# Start Crackdown on Unlicensed Dogs

## College Enrollment Reaches 1,142; 100 over '57 Mark

WSTC's fall enrollment increased 23 students over the new record reported a week ago. Registrar M. B. Childs said Tuesday. The new total is 1,142, more than 100 students over last year's record of 1,038.

Childs figures show women students have increased 23—socially, at least. There are more than 500 women in all classes except the freshman group.

Of the total enrollment, 633 are men and 509 women. The enrollment by classes—Freshman, 437, sophomore, 310, junior, 194, senior, 141, and graduate, 40.

The senior class ratio is more than two men students for each woman. The junior ratio gives the women almost as big a selection of date potential.

The totals include resident students in day, night and Saturday classes. It does not include students in correspondence or Wayne Prep students.

The Prep total is 298—151 boys and 144 girls. This includes 105 in the elementary grades, 61 in junior high and 132 in senior high.

Last year's Prep enrollment total was 258.

## 25 Students Make Conservation Tour

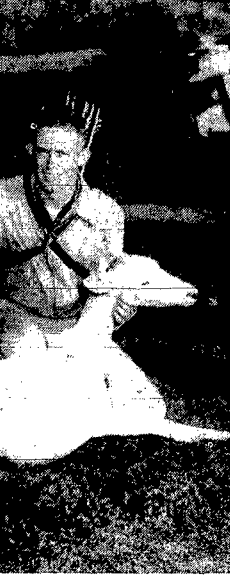
Twenty-five Wayne county rural grade students participated in a conservation field day at the Dick Bailer farm Monday. The Soil Conservation district sponsored the event.

She was preceded in death by her parents, a sister and a brother.

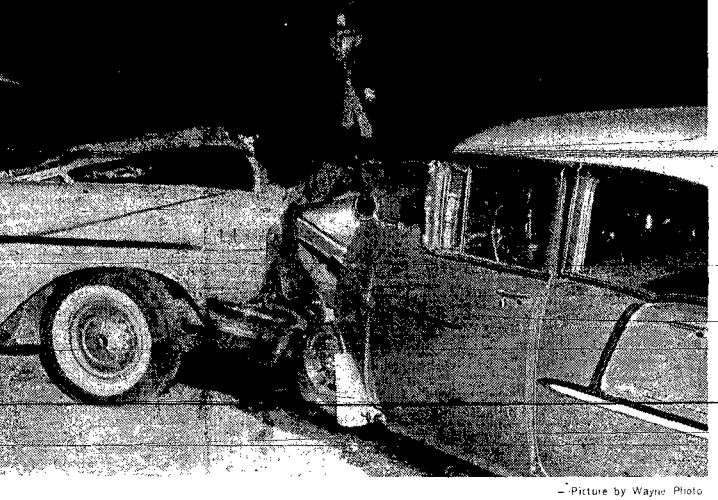
## Must Report Excess Earnings to Avoid Social Security Loss

All persons drawing Social Security payments who have earned or expect to earn over \$1,200 in 1958 should have their benefit payments stopped if they were under 72 years of age during any month of the year, according to Clifford Kittelson, manager of the Norfolk Social Security office.

When a beneficiary under age 72 earns in excess of \$1,200 in a calendar year and fail to submit a report of these excessive earnings until the end of the year, it is necessary for him to repay all or at least part of the benefit payments he received during the year.

This, Kittelson said, is often difficult to do because the repayment may have to be made when the beneficiary is earning little or no money.

## Sixth of a Series Succession Amendment Corrects the Constitution

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the sixth of 10 articles being published to inform voters about the main proposals to amend the constitution of the State of Nebraska which will appear on the ballot at the general election, November.)

At its 257 session, the Nebraska Legislature agreed to submit to the people a proposal to bring up to date the constitutional provision for determining who shall be governor, should he be removed from office by death or other cause.

It appears on the ballot this way:

"Constitutional amendment to provide for succession to the office of governor when the speaker of the Legislature is incapable of performing the duties."

The constitution of Nebraska now says that if the governor dies, or is incapable of serving, he shall be succeeded by the lieutenant governor. If he dies, or is incapable of serving as governor, he shall be succeeded by the president of the senate, and if he is unable to serve, by the speaker of the house of representatives. This was based, of course, on officers of the Nebraska Legislature when it operated as a two-house system. In 1934 the people approved the Unicameral Legislature, and its chief executive officer is known as the Speaker of the Legislature.

