Council Approves New Main To Solve City Water Problem

Bornhoff to Get Option On Tank Site
Measures to solve problems of the municipal water system were approved at a meeting of the Wayne city council Tuesday night. A report by Omaha consulting engineers had earlier called a portion of the system in the northern section of town "completely inadequate."
Tuesday's action called for the engineers to prepare plans and specifications for construction of a 10-inch force main from the present city wells to a point near Tenth and Sherman streets. The engineers estimated cost of the proposed project at \$17,600.
The new 10-inch main would run along Thirteenth street from the wells to Sherman street and then south to a point about midway between Tenth and Eleventh.
Plans and specifications for the new main will probably be ready for the council's first meeting in September. The city will then advertise for bids on the construction.
The council also authorized City Attorney Budd Bornhoff to secure an option from Frank Gilbert for a tract of ground which could serve as a future site for a new water storage tank.
Gilbert had offered to sell the city a 150 by 150-foot tract and a 20-foot tract leading to it for \$1,500. The tract is located at the northeast corner of Greenwood cemetery. Another tract had been investigated but the council discarded it when the owner asked \$2,000 for a 100-foot square plot.
In other action Tuesday Councilman William Pfeil was instructed to get estimates for repair of the city auditorium roof. Clerk Walter Bressler reported the roof had been leaking. Pfeil suggested the city investigate applying a pitch and gravel roof for a more permanent job.
A beer license was granted to Curtis Smith at Hotel Morrison after no objections were filed at a hearing on its application for the license. The council earlier recommended the State Liquor commission grant Smith a package liquor license.
Wayne Jaycees requested use of the ball park lights for an invitational softball tourney and rental was set at \$2 per hour.

Warn Farmers of Possible Cholera Epidemic in Hogs

There is a growing apprehension among experts that an epidemic of hogs may be inviting a hog cholera epidemic which could have serious consequences.
That's the warning in a current issue of an authoritative publication, "Agriculture Outlook," which reports an official survey "shows farmers are relaxing their guard against this serious sort of all swine infections by not vaccinating."
Under normal conditions farmers now lose about \$50 million annually from hog cholera, based on USDA research. Nebraska losses last year were estimated at \$2,283,000.
Hog cholera is a highly infectious, acute or chronic disease caused by a virus. It is most prevalent in the three-month period starting in August. Farmers who ignore the relatively inexpensive vaccination precaution could find their entire crop wiped out almost overnight, the Outlook warns.
The US Livestock Sanitary association recommends having pigs vaccinated with modified live virus vaccine, avoiding live virus vaccines considered a major cause of hog cholera and already outlawed in a number of states.
A modified live virus vaccine has been developed by adaptation of hog cholera virus to rabbits. It has been brought to a degree of modification where it no longer causes disease, but retains its ability to immunize against hog cholera.
It gives a safe and positive protection against the disease. It also is given to unexposed pigs on hog cholera-free premises without antiserum. Best results are obtained when pigs are vaccinated at six to seven weeks of age. It affords protection against cholera for two years or more.

Extension Agent Sees Bumper Corn Yield As Wednesday Rains Cover NE Nebraska

Wayne county is assured of a bumper corn crop in 1958, County Agent Harold Ingalls said Wednesday following an early morning rain that totaled more than three inches in Wayne at 8 a.m.
While exact amounts varied considerably, most parts of NE Nebraska reported totals up to five inches.
Wakefield had more than an inch, York reported two inches, Randolph had over three inches and an unofficial five inches was reported at Sholes.
With this rain, Ingalls said, a bumper crop is certain. He added he has no reports of corn borer or grasshopper damage.
A few oats remain to be harvested. A big increase in the amount of barley raised in the county was noted this year with most growers reporting excellent yields ranging from 10 to 20 bushels per acre.
Barley's food value is about 90 percent that of corn, Ingalls said, accounting for the popularity of the grain this year.
Along with corn, all other crops show excellent prospects. Pastures are rated as excellent by Ingalls and he said soybeans have about the same rating.

Wayne, Winside Tax Levies Up; Carroll, Hoskins Down

Wayne and Winside tax levies will increase in 1958 while Carroll and Hoskins will show reductions, County Clerk C. A. Bard reported this week.
In announcing the levies, Bard said state and county levies show reductions. The Wayne increase was caused by a higher city levy while a school levy jump brought the Winside boost. Carroll, which showed a drop of \$35.02 per \$1,000 valuation, gained its tax advantage through merging with the Wayne school district.
Wayne's combined levy will be \$50.08 per \$1,000 valuation as compared with \$46.42 in 1957. This is an increase of \$3.66 per \$1,000 valuation. Levy of five mills to operate the hospital forced the increase in Wayne.
Wayne's school levy dropped 27 cents per \$1,000 through the merger with Carroll and District 14 schools. The merger increased the local district's valuation from about \$1,800,000 to \$5,630,000.
Winside's combined levy will be \$71.38, an increase of \$4.88 per \$1,000 valuation. The hike came with a school levy of \$40.83 as compared to \$35.20 in 1957.
Carroll's levy was dropped from \$103.90 last year to \$68.85 for 1958. The school portion of this total dropped from \$50.20 in 1957 to \$15.95 in 1958. The village levy remained at \$38.
Hoskins showed a school levy reduction to \$9.64 from last year's \$19.51. The village levy moved up to \$24.94 from \$23.38.
Bard said the state levy is a reduction of seven cents per \$1,000 valuation and the county cut is 70 cents. Rural district taxpayers will also get a cut in the free high school tuition taxes. The 1958 levy for this purpose is \$6.54 per \$1,000 valuation as compared to \$7.80.

