They were \$1,775 for a patching job and \$2,350 for a completely new roof. Both methods would carry an eight-year guarantee.

Bingo Amendment Outlaws Games Conducted by Agent

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the third of a series of 10 articles being published to inform voters about the new proposals to amend the constitution and the State of Nebraska which will appear on the ballot at the general election in November.) From the Nebraska Press Ass'n. News Service. In the general election in the fall of 1964, Nebraska citizens will be asked to vote on the three controversial issues which amended their state constitution. They were the unicameral legislature, the regulated game of chance, and the authorization of pari-mutuel betting. All three carried. Nov. 4 the voters of Nebraska will again be asked to amend the section of the constitution which prohibits the Legislature from authorizing any game of chance, lottery or gut enterprise but provides for the licensing and regulation of wagering on the results of horse races by the pari-mutuel or certificate method. The new amendment would permit the legislature to enact laws governing licensing and the authorization of bingo games conducted by non-profit associations which have been in existence for five years immediately preceding their application for license. The amendment also says that bingo games cannot be conducted by agents or lessees of such associations on a percentage basis. The bingo amendment was placed on the ballot by an initiative petition circulated primarily by the Nebraska veterans of Foreign Wars and the Fraternal Order of Eagles. The pros and cons on this amendment have been threshed out in several legislative sessions. If you haven't heard them, you can get an argument going on any street corner without half trying. (Next week: The proposal to exempt certain executive officers of the state government from residing in Lincoln.)

Over 200 Students Enrolled At Winside Public School

Winside public school has an enrollment of 202 students for the 1958-59 term, Supt. Lawrence Retzlaff announced this week. This represents an increase of 31 over a year ago.

Retzlaff said 55 of the 92 high school students are tuition students. Two elementary students are also tuition. High school enrollment by grades includes 23 seniors, 24 juniors, 19 sophomores and 24 freshmen.

Grade enrollment figures are: kindergarten, 14; first and second, 27; third and fourth, 24; fifth, sixth, 23; and seventh and eighth, 22.

Since Hoskins high school is contracting with the Winside school this year, 17 students are transported daily by bus. Fred Brader is serving as the driver.

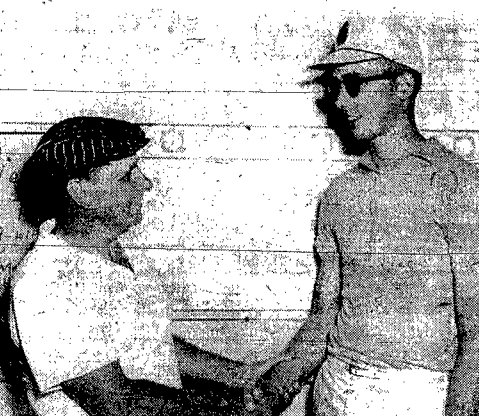