The amendment to be voted upon next November, then, says the line of succession to the office of governor shall be the lieutenant governor and then the speaker of the Legislature. The amendment goes further. It gives the legislature traveled together at times once in an airplane. Had some thing happened, the state would have been without a chief executive until the general election of 1958.

The proposed amendment is similar to the provision of the Federal constitution for succession to the presidency. Beyond the vice presidency, Congress has been given the right to determine the succession. There was virtually no debate on the succession proposal when it passed the Legislature. The attorney general's office strongly supported it.

## Wayne State to Offer College Credit for Viewing Television Atomic Physics Class

WSTC this fall will offer college credits for watching television—a TV course in nuclear physics. The local school will join about 300 other colleges in an unprecedented project to teach physics by television. The course, which starts Monday, is designed mainly for high school physics teachers. It will also interest other adults and students with a yen to learn more about atomic physics.

Sioux City channel 4 will telecast the course from 6:30 to 7 a.m. Monday through Friday during the first and second semesters. Brief recesses will be taken during major school holidays.

Teachers and students may enroll at WSTC this week. Persons with bachelor's degrees will receive three hours of graduate credit if they complete the course. College seniors may enroll for undergraduate credit.

On alternate Saturday mornings, starting Oct. 18, a seminar will be held on the local campus for all enrollees. Dr. W. G. Ingram, chairman of the college science department, will be in charge.

Fee for students enrolled for credit is \$5. Others wishing to attend the seminars as auditors, without credit, will pay a \$5 fee. Prerequisites for the course are general physics, college algebra, trigonometry and approval of the college.

Main instructor for the course will be Dr. Herbert White, University of California physics professor. He is an Atomic Energy commission consultant and served as research director for the Manhattan (atomic bomb) project in World War II.

The fall semester of 80 lessons will cover a wide range of physics basic to nuclear physics. The spring semester will deal entirely with nuclear physics.

Dr. White has announced he will cover the same material he uses in regular university classes. Students at Wayne will use a textbook and take tests.

## Battle Creek Senior to Reign at WSTC Homecoming Oct. 11

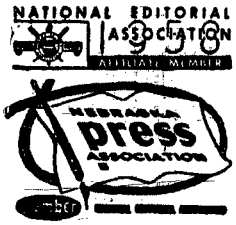

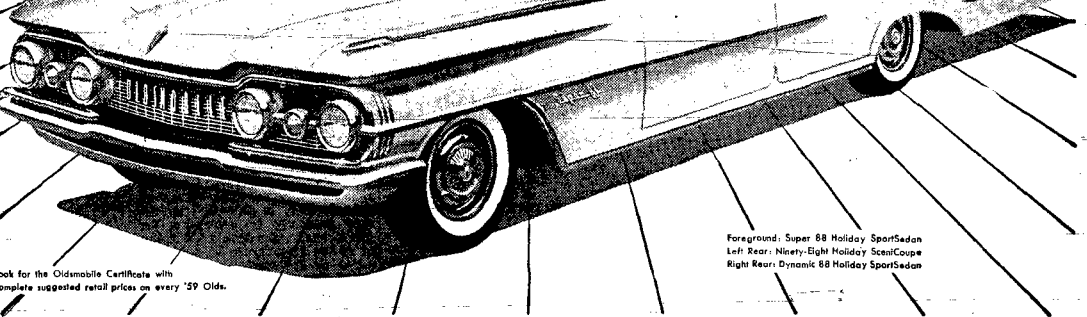

Wayne State's Wildcats will face their toughest 1958 football foe Saturday afternoon when they travel to Kearney to face an Antelope team that scored more points in each of its first three games than Wayne has scored all season.

Nebraska Wesleyan humbled Wayne 28-0 Saturday night at Lincoln, scoring in every period. Kearney, meanwhile, trounced Midland 28-6 at Fremont. In previous games Kearney whalloped Moorhead, Minn., 44-0 and Ft. Hays, Kan., 35-7.

Wayne never managed to mount a sustained attack against Wesleyan's defenders. Only in the third period did Wayne click on a series of plays to penetrate Wesleyan territory. That attack fizzled when the Plainsmen intercepted a Wildcat pass on the 22.

