10 New Faculty Members Will Join Teaching Staff This Fall

WSTC Term Opens Sept. 8

Ten new faculty members will join the WSTC teaching staff when the college opens for the fall semester Sept. 8, President W. A. Brandenburg said today. A general meeting of all faculty will be held Sept. 6.

The new faculty and their teaching fields are: Dr. Clarence A. Stern, history and political science; Dr. Helen J. Russell, speech and dramatics; Dr. Eugene Helm, music; Mrs. Sally Helm, school librarianship; Russell K. Young, physical education; Dick Manley, publicity and English; Robert G. Johnson, speech; Glenn Hinsdale, Wayne Pres. science and mathematics; and Mrs. Rachel Doughty and Mrs. Mary Van Horn, elementary supervisors.

Dr. Stern comes to Wayne from Michigan, where he had 12 years teaching experience. He fills the vacancy left by the resignation of Verna Eifson. Dr. Russell, who is being added to the speech and dramatics staff, comes to Wayne from Denver.

Dr. Helm will replace Benjamin Bernstein as assistant professor of music. Bernstein is taking a year's leave of absence to do advanced work on his doctorate. He has taught in Louisiana public schools and colleges and has extensive experience as violinist in civic symphony orchestras. Mrs. Helm will replace Mrs. Elinor Volk Messerschmidt as assistant librarian. She is currently staff consultant and department head for the Dakota Ex. public library.

Young comes to Wayne from Ripon, Wis., college as head football and baseball coach and assistant professor of physical education. He assumed his duties Aug. 15, replacing Barney Lovell, who resigned to become assistant football coach at Mankato, Minn. STC.

Manley will join the WSTC staff in the division of languages and as news bureau director. He comes to Wayne from Alliance, where he has been managing editor of the Daily Times-Herald. He fills the vacancy left by the retirement of J. Q. Owen.

Johnson, who fills the position left by the resignation of C. Lloyd Shubert, comes to Wayne from Au Sable, Colo., public schools. He was formerly principal professionally as Nina Youshkevitch, was formerly prima ballerine with the Ballet Russe and prima danseuse with the Metropolitan Opera company.

Hinsdale will succeed Howard Prouse at Wayne Prep. He has taught in Nebraska schools six years and did graduate work on a National Science foundation fellowship.

Mrs. Doughty will be Prep third grade supervisor replacing Mrs. Helen James, who is moving into the junior high school. Mrs. Doughty has taught elementary schools 18 years.

Mrs. Van Horn will be second grade supervisor succeeding Coral Stephens, who resigned to accept a position in Illinois. Mrs. Van Horn comes to Wayne from the Wichita, Kan. public schools.

City Council to Supervise Own Main Extension

Wayne's city council has decided to supervise a water problem in the northwest section of town by having a new main constructed under its own supervision.

The council action followed a quotation on fees from an Omaha consulting engineers firm. The quotation was nine percent of the total cost of the project, estimated earlier at about \$17,000.

The project contemplated by the city will be a new 10-inch water main from the city wells to a junction with a four-inch main at Twelfth and Sherman streets.

At a meeting Tuesday night the council decided to forego purchase of a site for any future new water storage tank. Land for such a purpose had been offered to the city by Frank Gilbert and Roy Daniels. Discussion on the matter Tuesday centered around the possibility of future construction of a new tank on the same site as the present one.

Light Plant Supt. N. H. Bygger told the council the Worthington engine being repaired will probably be ready to resume operation in about three weeks. A new base is being installed on the engine by a manufacturing firm after the original cracked within the original warranty period.

The council also discussed possibility of raising the occupation tax for public utility companies in the city. The current rate is \$2 per day.

Social Security Manager Explains Partial Benefits

Some workers over retirement age may not be receiving Social Security payments to which they are entitled, according to Clifford Kittelson, manager of the Norfolk Social Security office.

Most workers seem to realize they may receive benefits if they earn \$1,200 per year or less. However, those who earn between \$1,200.01 and \$2,000 per year may be eligible for some payments.

Workers past retirement age who have had enough work covered by Social Security and who are not currently earning over \$2,000 per year should contact the Social Security office, Kittelson said. By applying now they may be able to receive one or more months' benefits based on estimation of earnings for the year.

Some workers may receive benefits even if earnings are over \$2,000. A self-employed person may receive benefits regardless of earnings in months that he does not work in his business. A wage earner may receive benefits regardless of total earnings during a period of months in which he earns \$80 or less.

Teen-Age Driver's License Renewals to Start Tuesday

Wayne county teen-age drivers will start renewals of their probationary driver's licenses Tuesday. County Treasurer Leona Bahde reminded this week.

The treasurer said all such licenses issued between Sept. 1, 1957 and Aug. 31, 1958 will expire Monday. They must be renewed between Sept. 2 and Oct. 31 or they will lapse.

