



# Ninth of a Series **Amendment Would Approve**

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the ninth of 10 articles being publish-ed to inform voters about the nine proposals to armend the com-stitution of the State of Nebraska which will appear on the bailot at the general election in Novem-ber.)

As the number of juvenile de-linquents increases in the state, many Nebraskans are asking the question, "Should we crea.e a separate system of juvenile courts to deal with the problem?" The voters will have an oppor-tunity to provide an answer at the November 4 general election. On the bailot there appears a constit-utional amendment which reads as follows:

utional amendment which reads as follows: --"Constitutional amendments au-thorizing the Legislature to cstab-lish a separate juvenile court." The Legislature first took note of this problem in 1905 when it pass-ed an act 'to regulate the treat-ment and control of dependent, neglected and delinquent children." This act, and several subsequent amendments, have provided for the handling of juvenile delinquents in this manner:

andling of juvenile delinquents in his manner: District courts have original jur-sdiction in all juvenile cases, but he county courts have concurrent urisdiction. In Lancanster and Douglas counties the county courts nay not exercise this jurisdiction excent when the district judges are absent from the county. In ad-dition, in counties of over 50.000 population (Douglas and Lancast-er), judges of the district court select one of their number to prer), judges of the district elect one of their number ide over what is called a e\_court."