Wesleyan talked first on a nine-yard buck by Fullback Bob Johnson with 7:36 remaining in the first quarter. Gary Hofmann, a small but rugged halfback, snared a pass from Quarterback Lonnie Johnson and zipped 30 yards for the touchdown with 8:35 left in the half.

# EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

You may not agree with an editorial . . . but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

## Hinge Point of Freedom's Destiny

A recent Life magazine editorial called for public support of President Eisenhower's decision to resist, with U. S. force if necessary, the Red Chinese attack on the island of Quemoy. In a statesmanlike speech to the nation the President explained and justified his course with forthright clarity and precision.

The editorial went on in part:

"The U. S., at least, is not going to repeat that fateful history. (Reference is to the Munich decision on Czechoslovakia) There will be no Western Pacific Munich. Quemoy is not just a rock pile; it is a stopping point in a series of free world retreats before the advance of Communism—retreats which have already been too costly and which, if continued, would ultimately force us into a major war for sheer survival. The President has rightly committed us to a different road. The nation should be committed behind him. Only if he is backed by this strength can the negotiations which the President has also offered Red China lead to anything useful."

"Every American will agree with Eisenhower that the United States cannot accept the result that the Communists seek"

so long as that goal remains world conquest. That being so, the road the President has chosen is our best hope to control war and achieve ultimate peace."

Formosa is a hinge point on which the destiny of freedom will turn. Geographically the Far East is the best arena in which to collide with Russia. Red China is seething with rebellion. Famine and pestilence are rampant. Six million people have died.

Once before the U. S. refused to aid Chiang military assistance which had been promised him. At that time he was making a desperate stand to retain the Chinese mainland as a fortress of freedom in the Far East.

Surrender of the offshore islands of Quemoy and Matsu could lead to another Hungarian debacle. It will signal to the world that we neither have the courage nor the effective means to stand up to the ruthless Kremlin bosses.

Appeasement is a disastrous policy; Munich is still a prime example of such a disaster. President Eisenhower has asked our nation to support his choice of another road. It is up to us to give him this support.

## Capitol News

### Statehouse Geared for Surge Of Activities Through June

Lincoln—The statehouse is geared for a surge of activities that will last through June of next year. Legislative council committees are holding hearings on subjects studied since members saw state senators in the 1957 session.

A meeting of the entire council, composed of all 43 state senators, is slated Nov. 18-20. At that time committees will submit their reports and the group will act on problems that may be handled by the 1959 Unicameral.

In addition, political talk is high in the capitol. With the Nov. 4 election fast drawing near, statehouse officials and employees alike are keeping a watchful eye on the situation.

Budget hearings to get ready for the governor's recommendations to the 1959 Legislature will get underway in November or December. These will reveal spending plans of state agencies.

Then, on Jan. 6, the Legislature will convene in what could be the longest and most difficult session in history. If lawmakers have true faith they will not come home again earlier than June.

An additional round of activities pops up on weekends when there are home football games at the University of Nebraska. Many committees and board members are in Lincoln waiting over for the gridiron contest.

### Labor Relations

Both labor and management representatives have told a Legislative council committee they would like to see a state labor relations act in Nebraska. This could well signal the introduction of such a bill in the next Legislature, either with or without the committee's recommendation which first must go to the entire council before going on to the next group of lawmakers.

The council either will accept, reject or amend such a report. There was disagreement between the labor and management people about whether a court or board should be used to administer such an act with labor holding out for the board.

The committee primarily was set up to study the problem of secondary boycotts in Nebraska.

### Ground Water

The Legislative council will get a recommendation for establishment of locally controlled ground water districts. Such districts would be set up in areas which could conceivably develop a shortage of underground water.

A proposal calling for 45 districts was adopted by the ground water committee of Sen. Don Thompson. McCook in size they range from 837 to 8,013 square miles, with an average of 1,700.

The idea includes provisions for corrective and conservation measures in areas that might find themselves short of underground water. Before the 1957 session, the committee came up with recommendations later put into law requiring spacing and registration of irrigation wells.

