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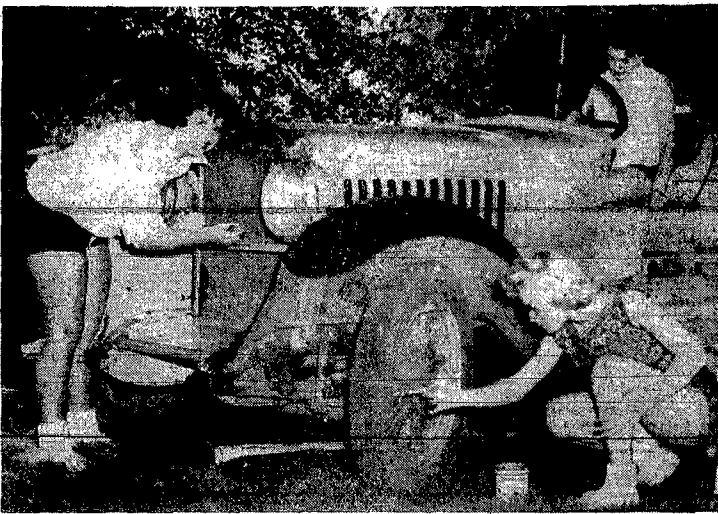

Amendment Would Provide Outstate Board Members

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the fourth of 10 articles being published to inform voters about the nine proposals to amend the constitution of the State of Nebraska which will appear on the ballot at the general election in November.)

On the ballot in next November's election there is a proposed amendment which reads this way:

"Constitutional amendment to change the provisions requiring certain executive officers to reside at the seat of government."

This amendment was placed on the ballot by the 1957 session of the Legislature, which approved the proposal almost unanimously.

The reason for this amendment goes back to another legislative act, this one passed in 1953, which reorganized the State Department of Health. The reorganized department is headed by a State Board of Health, instead of a director. The board is appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Legislature.

In so doing, the board members came under the classification of "executive officers" in the state department. This is done by a director. The board simply meets

How a Land Owner Bids His Farm

The examples below show how a Wayne county farmer bids his land under the 1959 conservation reserve program. The landowner has an option of bidding his farm land two ways: (1) A full farm bid for five years or more with a 10 percent higher maximum rate; (2) A part of a farm or a bid for less than five years.

The maximum rate for Wayne county farms has been established at \$16 per acre. With the 10 percent bonus that rate would be \$17.60. These are figures for a normal 100 percent farm. ASC Chairman Carl Sundell said Wayne county farms range between 120 percent and 75 percent.

Below are three examples of imaginary farms, showing how the government will arrive at "best buys" if the total amount of farms bid exceeds the USDA appropriations for the county.

Smith Farm Rated at 110 Percent
(75 Acres Under Cultivation—Balance Pasture and Buildings)
Maximum rate on portion or less than five years, per acre \$17.40
Maximum rate on full farm (five years) per acre \$19.40
Mr. Smith places a bid of \$14.30 per acre on his land for only 40 acres. This means his maximum rate is \$17.60. Bid represents 81 percent of maximum.

Doe Farm Rates at 100 Percent
(130 Acres Under Cultivation—Balance Pasture and Buildings)
Maximum rate on portion or less than five years, per acre \$16.00
Maximum rate on full farm (five years) per acre \$17.60
Mr. Doe places a bid of \$15.20 per acre on his land for a full farm for five years. This means his maximum is \$17.60. Bid represents 86 percent of maximum.

Jones Farm Rated at 80 Percent
(130 Acres Under Cultivation—Balance Pasture and Buildings)
Maximum rate on portion or less than five years, per acre \$12.80
Maximum rate on full farm (five years), per acre \$14.10
Mr. Jones places a bid of \$8.80 per acre on his farm for only 80 acres. This means his maximum rate is \$12.80. Bid represents 69 percent of maximum.

How Government Rates Them

The government, after establishing the percent of maximum, will offer contracts to the "best buys." Sundell pointed out this will be used only if sufficient funds are not appropriated. The government would line up the imaginary farms in this order on a "best buy" basis:

1—Jones Farm (\$8.80 per acre) 81 percent
2—Doe Farm (\$15.20 per acre) 86 percent
3—Doe Farm (\$15.20 per acre) 86 percent

County Farm Average \$16

"What is the maximum rate per acre I can get on my farm under the 1959 conservation reserve program?"

That seems to be the most important question being asked by Wayne county farmers, according to ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell. The farmers want to know just what they can earn by participating in this new program.

