Nominations Open For Vacancies at Military Schools

Nominations are now open for two vacancies at the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Md., and two others at the U.S. Military Academy, West Point, Congressman R. D. Harrison announced this week.

The Third district representative said nominations must be made between now and Oct. 15.

Eligible candidates must be district residents and must have graduated or be assured of graduation from high school not later than the spring of 1959.

Age requirements for the Naval Academy are 17-21. Those for the Military Academy are 17-22.

Preliminary competition for the nominations will include a Civil Service commission examination in mid-November. Successful candidates will be eligible for entrance in the academies in the summer of 1959.

Power Amendment Doesn't Involve Rural Electricity

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of a series of ten articles being published to inform voters about the nine proposals to amend the constitution of the State of Nebraska which will appear on the ballot at the general election in November.

About two decades ago when private power generating and distribution properties in Nebraska were converted into publicly-owned systems, State and local government in Nebraska faced a serious decline in tax revenue.

This was because publicly-owned property was not taxable. Power districts which had taken over production systems, however, voluntarily agreed to meet the public's obligation by making payments in lieu of taxes. Subsequently the Legislature formalized this voluntary procedure by passing an act which substituted a tax of five percent upon the gross annual revenue derived from the sale of electricity at re-

tail in villages and cities of the state. Primarily this involves the Consumers' Public Power district and the Omaha Public Power district and other power districts and power generating districts are not involved except in a few isolated instances where they sell directly at retail in villages and cities. Taxes or electricity to rural customers is not involved.

The five percent tax, however, is expected to produce annually the same revenue that the State and local governments now receive in lieu of taxes. The amendment provides that these additional funds will also be distributed to the various agencies and departments on a pro-rata basis as determined by their property tax mill levies.

The five percent tax on gross annual revenue of village and city electricities would exclude all other taxation except motor vehicle taxes and property taxes; permit cities, gasoline tax and other taxes to be levied against the public generally. The amendment terminates all payments made in lieu of taxes, franchise payments, occupation and certain excise taxes.

The initiative petitions were primarily sponsored by the Consumers' and Omaha power districts. Spokesmen for these districts say the revenue tax will not increase power rates in the foreseeable future. If the amendment is approved, they say, the question of the constitutionality of the legislative act requiring payments in lieu of taxes will be resolved.

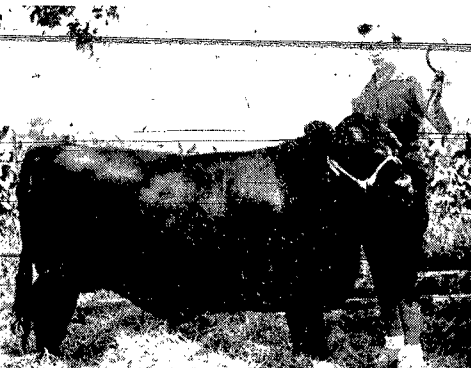

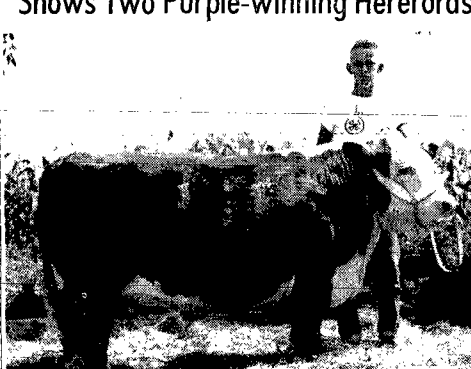

Capitol News

Nebraskans Likely to Witness Liveliest Campaign in Years

Lincoln—With the close of this year's session of Congress, the starting gun officially sounded for the 1958 election campaign. Before the Nov. 3 vote, Nebraskans are likely to witness the liveliest politicking in many years.

This outlook stems from the fact Democrats in the state have fielded an attractive, hard-working corps of candidates. At the same time Republicans appear to be better organized than ever and eager to do battle.

As the campaign began in earnest, taxes continued to be the dominant issue in the state. Democratic candidate for governor, Ralph Brooks, McCook, has scarcely let up in his attack on what he calls Gov. Victor Anderson's lack of vigorous enforcement of tax laws.

The big question now seems to be whether a stepped-up tax enforcement program by Anderson and State Tax Commissioner Fred Herrington can blunt the Democratic barbs. Herrington made it clear he will not initiate any course of action open to imposing penalties on persons omitting intangible property, such as stocks and bonds, from their tax schedules.

For the first time in his 3 1/2 years in office, Gov. Anderson called for the major changes in state tax laws. He suggested legislation allow the state to step in when local taxing officials fall down on the job. Democrats considered these actions with charges that they were prompted only by the Democrats' harping on the issue.

Most energetic campaigner so far has been Frank Morrison, Lincoln attorney and Democratic candidate for the U. S. Senate. Morrison worked hard before the primary election in May and has hardly eased up.