### Freight Rates

All railroads operating in Nebraska have been given an average 2.3 percent hike in rates for hauling freight within the state. Authority was given by the State Railway commission to conform intrastate rates with those between states. Livestock increases went up three percent. Milk, cream and related products went up two per-

### Farm News and Views . . .

#### Grain Delivered to Buyers This Year Can Be 1959 Income If You Take Proper Steps

HIGHER DAIRY PRICES and better balance between milk supply and demand should not cause dairy farmers to become complacent. Instead, farm editors say dairymen should take this opportunity to improve production efficiency.

Dairy cow numbers dropped 3 1/2 percent during the past year. Total production so far in 1958 has been down about one percent. However, this situation will probably be short-lived. Herd size and average production per cow will soon see further increases. Use the present "lag" period to tool up for increased competition in the period ahead.

TOPPING CORN before end of the month may speed up drying, reduce lodging, wind damage and ear drop, say machinery specialists. The mechanical topper consists of motor-driven rotary blades or a sickle bar mounted on machines commonly used to spray tall crops or detassel seed corn.

### Frontier Airlines

Local air service came to Nebraska when Frontier airlines inaugurated the first flight under the new seven-state local service pact. Under the pact, major Nebraska cities, for the first time, will be linked together with commuter-type service.

Rates to be charged by the airline have been authorized by the State Railway commission which has jurisdiction over public carriers. An example of the rates: Chadron to Lincoln, \$27.80 one way, \$52.90 round trip. Airport-to-airport freight rates will be seven cents per pound under 100 pounds except for Chadron and Omaha where the fare is eight cents. Minimum charge per shipment is \$4.

### Traffic Volumes

There has been no increase in traffic on rural Nebraska roads for the first eight months of this year as compared with the same time in 1957. That's the report of the State Highway department, which also said August travel was up one percent over July but down one percent from August, 1957.

Traffic is recorded by the department at 15 checkpoints, through the use of automatic counting machines.

### County Agent's Column

#### Sleep Later When Combining Soybeans; Cut Field Losses with Afternoon Harvest

Sleep a little later in the morning when you are combining soybeans. An early morning start may lose more beans than it is worth.

When university engineers studied combining losses, they found five bushels per acre were left in the field under damp straw and pod conditions of early morning. The loss was cut to two bushels in the evening seemed to be the best way to stretch the day. Combining under dry conditions at 5 p.m. resulted in losses around the two bushel point.

In general, from 60 to 95 percent of the beans left in the field never get into the combine. They are left on stalks that fall to the ground. Gentlemen: I should like to submit some material which I think will effectively refute the editorial which appeared recently in your paper and the World-Herald.

I think it should be pointed out that there was no likelihood of any new labor or other major legislation after the defeat of the Kennedy-Ives Bill. Congress adjourned just five days later. The Democrats had already scuttled any effective labor legislation that would have offended Walter Reuther or Jimmy Hoffa in the rush toward adjournment. There was no possibility for the hearings, debate and votes that would have been necessary to produce an effective bill. The fact is that no such effort ever got underway after the debate of the Kennedy-Ives Bill Aug. 18. I am glad to say I voted against this bill.

Due to some urgent demands from Third district civic organizations for my appearance before their groups, after all major legislation before Congress had been voted on, I regretted my vote with a Democrat in a like situation for any minor committee reports that might come up during the four final days of the session. This is permitted procedure and had the approval of the leaders on our side of the aisle.

The Democratic candidate lists several votes which he says I missed in the closing week of the session. In the same order in which he enumerates them, here are the charges and the facts:

1. Congressman Harrison's opposition said: "He is recorded neither for or against the \$500 million federal aid to education bill. The facts are: H.R. 13247, National Defense Education Act, passed House Aug. 8. Motion to recommit was defeated 161 to 223 on record vote. Congressman Harrison voted yea on motion to recommit. In other words, against the bill. Congressional Record, Page 15,367.
2. Congressman Harrison's opposition said: "His voice was not heard on the \$3.5 billion foreign aid appropriation bill although we heard much from him in the past session that he was opposed to foreign aid appropriations." The facts are: H.R. 13192, Mutual Security Appropriations, Passed House, 259-126; July 6. Congressional Record Page 11,780.
3. Congressman Harrison's opposition said: "He took no part in the 10 percent increase in benefit payments for 675,000 railroad workers and their dependents." The facts are: House did not consider bill to increase railroad retirement benefits. The Rules committee did not report out the bill.