The interest developed when the acreage reserve program in effect last year was first introduced. Sundell emphasized that the first and most important step is for a farmer to ask the county ASC committee to establish a maximum annual payment rate for his farm. Deadline for such requests is Oct. 10.

Rates are established on a percentage basis. That is, a farm rated as a 100 percent farm or an 80 percent farm. County farm percentages vary from 75 to 120. Maximum per acre rate established for Wayne county is \$16. A 10 percent higher rate is offered if the farmer bids his full farm in the reserve for a period of five years or more.

After receiving his farm rate, the farmer or landowner decides how much cropland he wants to place in the conservation reserve and how long he wants his contract to run. He also decides the rate of annual payment at which he will bid his land.

A minimum time for contracting farm land under the 1959 conservation reserve is three years if the land already has permanent cover. If the land does not have permanent cover the time bid must be five years.

The farmer enters his information on an application form prepared by the ASC. This application must be returned to the local ASC office by Oct. 24.

In connection with filing, Sundell pointed out that a farmer can offer to place his land in the conservation reserve at less than the maximum annual payment rate established for his farm. For instance, if he has a 100 percent farm he can, if he desires, place his bid at 70 percent.

Sundell stressed the fact that the government will accept farms on a best-buy basis. That is, the total amount of funds appropriated to Wayne county is exceeded by the total amount farmers want for their land.

"If Wayne county should, for example, receive a sum of \$100,000 and the total amount of bids is only \$150,000, then every farmer would expect to receive the full amount of his bid. However, if the funds are short, then the farmers submitting the best bids to the government will have first priority.

The farmer can refuse to sign the contract even if accepted by the government. Submitting a bid is not binding.

Any farmer can participate in the conservation reserve who has cropland which is regularly used for cultivated crops or tame hay.

Eligible land includes: (1) Any and from which a crop was harvested or which was in regular crop rotation in 1955, and (2) land from which tame hay was harvested for hay or silage in either 1957 or 1958. Tame hay is defined as a stand of perennial grasses or legumes normally established for hay by land preparation and seeding.

Non-eligible land includes: (1) That planted to small-fruits—wine grapes, nursery stock, orchard or nut trees and land between rows of these crops; (2) land owned by the Federal government or a corporation wholly owned by the Federal government; and (3) land in non-crop open-pasture, range, woods or in the farmstead.

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The label reproduced above has become one of the best known egg case labels in the Middle West and Central South. The quality marketing program back of this label has placed the Madison Co-op Creamery in the position of recognized leader in the field. It is perhaps the most copied program in the Midwest and definitely sets the standard that competitors in the area attempt to reach, both in quality and producer returns. The M-1s for the week of Sept. 10 were 37c and sales indicate not less than 38c for at least the first half of week of Sept. 17.

Reflecting the increase in terminal market butter price quotations, the Madison Co-op Creamery accordingly has increased the weekly cash settlement price for butterfat to 63c for the full week of Sept. 17. Of Course most buyers have followed along in raising territory quotations on both cream and eggs after announcement of Madison returns.

Three weeks ago, the Madison Co-op Creamery just had to give up trying to match checkbooks with one of the giants in the industry and reluctantly discontinued the dressing and marketing of live poultry. Within 10 days the farm value of hens as reflected by prevailing farm quotations in this area had declined as much as 6c per lb., from 14c to 8c. Our New York principal three weeks after our closing down was still paying a Minnesota packer the same price as he had been paying us for consumer packer fowl. It was not a terminal market change that took 25c to 30c from the farm value of every hen on the farms of Northeast Nebraska. An official spokesman of the Poultry Market News reporting service tells us that the first week following the closing of our poultry line the average per lb. farm price for fowl for the entire state declined over 2 1/2c. The last firm figures and current estimates indicate approximately 11 million hens on farms in Nebraska. The lion's share of the approximately 1 1/2 million dollar decline in poultry value for the state comes from Northeast Nebraska.

We honestly believe there is just no good reason to believe the same thing wouldn't happen to eggs and butterfat under similar circumstances of not having the Madison Co-op Creamery to set the pace. The "Johnny come latelies," the "tea kettle operators" and miscellaneous "hangers on" have conclusively demonstrated their unwillingness and inability to offer market protection for your poultry. There is nothing in the record to indicate that over the long pull and especially when the chips are down that anyone can or will play in the same league with the Madison Co-op Creamery as your producer representative in the nation's market places

