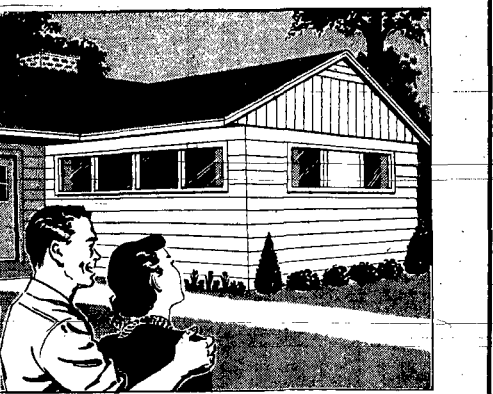

Coach Harold Maciejewski's crew was scheduled to play at South Sioux City last night and will meet Wisner in the season's finale at the local field Oct. 31. The Wayne-Wisner battle will determine the West division representative in the annual Husker conference playoffs.

Wayne and Madison are currently tied for the top in the West division with 2-1 records. Madison will play against Hartington the same night as the Wayne-Wisner game. If both teams win, Wayne will get the playoff berth since Madison was the West representative a year ago. If Wisner defeats Wayne, Madison will get its second straight playoff spot.

Wayne left little doubt as to the final outcome Friday night, marching 63 yards after the opening kickoff to take a 7-0 lead and then scoring again only 3 1/2 minutes later.

The Blue Devils rolled up nearly 500 yards from scrimmage including 385 yards rushing against the small Hartington line. Five players figured in the Wayne scoring with Jim Skeehan collecting four touchdowns and an extra point. One of his tallies was on a 61-yard slant over right tackle.

Quarterback Roger Denesia scored two touchdowns and passed to Warren Rodgers for a third. He also completed five of 10 passes for 106 yards.

Wayne's march with the opening kickoff featured the running of Rodgers and Freshman Buster Likes. The latter covered the final 24 yards in two skirts around right end to make it 6-0 with the game only three minutes old. Skeehan added the extra point on a plunge.

Hartington's attack stalled after the ensuing kickoff and Likes ran Ken Morten's punt back 30 yards to the Hartington 40. Rodgers skirted left end for 16 yards and then took a 24-yard pass from Denesia for the touchdown and a 13-0 lead. Skeehan's plunge for the extra point failed.

Late in the first period Hartington was again forced to punt and Wayne took over on its own 41. The third touchdown came eight plays later as the second quarter opened. Denesia sneaked the final yard and passed to Bill Witt for the extra point and a 20-0 lead. Rodgers accounted for 40 yards in four carries in this march.

Coach Maciejewski made full use of his reserves from this point on. Hartington mustered three threats which moved the ball to the Wayne 24 before Dick Schmitz intercepted a Folkers pass and returned it to the Wayne 11.

Wayne then rolled 93 yards in 11 plays to take a 26-0 lead. Denesia completed two of three passes in the march for 26 yards. Rodgers then moved forward pushing attempts. The tally came on a Denesia roll-out from the Wildcat 1. A pass to Dick Hammer for the extra point was no good.

Hartington then rolled to its first touchdown, the tally coming after the gun had sounded for the half-time intermission. Ken Bergstadt set the stage for the touchdown by returning Denesia's kickoff 22 yards to the Wildcat 38.

Folkers scored two touchdowns by Morten and Dave Olson for 14 and 11 yards to put the ball on the Wayne 41. Wayne was charged with pass interference on the next play and the Wildcats had a first down on the Blue Devil 15. Folkers passed to Doug Koel on the last play of the half to make it 26-6. Bergstadt's plunge for the extra point was short of the goal line.

The teams battled in midfield in the early stages of the third quarter with the Blue Devils hampered by penalties and a pass interception. Wayne's fifth touchdown followed Denesia's interception of a Folkers pass and his 47-yard runback. The play was partially spoiled by a holding penalty by a Blue Devil. The final Denesia touchdown came with only 2:03 remaining in the game. It followed Ron Blecker's recovery of Lowell Dendinger's fumble on the Wayne 39. On the next play Skeehan slanted over right tackle on the belly series and raced 61 yards for a touchdown with two Hartington defenders in pursuit. Denesia passed to Witt for the extra point to make it 53-13.

