussion.

Herington also asked the council to open Tenth street to the edge of the city limits. No definite action was taken on this request.

Another single tree also came in for discussion. Mayor Willard Wilse recommended that the council allow Herington to trim a pine tree on the terrace near his property at Seventh and Lincoln. Wilse said he had received four complaints during the past week about the tree obstructing vision and creating a traffic hazard.

City Clerk Walter Bressler read a recommendation from the Hospital board that the city buy an additional \$75,000 insurance policy on the municipal hospital. This would bring the total insurance to \$150,000, the same amount approved by city residents for a bond issue to pay for the facilities. The council agreed that the decision to purchase additional insurance should be handled by the hospital board.

Bornhoft was instructed to investigate whether a sidewalk had been laid on the J. J. Steele property on East Ninth street. A request for this sidewalk had been made earlier by Robert Rinehart and Otto Heitbold. Bornhoft was authorized to see that the construction is made as soon as possible.

A hearing was scheduled for Aug. 12 on the application from Burtis B. Smith, New Hotel Morrison operator, for a retail beer license. The council also recommended to the State Liquor commission that Smith be granted a package liquor license.

Mayor Wilse also said the city police force has expressed a need for some form of intercom system. No decision was made on the matter but possibility of use of a mobile short wave unit and walkie-talkie was discussed.

Light Plant Supt. N. H. Brugger said work on installation of a new base for the Worthington engine is stymied for lack of bolts. They are expected here this week, he added.

Brugger told the council a portable engine furnished by the Worthington firm was used to generate

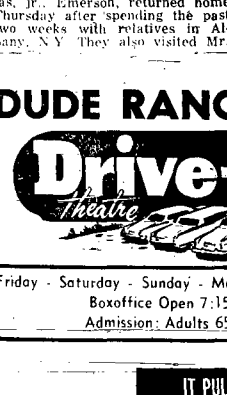

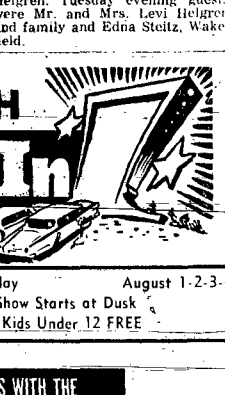

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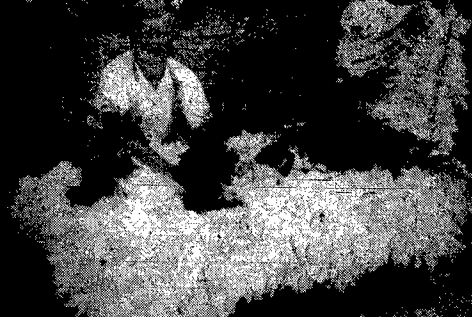

Capitol News

Government Circles Buzzing Over Blow-up on Power Scene

Lincoln—State government circles are buzzing again with a full-scale blow-up on the public power scene. The latest hassle raises the possibility that the complex and politically explosive subject could wind up in the Legislature next year. The lawmakers traditionally have shied away from the power issue. But some observers feel the problem might be hard to avoid in the coming session.

Setting off the fresh flare-up was the continuing question of which power agency will build a heavy transmission line from Ft. Randall Dam, S.D. to a load center in Nebraska.

After all agencies had agreed to the line being built by the Nebraska Electric Generation and Transmission cooperative, this arrangement was abruptly objected to by the Loup River Public Power district. Also involved was a proposal by Loup to make far-reaching changes in the whole power arrangement in the state. In a resolution, Loup proposed to:

1. Withdraw from the Nebraska Public Power system, the state's present generation and transmission agency, NPPS, is a contractual partnership between Loup and the Platte Valley Public Power and Irrigation district.
2. Pursue negotiations to create a "unified, integrated electrical system" in eastern Nebraska.
3. Become strictly a generation agency, such as the Central Nebraska Public Power district, Hastings, is now.

