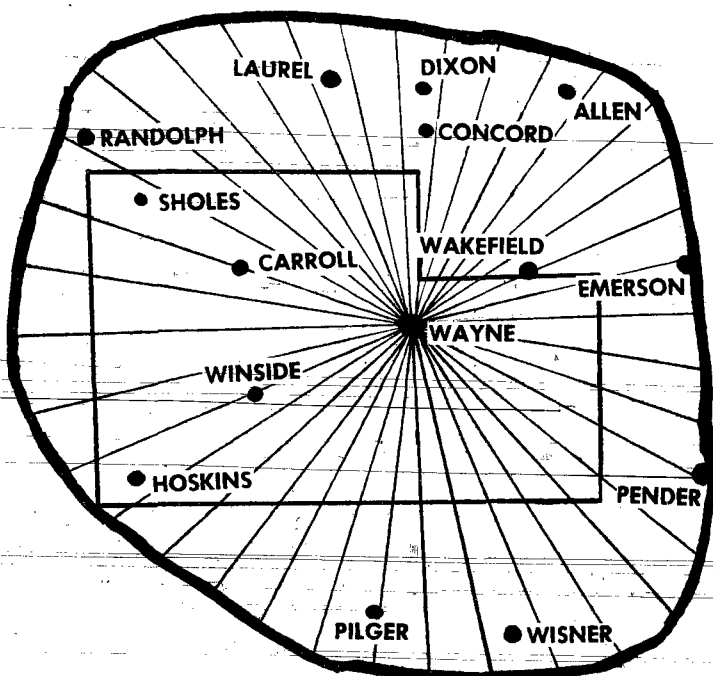

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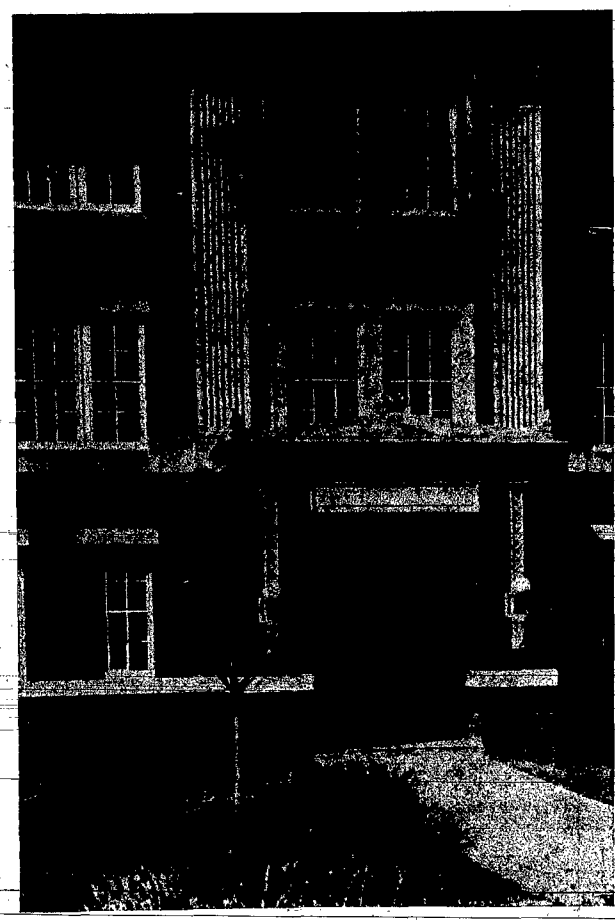

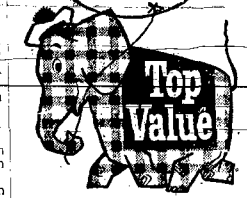

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Capitol News Population Trends to Decide Reformatory Expansion Plans

LINCOLN—Are more women committing crimes in Nebraska resulting in penal sentences? Most officials who deal with the subject say yes. But, the answer is a qualified one, because population of penal institutions for men also is up. So is the state's population. Experts say whenever there is an appreciable change in the number of persons in a state, the crime rate climbs.

The ratio of male crimes to female felonies or misdemeanors apparently is no greater in Nebraska, according to sources in the State Board of Control, which governs state institutions.

However, it is unusual for a state penal institution to become full. This happened once before in the memory of old timers in the capitol—back in the 1930's at the penitentiary. The institution was not recurrent at any penal facility until recently.

Then, it was revealed that the state women's reformatory at York was jam packed to capacity. It holds 50 inmates and by law must have one cell vacant for emergencies. Mrs. Hattie Bowley, superintendent, said there now are 49 inmates. She said she has had to turn prisoners away because there is no space.

Mrs. Catherine Martin, chairman of the Board of Control, made a personal inspection of the York institution after it had been announced a \$50,000 addition was on the planning boards. She then announced that existing facilities at the institution would be rearranged to accommodate more prisoners. The board then will watch population trends to see if an addition will be required.

Illinois Tests Show Oats Ration Brings Higher Cost than Feeding Straight Corn

CROP PRODUCTION forecasts will temper late summer prices on commodities such as corn, soybeans and small grains.

If the Aug. 11 estimate materializes, total crop output this year will reach an all-time record, topping that of 1948.

In the past 40 years crop acreage has dropped substantially. But per acre yields have increased almost 30 percent. This upsurge of productivity is due in part to the generally favorable weather this season, but rapid adoption of new technological developments by farmers has also contributed to a great extent.

HOG PRICES have remained remarkably steady since their sharp decline in July. Major reason has been very skimpy receipts. Price raisers say that, based on the increase in early spring farrowings, market runs will definitely increase soon. This will mean sizable price drops. Present indication is for a fall price low at about last year's levels.

HOT WEATHER coming in the first part of August did much to help rush corn, soybeans and sorghum to maturity. Nebraska, which raises seven percent of the national total of corn, has the best prospect for years. If hot weather continues this month the year's total corn crop could break all records. The highest corn production was in 1948 when a record of 3,600,000,000 bushels was set.

Miss Thieme will be paid \$5,000 per year. The board has hired two other teachers and expects to employ also house parents, a cook and janitor for the school. Children will go to school five days a week, with 10 of the 30 returning to nearby homes daily. The other 20 will be

AND SPEAKING OF STIMULATING BOOKS, We would like to recommend the July Book-of-the-Month selection, "The King Must Die," by Mary Renault. One reason we have not written about it sooner in this column is that your librarian didn't get around to reading it until last week. Several times she picked it up, thinking of early Greece and the casting aside for something else. Perhaps it was the title or because it was a story of early Greece and its civilization, the main character being Theseus, hero of one of the earliest myths or fairy tales. Now that you know this much about the book is your reaction what mine was? Don't be misled for this is no dry story of early Greek heroes and gods. Read it and you will be transported back to a civilization unknown to most of us: It is a piece of historical reconstruction that has the fascination of a detective story, as each bit of the jigsaw puzzle fits into place. Reading it you will feel yourself living in a palace in ancient Greece. It never has an archaic flavor and is more vividly to life. It has more thrills than a western, more bloodshed than a war novel and more horror than any story about a bull fight in Mexico. Both men and women should like it and for young people it can make their ancient history really live.