Miss Bahde also reminded youths who have become 20 since receiving their probationary licenses in the past year. They also must renew their licenses at this time, but will be issued a regular license.

Probationary licenses, good for one year only, are issued to drivers 16 through 19 years of age. Individuals who let their licenses lapse will be required to appear before a license examiner to retake driving tests. The renewal period also applies to drivers in the service.

Oct. 10 Final Date to Ask Rate on Farm

A step-by-step description of how a farmer can put all or part of his land in the 1959 conservation reserve of the soil bank was given here today by County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell.

He emphasized that the first and most important step is for a farmer to ask the county ASC committee to establish a minimum annual payment rates for his farm.

At the same time, the farmer should furnish the committee with a description of acreage and yields for his farm and an estimate of the value of his land. The deadline for farmers to request rates be established for their farms is Oct. 10.

The farmer then decides how much erosion he wants to put in the conservation reserve, how long he wants his contract to run and the rate of annual payment at which he will offer his land.

He enters his information on the application form. The application must be returned to the county ASC committee on or before Oct. 24, the deadline for filing applications.

In connection with the filling out of this application Chairman Sundell pointed out that a farmer may offer to put land in the conservation reserve at less than the maximum annual payment rate established for his farm.

He stressed that this could be a particularly important step, primarily in accepting applications will be given to farmers who make the best offers. Thus, the farmer who offers land at less than the maximum rate set for his farm will have a better chance of having his application accepted.

Contracts will be offered to farmers after the deadline for returning applications to the county ASC committee. Before a contract is concluded, someone from the ASC office will visit the farm and examine it for eligibility and measurement of acreage.

Where only part of the cropland of a farm is offered for the reserve the land will be examined to determine if it is substantially as productive as the average of all cropland on the farm.

Then, Sundell said, the contract is ready for the signature of the farmer and the approval of the county ASC committee.

Those who do not participate in the conservation reserve who have cropland which is regularly used for cultivated crops or tame hay.

Eligible land includes: (1) Any land from which a crop was harvested or which was in regular crop rotation in 1958; and (2) land from which tame hay was harvested for hay or silage in either 1957 or 1958. Tame hay is defined as "a stand of perennial grasses or legumes normally established for hay or land preparation and feeding."

Non-eligible land includes: (1) That planted to small fruits, vineyards, nursery stock, orchard or nut trees and land between rows of these crops; (2) land owned by the Federal government or a corporation wholly owned by the Federal government; and (3) land now or ever open pasture, range, woods or in the farmstead.

In Wayne county Chairman Sundell said the smallest amount of land that can be placed in the conservation reserve is five acres. If the entire acreage to be put in the program is to be planted to forest trees, however, as little as two acres may be planted.

Voters to Decide Fate of Nine Amendments in Fall

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first of a series of ten articles being published to inform voters about the nine proposals to amend the constitution of the State of Nebraska which will appear on the ballot at the general election in November. It is a service of the state press association.)

Nebraska voters will become legislators when they step into the voting booths in November. They will be asked to approve or disapprove nine proposals to amend the state constitution. Now, you may ask, why must we vote on these amendments? And further, why do they keep changing?

The state constitution is the basic law of Nebraska. It is the document from which all other state and local laws derive their authority. Only the voter can change the constitution. The record shows, too, that Nebraskans do not consider their state constitution as something fixed and unalterable. They wish to keep abreast of changing times and conditions.

The present constitution was approved by the people in 1875. In 1912 a constitutional convention resulted in 41 amendments. No convention has been held since then, so instead of a general revision such as we had in 1919-20, we have attempted to keep the constitution "up to date" by amending it piecemeal, according to Dr. Jack Rodgers, director of the Nebraska Legislative Council.

For example, since 1920 voters have approved 20 amendments to the constitution, 12 of them since 1952. Since 1951 the Legislature has considered 182 requests to place amendments on the ballot. In the last session, for instance, 16 bills proposing amendments were introduced, but only seven were considered necessary three-fifths vote of the senators to place it on the ballot. The voters may also place amendments on the ballot by circulating initiative petitions and securing the necessary number of valid signatures of voters. Two such amendments appear on the November ballot.

The amendments on the November ballot must meet two conditions to become a part of the basic law of Nebraska: A majority of the voters voting on the proposal must approve and the vote in favor of each amendment must equal 35 percent of the total votes cast at the election.

Just how are voters being asked to amend the constitution next November?

There are two initiative petitions. The first one, on the ballot authorizes the Legislature to impose a five percent tax on the annual gross revenue derived by public power corporations selling electricity at retail in villages and cities. This tax revenue would be in lieu of all other state and local taxes, with certain exceptions: Public power corporations are not taxable, but

have been making payments in lieu of taxes.