Behind these factors, however, veteran observers saw a more potent force: a struggle among the power agencies for domination of the electrical business in Nebraska.

This was the real reason Loup requested its earlier support for the G & T cooperative to build the transmission line, they said. They also saw this as the prime force behind Loup's plan to revamp the whole system.

Loup left no doubt that it fears the move of the G & T, made up of rural power districts, into the generating and transmitting field now served by the NPPS. Its resolution said that superimposing the G & T on the present system would only compound the existing confusion and further duplicate duties and responsibilities.

Key to the Loup proposal is the "unified, integrated system." Loup officials explain this is intended to take charge of the far-flung transmission system and generating plants now owned by the Loup-Platte partnership in the NPPS.

The big question to be worked out is who will take over the functions now performed by NPPS.

Conceivably this could be any of the existing power agencies or a new district created for this special purpose.

Whatever the answer, officials felt sure it would require some legislative action. The big problem for the districts now appears to be agreeing on a new arrangement so that a major controversy can be avoided in the Legislature.

Tax Crackdown

On the ever-boiling Nebraska tax front, Tax Commissioner Fred Herrington has made it plain that anyone caught omitting stocks and bonds from personal property schedules will be slapped with a penalty.

Herrington explained, "I find that intangible property has been omitted. I have no choice under the law but to impose the required penalty."

The field of intangible property—such as stocks, bonds and cash—is the only area in which the tax commissioner has clear-cut enforcement authority, Herrington explained. Authority for assessing tangible property—such as real estate, business inventories and personal belongings—is vested in county assessors.

First step in Herrington's "get-tough" policy on intangibles was a hearing at which seven Adams county residents explained their stocks and bonds listings. All conceded that some items were omitted from their schedules but they called this "inadvertent."

A major point brought out at the hearing was an apparent lack of understanding of listing of railroad stock. Several of those appearing said they had been informed Union Pacific stock is not taxed as it is a domesticated foreign corporation.

Herrington explained that the law states that railroad stock is taxable even though the corporation is domesticated.

The tax commissioner indicated that the Adams County case is just the beginning of a major effort to get more complete listing of intangible property for tax purposes. The incentive to list all intangibles in the form of a penalty could force an errant taxpayer to hand over 15 or 20 times as much in tax as he would had he listed all his stocks and bonds. The penalty is taxation at the tangible property rate—82 mills in the Adams County case—rather than the four-mill rate regularly applied on intangibles.

Conservation Tools

Two new organizational aids for soil and water conservation in Nebraska have been put to use. Both result from state legislation passed last year. They are:

—Appointment by Gov. Anderson of a watershed planning board for the Big Blue River valley, the first such body in the state.

—Formation of the state's first watershed conservancy districts—in Thayer and Jefferson counties. The new agencies are designed to work with existing local, state and federal agencies to protect the state's soil and water resources.

Planning boards are designed to do extensive flood control and conservation planning over a large area, involving several counties. Conservancy districts will provide the machinery to apply intensive conservation measures on a small area.

In forming two conservancy districts, Nebraskaans, for the first time have, in effect, agreed to tax themselves specifically for soil and water conservation work. Among the powers of such districts are levying up to two mills in taxes, condemning land, hiring technical personnel and contracting to build dams and other structures.

Controlling Flies Increases Daily Gains On Beef Cattle on Pasture, Report Shows

UNIVERSITY of Minnesota and Department of Agriculture report beef cattle on pasture made 4 to 5 pound more daily gain when flies were controlled as compared with untreated cattle.

Back rubbers have become popular for use in treating cattle to control horn flies. Iowa State college suggests "using three strands of twisted barbed wire or a chain 15- to 18-foot long suspended between two posts and the chain wrapped in burlap sackings. For beef cattle use either DDT or methoxychlor. Apply one gallon of a five percent solution on the burlap wrapping and retreat at two-week intervals with two quarters of the solution.

"Diazinon and malathion are the most effective residual sprays for building use. Dry baits containing malathion, diazinon or dipterex as fly killers may be used in those places which seem to attract mainly house flies.