Capitol News

Observers Feel State Labor Vote to Have More Influence

LINCOLN—Organized labor will have more influence in state politics in the immediate future. That's the private viewpoint of observers close to the problem. They point to the fact the unions now have some 70,000 members in Nebraska and are hard at work getting them registered where this is required and following through by trying to get them to the polls. It is not certain what the effect of a labor endorsement of a political candidate so far has at the polls generally. Some Republicans have charged out-of-state union organizers have been working in Nebraska. This notably was voiced by Rep. A. L. Miller. State AFL-CIO Leader Gordon Preble immediately challenged this. The most potent effect of organized labor is felt in the second Congressional district which includes Omaha. There Rep. Glenn Cunningham has enjoyed the support of the unions and recently was endorsed by COPE, Democratic organization, despite the fact Cunningham is a Republican.

Omaha has about 50,000 union members. This is a sizeable force at the polls. However, on the other hand, Sen. Roman Hruska, has been attacked by labor in the past and has fared well at the polls, although it is true the objection to him by unions is stronger this time around. In a labor incident at the Capitol in a week, pickets from two Omaha unions marched around the statehouse and even in the corridors in protest to wage rates being paid on a bridge project in the vicinity of Plattsmouth. The state has a picketing law, but statehouse attorneys said it does not apply to public buildings. According to the statute, public buildings can be picketed if there are no more than two pickets within 50 feet of an entrance or of each other. Also, they must not create a nuisance or interfere with the proper usage of the building. Picketing of the statehouse was quiet and orderly.

Educational Tour
Another trip that has solved some of the problems of the State Board of Educational Lands and Funds has been made. In recent years the board adopted a policy of making a swing through the state annually to talk to those who hold various types of leases on state-owned schools. This has been a tremendous public relations action, as well as beneficial to both the leaseholder and the board. The most recent tour included Cluster, Logan, Thomas, Blaine, Loup, Dawes, Sheridan, Box Butte, Sioux, Scotts Bluff, Arthur, Grant, Hooker and McPherson counties. In all there are nearly 1,300 leases in the counties visited. Most of the leases are of the agricultural type.

While he does not find gold, he does bring back many new species of plants and animals which have aided medical discoveries. He also found the answer to one of history's most haunting legends. The third book is the new one, "Aku-Aku" by Thor Heyerdahl, author of Kon-Tiki, telling us the secret of Easter island and its mysterious statues. If you like to travel and love adventure, these are my ideas of three of the outstanding books of this type to recommend to you.

WE HAVE A BOOK BY A NEW, YOUNG AUTHOR on our rental shelf this week called "Parrish". The book is a grand-scale portrait of people, industry and land in a Connecticut valley. It is a story of conflict in a world which knows both the clamoring pressures of modern industry and the lingering traditions of plantation life. For a first novel, this book has had very excellent reviews.

Farm News and Views

Big Litters Needed for Satisfactory Hog Profits in 1959; Hormones Boost Cattle

BIG LITTERS will be needed to make satisfactory profits from hogs next year, according to agricultural reports. Best guide in selecting gilts that will produce large litters and raise them to weaning age is the size litter each gilt is from. Gilts from sows that consistently raise large litters of 10 or more pigs will also produce large litters. In selecting boars, check mainly on carcass quality and efficiency of gain. Boars should weigh 200 pounds when five months old.

DOES YOUR FARM have bottlenecks that hamper farming operations. Most farms do, so you might be wise to do some farmstead improvement planning. There are two general approaches to the problem of farming bottlenecks—simplification and automation.

County Agent's Column

Observing Safety Precautions May Stop Serious Consequences When Picking Corn

Despite the many cautions suggested to prevent "picker" accidents, they still occur daily at this season. The extra time required for safe operation is small indeed, as compared to the consequences suffered.

