35 County Farmers Drop Bids For 1959 Soil Bank Contracts

Only Six Sure Of Accepting

Thirty-five Wayne county farmers have lowered their bids to place land in the 1959 soil bank conservation reserve, ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell said today.

The lower bids followed last week's announcement that all bids submitted at the maximum per acre rate established for the farm would probably be rejected.

Local ASC officials are now processing applications from 128 county farmers to place about 12,165 acres in the conservation reserve for periods ranging from three to 10 years.

Mantle's Shooting Eye Good as Batting Eye

Mickey Mantle, star outfielder for the world champion New York Yankees, proved his shooting eye was as good as his batting eye in a pheasant hunting excursion near Wayne Sunday.

Mantle's party of seven collected 15 birds at noon Sunday. Hunting with the group were Mike Eynon and Charles McDermott, Wayne. It was Mantle's first experience at hunting pheasants and he expressed the desire to return next season.

Sanitary Sewer Troubles Council At Tuesday Meeting

Proposed sanitary sewer additions and extensions provided a knotty problem for Wayne's city council at its regular meeting Tuesday night at the city clerk's office.

The council received a petition from 37 residents on the east side of the city requesting that no more connections be allowed to the sewer system which services the area and the new additions in the northeast corner of the city.

Friday Final Date to Renew Teen-Age Permit

Wayne county teen-agers who hold driver's licenses must renew their permits by Friday, Treasurer Leona Bahde reminded again this week.

Drivers who fail to renew their probationary licenses by Friday will have to take stage-examiner tests the treasurer pointed out.

Woman Winner in Football Contest

Mrs. Max Lundstrom, Wayne, became the first woman to win the \$5 first prize in The Herald football contest this week.

She correctly picked seven of the 10 contest winners to earn the prize. She missed on the Ohio State-Wisconsin and Army-Pittsburgh ties which threw all the contestants and also missed Illinois' victory over Michigan State.

Community Chest Exceeds Quota With \$7,500 Total

Wayne's Community Chest has exceeded its quota for the sixth straight year, Chairman Dr. O. B. Proett announced this week.

Dr. Proett said contributions and pledges for 1958 drive totaled \$7,530 as of noon Tuesday. This represents 101 percent of the \$7,462 goal. A few envelopes still outstanding may increase the final total slightly.

Tilt-Up Building Method Demonstrations Set Today

Concord - The tilt-up method of erecting low cost concrete farm structures, a technique some observers have termed revolutionary in farm building, will be demonstrated at the NE Nebraska Experimental farm today.

A demonstration on the tilt-up construction of a beef cattle shelter will be conducted by E. A. Olson, University of Nebraska extension engineer, and Larry E. Donegan, Portland Cement association representative.

During the demonstration, which is scheduled to start at 1:30 p.m., a wall panel will be tilted up. Marvel Baker, animal husbandry researcher, will discuss experiments planned for the Concord farm shed. Supt. Dale Flowerday will have charge of the demonstration discussions. The tilt-up method was originated and perfected by Texas A & M

Three Vying For Posts on REA Board

Local interest in Tuesday's general election will center around battles for two county offices, a national office and two seats on the Wayne county PPD board of directors. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

The contested county offices are clerk and sheriff. Lawrence Brock, Wakefield, is making a second attempt to unseat incumbent R. D. Harrison, Norfolk, for three district Congressional posts. Three candidates are seeking the two REA posts.

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Amendment Would Assist Drive for New Industries

The Nebraska Attorney General brought suit to enjoin York from proceeding on the grounds that the 1953 act was unconstitutional. The Supreme Court held that the act violated the state's constitution.

The present amendment was approved by the 1957 Legislature. It authorizes the Legislature to go ahead with the intent of the invalid 1953 act. But it requires that principal and interest on the revenue bonds shall be paid solely from revenues derived from the leasing of the property. The amendment also prohibits any municipality from operating as a business enterprise any property so acquired.