Old-Timers Still Sought For Honoring

Fair board members this week are working feverishly to get grounds, exhibits and details ready for the opening Monday of the annual Wayne County fair.
A new wiring system to provide more lights on the grounds and the exhibits will be completed and in operation by Monday, Secretary Al Baha said Wednesday.
Livestock entries this year have been so heavy that an additional tent will be required to hold overflow of 4-H calves. County Agent Harold Ingalls said he expects about 100,000 4-H calves to enter this year.
Old-time farmers and their wives who register for long-time farming honors will each receive free season tickets to this year's fair. These old-timers are still being sought to be honored at Monday night, Baha said. Persons wishing to enter should contact either Henry Ley or Bill Richardson.
The pioneer farmers will be divided into two categories. One division is for farmers who are direct descendants of a family which has owned the same farm for many years.
The other division is for old-time farmers who have lived on the same farm for the greater number of years. In each case the farmer must be presently living on the farm.
Season tickets and reduced books of tickets for kids' rides will be on sale at most Wayne business units Monday. Season tickets cost \$1.25 per book while the book of 11 ride tickets cost \$1.
These reduced rate tickets are sponsored by Wayne businessmen in cooperation with the fair.
Baha said all fair board members and all others entering the grounds must have tickets. Treasurer Henry Ley said season tickets to be board members Tuesday night at the board's meeting.
Traffic will be routed in a one-way flow this year with entry at the north gate and exit at the south gate.
A special tent will be erected to house antique exhibits, Baha said. There is a special room for old-time farmers' items, farm equipment and tools.
Swiss Superintendent Frank Gilbert said the new market hog class show is attracting much interest. Fair officials said \$300 in premiums will be paid in this class.
All judging will be done Tuesday with the exception of the horse show which will be judged Monday. Tuesday also is children's day with all children of high school age and under admitted to the grounds free. The 4-H dress revue also is slated for Tuesday.
A full line of entertainment is slated for this year's fair, including vaudeville entertainment Monday and Tuesday nights and a radio thrill show on tap for the Wednesday finale.
Monday will be entry day. All agricultural entries must be in place by 4 p.m.
Women's open class exhibits are due at 12 noon Monday, Aug. 18 instead of 9 p.m., as listed in the fair book according to Home Agent Myrtle Anderson.
The evening's entertainment will open with a band concert at 7 followed by presentation of old-time farmers at 7:30 and the stage show at 7:45.
Individual admission to the grounds is 50 cents per person with the home family charge of \$1.50. Grandstand admission is 75 cents with children under 12 admitted for 50 cents.

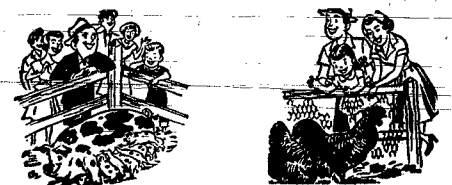

Wayne National Guardsmen Prove Worth as Men Behind Men Behind Guns

The men behind the men behind the guns of the 568th Field Artillery battalion of Nebraska-Iowa's 34th Infantry division are the troops of Service battery, Wayne's National Guard unit. This was evidenced last week when Wayne Herald Publisher Alan Cramer flew with other Nebraska newsmen to Camp Ripley, Minn., to visit their respective units during the 34th division's annual two-week summer camp. Operating with a skeleton crew of only 34 men and three officers, the local guardsmen performed yeoman service for their entire parent battalion.

Primarily, Service battery is composed of three major sections. If one can be singled out as most important it would probably be the Ammunition section. This group is responsible for procurement and delivery of all ammunition to the firing batteries. Without absolute coordination of the ammunition section the entire period could prove worthless to the personnel of the firing batteries.

During five days of big gun training the ammunition section delivered over 1000 rounds of ammunition to the firing batteries. In addition they contributed countless rounds of small arms, rocket and machine gun ammunition to the training troops. Besides delivering the ammunition, the section was responsible for returning all expended cartridges, both large and small.

It is said an Army travels on its stomach, but the military's wheeled vehicles are of primary concern to commanders and troops alike. Maintenance, supply of parts and coordination of all movement of the battalion's 69 jeeps, 3 4, 2 1/2 and five-ton trucks and all trailers was the responsibility of the Wayne unit's motor section.

Third major group making up the battery is the battalion supply section. All food and equipment such as bunks, tents, mattresses, soap and kitchen supplies for the entire battalion is handled by this unit. Even the wire which afforded electricity to the tent city was the responsibility of the supply section.

In addition to the three major sections, a final group, the headquarters section, completes the battery organization. This unit includes the battery motor pool which cares for its own vehicles, the battery "mess" or kitchen and finally the command post group which handles administrative details of the unit.

All this and in addition a normal amount of required training. Quite a feat for a 34-man unit whose normal strength is 50 men!

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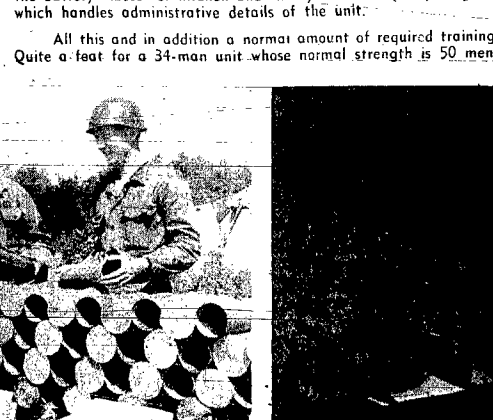