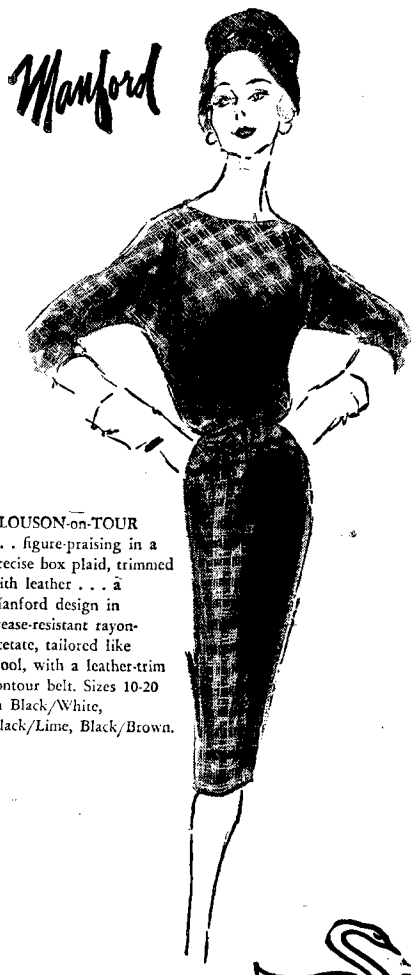

Augustana Overpowers WSTC 20-7

Doane Foe in Loop Starter

Paced by the nifty quarterbacking of Jim Luce and the pass catching of John Simko, Augustana's Vikings spoiled Russ Young's debut as WSTC football coach with a 20-7 victory over the Wildcats Saturday night at Memorial stadium.

Bob Schnitzler, Humphrey sophomore, made one around left end and then grabbed a nine-yard pass from Quarterback Loyd Maskell.

Hoesing moved the ball to the five and Maskell then hit Stan Hansen on a short pass to the goal line. Skeeter Mahler kicked the extra point.

Wayne offered one more threat early in the second quarter after Hoesing ran a punt back to the Viking 38. A Maskell-to-Hoesing pass netted a first down on the 25. Two end runs netted only one yard and the threat ended when Luce intercepted Maskell's pass on the Augustana 15.

The visitors struck pay dirt with the game only 3½ minutes old. Simko recovered Hoesing's fumble on the Augustana 48 and on the first play from scrimmage LeRoy Anderberg slanted off right tackle and raced 52 yards to score. Luce added the extra point.

Glen Sellevold's interception of a Maskell pass set the stage for the second huge tally in the opening period. The Vikings took over on the Wildcat 32 and four plays later Jim Dardis slid over the left side, cut back and ran 29 yards to score. Luce's conversion attempt was wide.

Augustana scored its final touch-

down only five minutes after Wayne posted its tally. Anderberg capped a 37-yard march with a 10-yard skirt around right end and Luce again kicked the placement.

Although overwhelmed on the ground game by the wizardry of Luce, Wayne did manage to display a fairly potential aerial offense. The Wildcats completed nine of 25 passes for 80 yards.

Augustana held a 287-78 bulge in ground yardage.

Encouraging factors for Coach Young was the running of Freshman Jim Grove, Emerson, and Schnitzler. Line play, although ragged defensively, did come up

with a few bright spots.



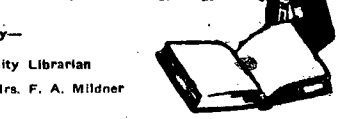

That's the question we've got to ask ourselves. It's one you should ask yourselves, too. If you concentrate on reporting and writing for the newspaper and its readers you'll end up with more for your scrapbook. Just get those state convention judges out of your thinking as you plan your material. By slanting your stuff to them you defeat your own purpose. If your report is late, it loses its news value fast. Be on time. We have to be.

End of sermon—and we especially hope that it is read by the publicity chairmen who have recently been elected by many groups for the coming year.

GOP Chief Asserts Nebraskans Won't Buy Democrat Offers

Lincoln—There will be plenty of tub-beating from now on in Nebraska's political arena.

Last week Midwest Democrats cracked the Republicans in a conference at Omaha. This week the state Republican party held its convention at Alliance and took its turn at bat against the Democrats.

Early in Nebraska's campaign, shortly after the primary, the line-up on the Democratic side showed there would be a lot of speech making before Nov. 4. Democrats started early sniping at the state administration and Washington incumbents.

At the state level the staid GOP ignored the Democratic barbs. But last week GOP State Chairman Richard E. Spelts, Jr., Grand Island, set the stage. He left little doubt as to what course the party would follow.

In Omaha, the Democrats met on a jubilant note, fresh from a whopping defeat of Republicanism in Maine. Community speaker, "Maine Republicans let themselves get too liberal," he said Nebraska will remain in the "stronghold of conservative Republicanism," untouched by the Maine upset.