Members of the Legislature, proposing this amendment, expressed the opinion that the amendment would: (1) assist in bringing industry into the state, thus creating a more balanced economy; (2) ultimately increase employment opportunities in the state; (3) enable Nebraska to compete with other states in attracting new industries, especially in view of the fact that these other states are offering similar inducements; (4) assist smaller communities to get industry and (5) would not be an expense to the taxpayers.

Authorize the Legislature to establish a separate juvenile court.
Permit municipal corporations to acquire and own real and personal property to be leased to private enterprises and to issue revenue bonds to defray the cost thereof.
In order to become approved, the amendments must receive a majority of the votes cast in the election and must also be approved by 35 percent of the voters who take part in the election throughout the state.

HAD BETTER HAVE "STOOD IN BED"

It is difficult to calculate how many errors the GOP high command can safely make in this, at least heretofore, deeply committed Republican state. But a dispassionate observer must conclude that it will take magnificent resourcefulness to match the recent contribution of Richard Spelts, state GOP chairman.

Over the past weekend the chairman issued rancorous blasts at the Democratic party in general and Democratic Candidate for Governor, Ralph Brooks in particular.

He labelled the Democratic party as a conspiracy for national socialism and Brooks as a failure.

Such a straying from the record is less apt to sustain his indictments than it is to convince quite a number of Nebraskans with unresolvable convictions that the Republican high command is far more worried about the outcome of the November elections than the public thought.

And rather than annihilating Brooks, Spelts has invited the state to an examination of the educational and administrative record of a candidate who at this stage needs such a public examination. It will further his cause. Superintendent Brooks has ascended by steady steps to the leadership of one of the state's major educational communities (McCook) and has won sectional renown for rescuing school systems at the end of their rope, whether the cause be financial, educational or administrative. If a means for implementing a good educational and administrative record into his campaign has perplexed Mr. Brooks he got an unexpected and excellent assist from the enemy. Unusual administrative ability is a rare and wanted commodity in public service.

Mr. Spelts is also on untenable ground castigating the Democratic party for pursuits in which they have been badly outspent and outperformed by the Eisenhower administration. That goes all the way from a shockingly expensive and ineffective farm program to the most fabulous annual budgets and national debt flights in history.

Blue Devils Rally to Nip South Sioux Cards 16-13

Trading 13-7 at halftime, Wayne High's Blue Devils surprised South Sioux City with an outside running game last Wednesday night to edge the Cardinals 16-13 at South Sioux City.

The victory ran Wayne's current string to four straight and set the stage for Friday night's tussle with Wisner. Wayne must have a victory Friday to clinch a Husker conference playoff spot. The Blue Devils and Madison are currently tied for the West division lead with 2-0 records.

Wayne's comeback Wednesday was sparked by the running of freshman halfback Buster Likes, who crumpled the Cardinal defense with his end sweeps. Likes gained 90 of Wayne's 151 yards rushing for an average of 7.6 per carry.

The speedy freshman set up Wayne's winning touchdown on the first play of the fourth quarter as Likes was penalized 15 yards for holding. Likes, a wriggling 125-pounder, then swept left end on a fake pass play and raced 32 yards to a crucial first down on the Cardinal 21. He scored six plays later on another left end sweep to put Wayne in front 13-13. Roger Denesia passed to Bill Witt for the extra point.

Wayne opened the game's scoring late in the first quarter with a 62-yard march that included four pass completions without a miss by Denesia. His toss to Doug Finn was good for the final 20 yards. Warren Rodgers smashed over left tackle for the extra point to make it 7-0.

Wayne showed a glaring weakness on pass defense in the second quarter and the Cardinals exploited it for two touchdowns. The first came on a 24-yard pass from Rod Robertson to Jim Keefe, who was all alone behind the Wayne secondary. He juggled the ball momentarily and then raced across the goal line untouched.

The second Cardinal touchdown came with only 15 seconds remaining in the half. Robertson connected on a 19-yard pass to Bob Bachman, who was standing all alone on the Wayne goal line.

The play which made a big difference at the outcome of the game was a South Sioux punt four plays after the second half opened. Fullback Larry Deroin had his kick partially blocked and suffered a leg injury on the play. His running had sparked the Cardinal attack throughout the first half.