- Do you regularly follow these safety rules?
1. Never attempt to unclog, oil or adjust a machine while it is in motion.
 2. Always shut off the picker before you leave the tractor seat.
 3. Keep all safety shields in place.
 4. Keep your machine in good mechanical condition and properly adjusted.
 5. Pick corn only when the weather is favorable. The few extra loads you pick on a rainy day are not worth the price of an arm or leg.
 6. Carry a fire extinguisher and a first aid kit with you on the picker.
 7. Wear only clothes that fit snugly and that do not have loose pockets or sleeves.
 8. Change off with another operator once or twice a day if you can.
 9. Use a metal sediment bulb on your tractor instead of a glass one.
 10. Keep shucks cleaned away from the exhaust manifold.

Insist that these safety rules be followed on your farm and use your influence to induce other operators to be careful.

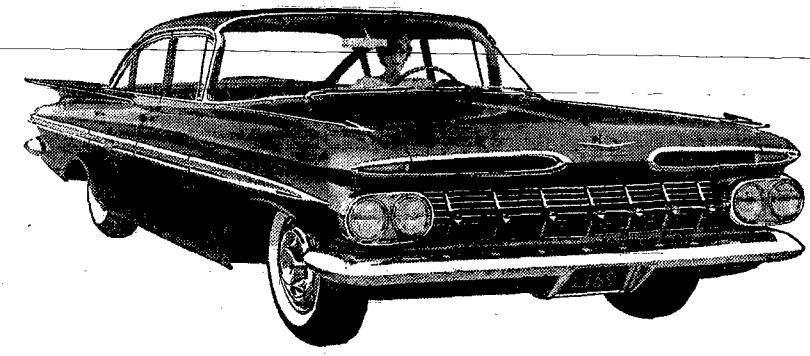

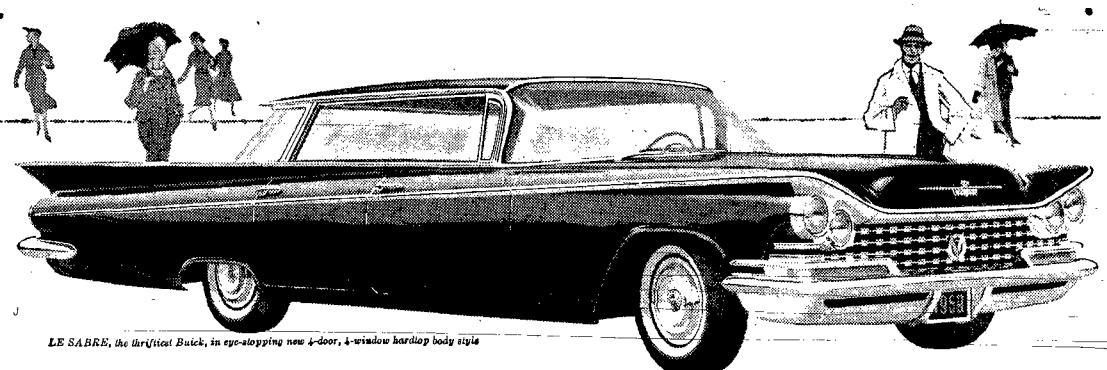

Barbecue Ham Sandwiches
(Makes 8 servings)

- 2 tablespoons finely chopped onion
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped green pepper
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 2 8-oz. cans tomato sauce
- 1/4 cup water
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 cups diced cooked ham
- 1/4 cup butter, softened
- 3/4 teaspoon garlic salt
- 8 hamburger buns

Cook onion and green pepper in 3 tablespoons butter until tender. Stir in tomato sauce, water, sugar, vinegar and seasonings. Simmer, uncovered, 10 minutes. Add ham and simmer 10 minutes longer. Blend butter and garlic salt; spread on each side of split buns. Heat in bun warmer or wrap in foil and heat in 350 degrees oven for 10 minutes. Fill with ham mixture.