Morrison's open opponent, Sen. Roman Hruska is considered one of his party's strongest campaigners. His return from Washington sets the stage for one of the hottest senatorial races in years.

Morrison thus far has built an issue for his contention that Hruska has deserted President Eisenhower and has formed a "splinter party" within the GOP. Donald Ross, Omaha, Republican national committee member, replied that an "honest difference of opinion" exists between Hruska and Eisenhower.

Morrison has openly invited support from liberal Republicans and has urged a return to the principles of the late Sen. George Norris.

Farm conditions appear to hold the key to elections in the three Congressional districts outside of the Omaha area. A record breaking crop outlook, an favorable prices for livestock have given the Republican incumbents a boost, observers feel. Democrats contend, however, that the state's representatives have failed to deal with the long range farm problem and that a new farm bill passed this year will lead to greater overproduction and a disastrous drop in livestock prices.

One of the nation's top Democratic extravaganzas of the year, scheduled in Omaha Sept. 11-13, is expected to bolster the party in Nebraska. Present will be an all-star team of Democrats headed by former President Harry Truman, Sens. John Kennedy, Estes Kefauver, Hubert Humphrey and a number of congressmen and governors from the Midwest.

Nebraska Republicans will answer with their state convention at Alliance Sept. 15. An impressive list of top GOP leaders, including Vice President Richard Nixon, Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson and Secretary of Interior Fred Seaton, are scheduled to stump in Nebraska during the campaign.

Proposed Amendments

Livening up the Nov. 4 ballot will be nine more proposed constitutional amendments, a record number in recent years. Controversy already is being generated

Nebraska-Alaska

Alaska now is the forty-ninth state in the Union and Hugo F. Srb has his way. It will include a touch of Nebraska. Srb, clerk of Nebraska's unicameral legislature, suggested to the governor of Alaska that the new state adopt the one-house legislature. This would be a good time to initiate the unicameral system, Srb wrote Gov. Mike Stepovich, "since your state will be making changes soon in its form of government."

Capitol Alterations

A new look for Nebraska's world-famous capitol building might be in the making. Gov. Victor Anderson said the Capitol Building commission will consider an extensive remodeling of the south entrance of the structure. Reasons for the suggested changes are functional—to stop water leakage and keep the south door in operation.

At present the south door is between a brace of cement stairs which originally lead to the terrace but now are blocked off. The entrance leads and the present heavy door is hard to operate. The proposal is to remove the present stairs, fill in the present door with stone and install two new doors where the stairs are now. Even if alterations are desirable, observers foresee some sparks flying before a major change in the building's appearance is approved.

County Agent's Column . . .

Soybean Pod Loss Won't Necessarily Cut Yield; Increased Seed Size Compensation

Soybean growers shouldn't get excited if they see pods on the ground after poor weather conditions. That extra pod loss doesn't necessarily mean less money in the farmer's pocket.

In fact, Mother Nature may well compensate for the pod loss by increasing seed size in the pods that remain. This often happens when temperature extremes, high humidity, rain or hail storms take a heavy toll of pods.

Researchers explain it this way: Soybeans can lose up to 40 percent of their pods and still produce a normal yield. A loss of only 10 percent of the pods can increase seed size. Removing 80 percent of the pods may only cut the yield in half, because of an increase in seed size.

Loss of pods causes larger and heavier seeds because the normal leaf area supplies food to a smaller-than-normal number of seeds, which thus get plenty. Removal of leaves after pods are set, however, decreases seed size and production. Fewer leaves means less nourishment for the larger number of seeds.

Pod removal and leaf loss affect composition of the seeds, too. Removing the pods can increase protein, sugar and leaf-starch content and can decrease the oil and fat. Removing the leaves, on the other hand, can decrease the protein and oil content.

Fertilizer still pays. Although you plow under wheat straw and stubble to enrich the soil, it still pays to add fertilizer. Here's why: The billions of soil organisms that rot the plowed-down straw and make it into soil-building humus use up large amounts of nitrogen, phosphate and potash to multiply and do their work.

If tests show that your soil is low in these elements, the organisms can use up all the nutrients. In such a case, the new crop may starve for needed plant food. You can accomplish two im-

Farm News and Views . . . Fall Farrowing Not Up Enough to Push Hog Prices Below Profit-Making Levels

FALL FARROWED pigs will return a fair margin of profit to most farmers, economists say.

Fall farrowings will be up from a year ago, but not enough to push prices below profit-making levels. Your best profit chances, however, will be early farrowed pigs pushed for sale shortly after the first of the new year.

In the meantime cull your sow herd. Keep only the best for spring farrowing. Prices next spring will likely be around this fall's low, but prices in the fall of 1959 are expected to be considerably lower.

WHEN BUYING FANS for grain drying make sure they have been tested and given an accurate rating. A recent report tells of a demonstration in which a fan with four times as much air movement as another fan using five horsepower. In each case the static pressure was the same. For most economic look for a label which shows the fan was tested under rules of the Air-Moving and Conditioning association.