The second initiative petition would authorize the Legislature to license and regulate bingo games conducted by non-profit organizations.

Generally, by general title, here are several amendments placed on the ballot by the last session of the Legislature.

(1) Exempts members of certain types of state boards and commissions from the present constitutional requirement that executive officers reside at the seat of state government in Lincoln.

(2) Authorizes the Legislature to clear property titles by releasing real property from tax and assessment charges when they remain unpaid for fifteen years or longer.

(3) Authorizes the Legislature to provide for succession to the office of governor when neither the lieutenant governor nor the speaker of the legislature is capable of performing the duties of the office.

(4) Authorizes the Legislature to establish separate corporations to provide for succession to the office of governor when neither the lieutenant governor nor the speaker of the legislature is capable of performing the duties of the office.

(5) Increases the salary of members of the Legislature.

(6) Authorizes the Legislature to establish separate corporations to be known as juvenile courts.

(7) Allows the Legislature to authorize cities or villages to acquire, own and lease real and personal property to manufacturing, industrial and commercial enterprises and to issue revenue bonds to pay for the costs.

Wayne county landowners will elect two supervisors of the Wayne County Soil and Water Conservation district in a Sept. 19 election. Terms of Albert Watson, Wayne, and Alden Johnson, Wakefield, will expire. The two elected in next month's ballot will serve four-year terms.

Watson and Johnson have both been nominated for re-election. Other candidates for the posts are Herbert Hilkemann, Randolph; Richard L. Jones, Hoskins; Paul Stevers, Wayne; and Alvin Sundell, Wakefield.

County Agent Harold Ingalls is the district election officer. All persons first and last names who hold title to any lands within the boundaries of the district are eligible to vote in the election. Non-resident land owners or those who wish to vote by mail may apply in person or in writing to Ingalls requesting a ballot.

Polling will be held at Ingalls' office at the Wayne courthouse from 8:30 a. m. to 5 p. m. Sept. 19.

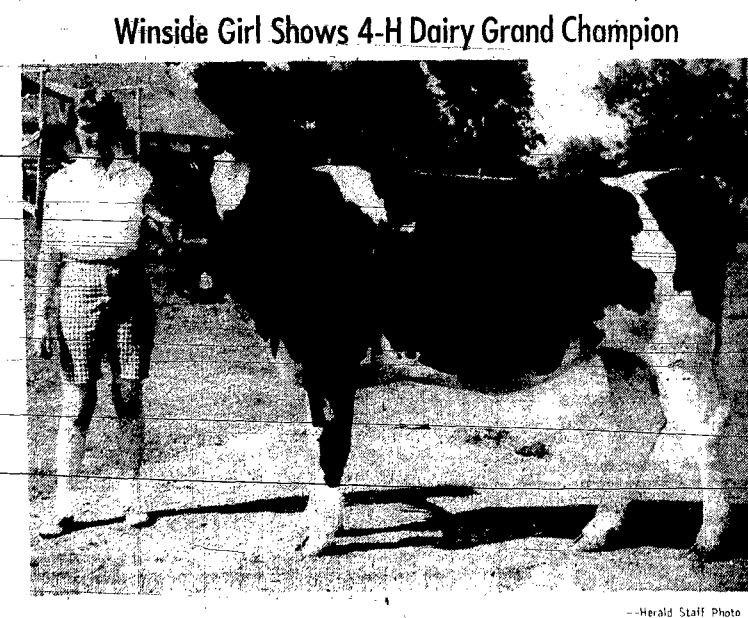

The banks include First National and State National, Wayne; Farmers State, Carroll; Winside State, Winside; and Commercial State, Hoskins.

Rain again sprinkled Wayne county, dropping 25 inch Saturday and 33 inch Monday. The week's rains brought total August rainfall to 5.3 inches and made an accumulating total for the year of 20.34 inches.

Crops still have excellent prospects, Assistant County Agent Everett Rieck said, although a check should be made now for any borers damage. Airplane spraying is the only effective method now for controlling borers, Rieck said, and should be done by Sept. 1.

Thorny Taxation Question Is Facing Legislative Session

Lincoln—A biennial problem will be facing the 1959 Nebraska Legislature. It is the thorny question of taxation.

Among those seeking revision will be Gov. Victor Anderson. The governor has said he favors local control of property assessments.

The governor said he was thinking of submitting to the state a tax favor at the local level. Now, unless stock and bonds are involved, Tax Commissioner Fred Harrington is powerless to act.

A case was filed claiming property must be assessed at 100 percent of its actual value and that this was not being done.

As chairman of the State Board of Equalization, Gov. Crosby had to comply. The result was sweeping increases in tax bills for nearly all Nebraskans.

Dry Period Care Is Important Factor in Future Milk Production of Dairy Cows

Farmers should take a break in the morning and afternoon the same as city workers do. These breaks reduce the possibility of accidental deaths and injuries and improve working efficiency.