"When many breeding places exist, no chemical can kill flies as rapidly as they hatch. Old straw stacks, spilled feed and silage, barnyard manure and litter, garbage and garden refuse are excellent harbors for fly breeding. Dead animals should be buried or removed by a rendering truck.

Flies may spread animal and human diseases and health benefits from controlling flies can be more important than the economic value.

County Agent's Column

Weed Division Fieldman to Speak Today At Weed Control Meeting at Peters Farm

What's new in weed control chemicals? What will they do? How much does it cost? The answer to these and other weed control questions can be had today at 7 p.m.

A meeting will be held at the southeast corner of the George P. Pifers' farm, 7 miles south of Wayne on Highway 15. Don Klein, State Weed office fieldman, will discuss results with the various new chemical weed killers. In addition you will see plots where different treatments were made last fall.

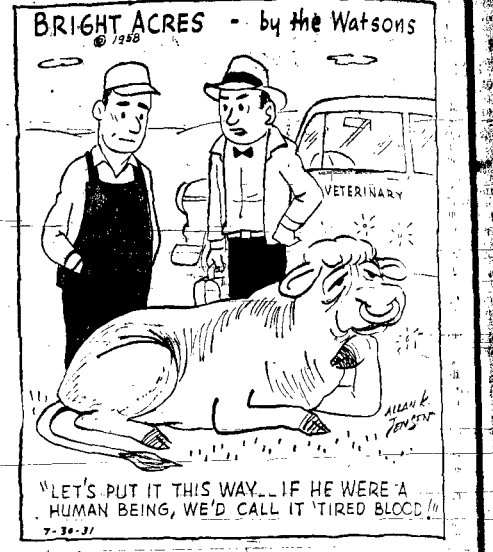
This meeting is sponsored by the Wayne County Extension Service and the Weed Control district. Everyone interested is invited to attend.

Will Chemicals Dry? Will chemicals dry grain or hay? This question comes to every year. E. A. Olson, University of Nebraska agriculture engineer, tells us that no satisfactory substance has yet been found.

All compounds investigated consist of a mixture of sodium bicarbonate and limestone, Olson stated. These are sold under claims that carbon dioxide formed by the chemicals prevents heating or molding of hay or grain when a definite amount of the compound is mixed with a ton of the stored commodity.

"There is no record of any successful tests where spoilage was prevented by the addition of these compounds under controlled conditions," Olson asserted. Several experiments with the bicarbonate type dryers and all conclude that the compound does not prevent mold growth and subsequent spoilage, he added.

Drying systems using either natural or heated air remain the most satisfactory and reliable method of ensuring safe storage of high moisture grain, Olson concluded.

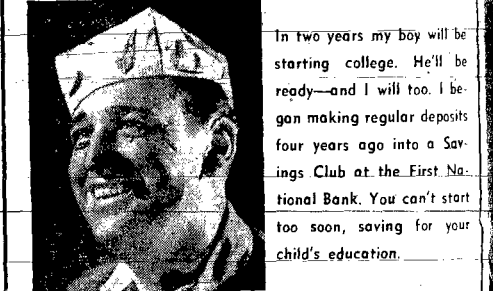
Apply materials on a regular schedule, usually every seven to 10 days. If a heavy rain washes the material off then reapply. Sprays are generally more effective than dusting. Adding a detergent aids spreading and staying in the plant.

Be sure to cover the plants thoroughly. Use the recommended material in the right amount. Follow all safety precautions listed on the container.

Painting Pays
Warm fall days are ideal for painting. A definite schedule for painting farm buildings is desirable. Most buildings need repainting every three to five years. Different buildings can be painted each year so that time and expense in any one year is not excessive.

Painting does much to improve the appearance of farmsteads, likewise they last longer. White or light paint colors and metal zinc paints work well on metal roofs and siding.

The cost of annual paint maintenance is relatively low when one considers the amount of investment in farm buildings.