Ordnance Plants The Army Corps of Engineers has called a bid from private industry on use of ordnance plants at Mead and Grand Island.

Traffic Deaths The problem of traffic deaths will become an "unbelievable one" in coming years in Nebraska. That's the comment of State Engineer L. N. Ress. The engineer said fatalities are down on state highways but up on county roads.

Education Payments The State Education department needs some \$120,000 more for payments to public schools for tuition of children who live on Federal property.

The lawmakers okayed \$133,600 for the tuition, which is paid out at the rate of \$6 per week for each child attending high school and \$3 weekly for elementary pupils.

Decker said the department will have to ask the 1959 Legislature for a deficiency appropriation to cover the expense. He said there are \$74,000 worth of claims on file for the second term of the

County Agent's Column . . . Fall Fertilization Tests Show \$3 Return For Each Dollar Invested in Fertilizer

Top dressing permanent pastures this fall with fertilizer will add an extra day to the grazing season, push the pastures off to a faster start early next spring and produce higher yields of good quality, low cost feed per acre.

When applied in the fall, fertilizer is all ready to go to work as soon as spring rains and warm sunshine wake up the grass pastures and growth starts. When you apply fertilizer in the fall you get the job done when there is a firm footing for your tractor, truck or spreader.

Pasture demonstration with fertilizers such as 10-10-10, 12-12-12 and 13-13-13 have shown that the plant food can return as much as \$3 for each dollar invested in fertilizer.

Cool season grasses such as bromegrass and wheat grass respond especially well to nitrogen. Soil tests will show whether phosphate, potash or lime is needed.

How Much Money? Net earnings on the farm are approximately half the gross sales. Gross income is considered the total value of crops and livestock sold less the cost of any purchased feed and livestock. Net earnings are what a farmer has left to pay interest debts and income taxes and to use for savings and family living. The average farmer needs a \$6,000 income should plan on a gross income of about \$12,000.

If a farm doesn't seem likely to make the needed income, farmers have three choices: change cropping plans, add livestock to increase size of business or improve their efficiency.

Corn is the most profitable crop in this area, soybeans ranks second, hay third and oats a poor last.

1957-58 school year, with only \$6,000 to meet this year's obligations. It will take about \$122,000 more to meet the deficit, Decker added.

Encephalitis The State health department is keeping its eye on an increase in the number of cases of encephalitis, commonly known as sleeping sickness. Dr. E. A. Rogers, state health director, said he did not foresee any localized epidemics of the disease transmitted by a type of mosquito. There is no vaccine against the disease contracted by humans.

Rogers advises spraying of areas where mosquitos breed. The transmitting mosquito inhabits grassland and has a peculiar habit of biting only for an hour before and an hour after sundown, Rogers said. One control measure would be to stay indoors during that period, the health director said, or use an insect repellent.

mechanical corn pickers average 10 percent of the crop with some losses as high as 20 percent.

The main trouble is that many picker operators judge the efficiency of harvest by the cleanliness of ears from husks. This is a mistake because attached husks do not interfere much with storage and there is no discount for a few husks when corn is sold. In fact, to get ears clean of husks shelled corn losses will run high.

Picker operators should look on the ground for shelled corn and missed ears to judge the job they are doing rather than worrying about husks on the ears.

Farm News and Views . . . Corn Cribbs Could be Outdated in Just a Few Years; See Little Drop for Feeders

IS THE OLD CORN CRIB on the way out? Farm editors suggest you consider future methods of harvesting and handling corn before you invest in a permanent crib. Improvements in harvesting and drying equipment are developing a trend toward earlier harvesting, shelling and drying.

You can save money by being farsighted and deciding now how you'll want to harvest and store grain in years to come. Corn cribbs could be outdated on your farm in just a few years.

FEEDER CATTLE prices won't dip much lower, say market analysts. Even though there will be some decline on the heavier kinds into October, the drop isn't likely to be more than a few cents. 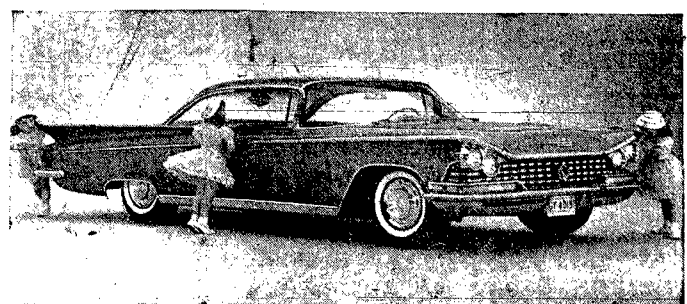
