

Bard, Weible Win in County Election Races

Wakefield Youth Drowns in Friday Auto Accident



NICHOLAS AVERMAN, 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. George Averman, Wakefield, died in the car pictured above about midnight Friday when it went out of control and plunged into Dog creek four miles northwest of Wayne. The car was driven by Dale Rice, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Rice, Concord. He and two other passengers in the car, Roberta Finn, 16, Carroll, and Sandra Jones, 18, Wayne, escaped injury. The death was the fortieth 1958 fatality in the 14-county area served by the Norfolk Safety patrol office as compared with 26 a year ago at the same date.

Public Meeting Set Friday on Coming School Bond Vote

Wayne city school board Monday evening sold four buildings of former District 14 school houses for a total of \$182 to three separate bidders.

Successful bidder on the school building was Wayne County club with a bid of \$125. Other bidders on the structure were Andrew H. Johnson, \$107, and Charles Jones with \$75 for the school house and \$100 for the school, coal shed and two outdoor toilets.

R. J. Langemeier bid \$35 for the coal shed and the Isaac Walton league bid \$2 for the other two outbuildings. Sealed bids were asked for the school houses after District 14 was annexed to Wayne city schools.

In other business the board approved bills of \$7,212.70 including \$479.26 in insurance premiums, okayed sending Principal Fred Rickers to a school administrators' meeting in Lincoln and discussed briefly a revised floor plan of the proposed new elementary building.

Discussion was postponed, however, until the Friday night public meeting on the proposed building, when Supt. Willert will explain the revisions and the reasons for the changes at Hotel Morrison.

The meeting will discuss the proposed \$424,000 bond issue to build a new elementary school on a site west of the present building acquired by the school board.

Custodian George Wendel has earned a limited custodian's certificate from the National School Custodians association, Willert said.

Six Wayne High students will attend the state music clinic in Grand Island Nov. 20-22, Willert said. Both vocal and instrumental numbers will be featured. Students pay their own expenses while the school pays entry fees.

Brock Family Displays Victory Smiles

Brock Tops Harrison in Second Try

Republican candidates won the two contested posts despite a national Democratic swing in Tuesday's general election in Wayne county. Results are unofficial until the official canvass is made Friday.

Republican C. A. Bard was re-elected county clerk with a 780-vote margin over Democrat Orval Hickerson. Bard received 1,897 votes to 1,117 for Hickerson.

Another Republican, Don Weible, Winside, was elected sheriff when he defeated George Bartels, Wayne Democrat, by 852 votes. The totals were 1,829 and 1,177.

Weible was appointed sheriff Wednesday morning by county commissioners to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Bob Goodell earlier this month. Weible will serve until his term officially starts Jan. 1.

Marvin Dunklau, Wayne, and Incumbent Jack Sweigard, Winside, won the two contested posts on the Wayne PPD board of directors. They will serve six-year terms.

Dunklau was the top vote-getter among three candidates. He received 2,043 to 1,658 for Sweigard and 1,474 for Rolfe Longe.

With one exception, Republicans won all the races in Wayne county balloting. The exception was Lawrence Brock, Wakefield, who boasted a 154-vote margin over Incumbent Republican R. D. Harrison, Norfolk, for the Third district Congressional seat. Brock had 1,604 votes to 1,450 for Harrison.

Brock's margin in Wayne county was about 100 less than that he carried in 1956 when he lost the district race to Harrison by 246 votes.

In 1956 Brock held a 1,079-vote margin over Harrison in the popular vote but lost the election when the mail ballots, counted only at the official canvass following the election, went overwhelmingly for Harrison.

Returns Wednesday morning from 437 of the 493 Third district precincts showed Brock had a margin of 9,142 votes in the district canvass following the election. The totals were 44,336 to 35,194.

Wayne county voters did not follow the state trends in voting for U. S. senator and governor. They backed the winning Huskska 1,931 to 1,051 over Frank Morrison, but also gave a big majority to Gov. Victor Anderson, 1,558 to 1,088 over Ralph G. Brooks. Democrat Brooks pulled the election's biggest surprise by unseating Anderson.

An oddity in the election was the defeat of J. R. Kelly, Democratic candidate for state auditor. He received 843 votes in Wayne county despite the fact he died Thursday. Kelly received nearly 100,000 votes over the state.