The highest percentage of farm work accidents occurs during the late morning and mid-afternoon hours. If you are driving a tractor, it's best to stop for a few minutes and walk around.

Farm wives can help by taking a mid-morning and mid-afternoon snack to the field so their husbands will interrupt the routine of field work.

Mom can take the youngsters along to the field to watch dad operate the machines they find so fascinating. This is a safe way to satisfy the children's curiosity and gives them something to look forward to every day.

Dry Period Care The care a cow receiving during the dry period is reflected in her following lactation. The dry period has four important functions:

1. Rest for the milk secreting organs.

2. Permit the nutrients in the feed to develop the fetus.

3. Permit the cow to replenish her mineral supply.

4. Give the cow a chance to build up a reserve body fat.

en. Such a pasture should be conveniently located where the animals may be checked at least twice a day. When calving time approaches, it may be necessary to massage the cow's udder if it becomes extremely congested. A mixture of one-half cod liver oil and one-half ethyl alcohol makes a good rubbing compound. Milking cows or heifers prior to freshening has not been found to be beneficial in very many cases.

Farm News and Views . . . Tranquilizers Reduce Cattle Shrinkage As Much as 50 Percent, Researchers Say

TRANQUILIZERS have reduced shrinkage in cattle as much as 50 percent, agricultural researchers said recently. To date only one tranquilizer has been approved by the Food and Drug administration for use. It's called Trilafon. Besides the advantage of reduced shrink in shipment, it will help keep cattle quiet while adjusting to a new home.

Trilafon must be administered by a veterinarian and cannot be used on cattle that are being shipped to slaughter. Costs are running about \$1 per head in most areas.

INCREASING TRACTOR tire size, without increasing weight will help keep cattle quiet while adjusting to a new home. The only exceptions may be in extremely soft ground or in sand. If you're planning to buy new oversized tires figure that you will also need more weight to get increased traction.

LIGHT FEEDER CATTLE calves are a safe investment even at today's high prices, report the majority of farm managers. Lush pasture and cheap feed can be used to good advantage in reducing the cost of these cattle between now and late fall.

Also, with smaller cattle you have the advantages of putting a great deal of homegrown feed into the stock, plus the fact that you have more ways of handling them in feeding out. The prospect of continued market weakness for the next couple of months causes managers to stay clear of big, fleshy cattle for a short feed.

ABUNDANCE OF RAINFALL in July in Nebraska was almost unbelievable for the formerly drought-ridden state. The rainfall averaged more than four inches above normal with the eastern half reporting totals ranging from six to 12 inches. By contrast, back in 1955, much of Nebraska received 16 inches of rainfall in a whole year. The July rainfall in that year was mostly less than two inches.

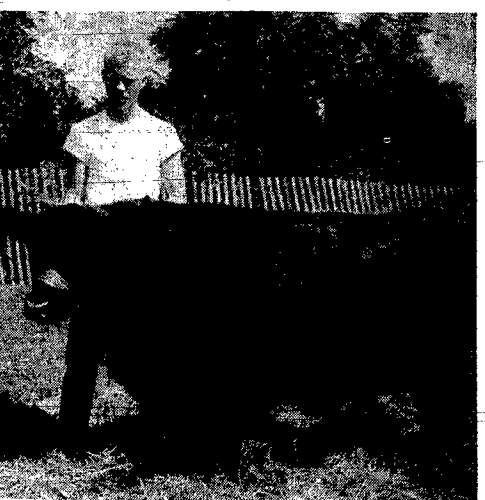

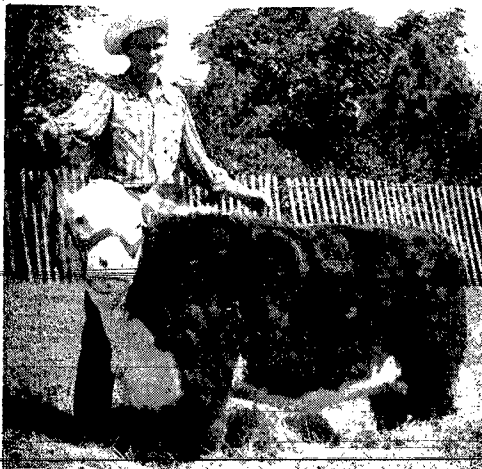

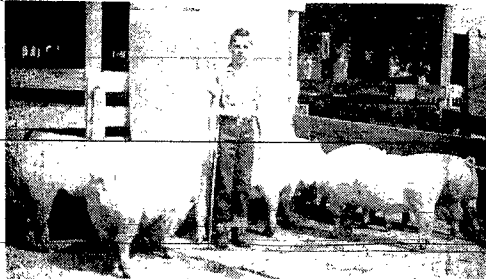
