

Quemoy is not just a rockpile; it is a stopping point in a series of free world retreats before the advance of Communism—retreats which have already been too costly and which, if-continued, would ultimately force us into a major war for sheer survival. The President has rightly committed us to a different road. The nation should be committed behind him. Only if he is-backed by this strength can the negotiations which the President has stop offered Red Chinalead to anything useful.