Incumbents in Wayne county, except for Bard, were without opposition for re-election. Treasurer Leona Bahde received the highest count with 2,747 votes. Supt. Gladys Porter received 2,641; Assessor Henry Arp, 2,707; Clerk of District Court John Bressler, 2,596; and Attorney Charles McDermott, 2,608.

Richard Adkins, Osmond banker, won the race for University of Nebraska regent in Wayne county. He received 1,286 votes to 940 for William Spear.

County voters also approved seven of the nine proposed amendments to the state constitution. The only two which failed to carry in county precincts were those to raise the pay of state senators and to allow cities to purchase industrial sites for leasing to private corporations. The initiative referendum to legalize bingo carried in the county by a slim 1,317 to 1,300 margin.

County Marks Seventh '58 Road Death Friday Night

Wayne county chalked up its seventh 1958 highway fatality Friday with the death of Nicholas Averman, 16, Wakefield, in a one-car crash four miles northwest of Wayne.

Averman, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Averman, Wakefield, died about 11:30 p.m. Friday when the car in which he was riding plunged into Dog creek. The youth, riding in the back seat, was unable to get out of the car and drowned when the car filled with water.

Three other persons in the car escaped serious injury. They were Driver Dale Rice, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Rice, Concord; Roberta Finn, 16, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Finn, Carroll; and Sandra Jones, 18, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. Jones, Wayne.

The accident occurred three miles north and one mile west of Wayne when the car failed to make a curve in the county road. The other three youths were able to crawl out, Miss Finn got to the road and hailed a passing car to get help.

The teenagers had attended high school football games—and were enroute to take the Finn girl home when the accident occurred. Funeral services for Averman were held Monday afternoon at the Wakefield Presbyterian church. Rev. Melvin O. Peterson officiated.

Mrs. Charles Soderberg sang "Safe in The Arms of Jesus," and "Near to The Heart of God." Vena Green was accompanist. Pallbearers were the youth's schoolmates, Loren Olson, Loren Anderson, Dale Fischer, Larry Donnelly, Fred Peterson and Donald Jensen. Burial was in the Wakefield cemetery.

Nicholas Conrad Averman was born Dec. 27, 1942. He was baptized in infancy and confirmed in the Wakefield Presbyterian church in 1956. He attended Logan Valley grade school and was a Wakefield high school sophomore at the time of his death. He was preceded in death by an infant brother.

Survivors include his parents; a sister, Mrs. Carola Hart, Arlington, and his grandmother, Mrs. Thomas Busby, Wakefield.

WSTC's orchestra, directed by Eugene Helm, will present its fall concert at 8 p.m. Monday at the city auditorium. The program is open to the public at no charge.

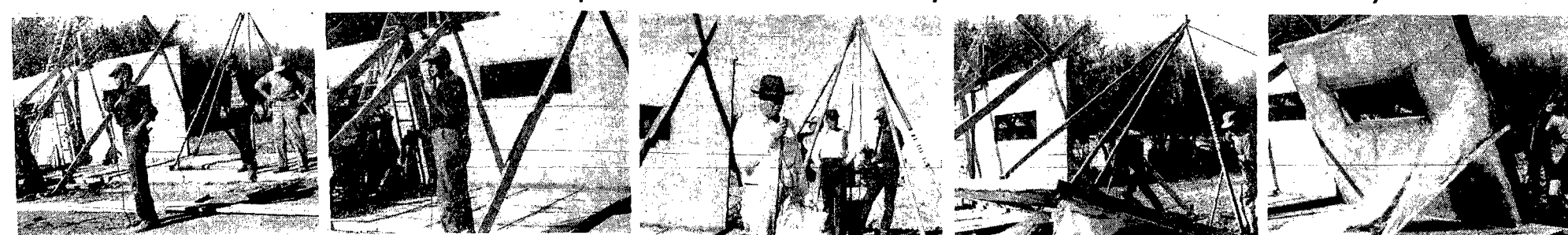
The 47-piece orchestra includes 36 students, seven faculty members, two faculty wives, a physician and a high school music teacher.

Over 100 Attend Experiment Farm Tilt-Up Demonstration Thursday



ABOUT 100 persons visited the NE Nebraska Experiment farm Thursday afternoon at Concord to learn how concrete buildings can be constructed by the tilt-up method. The photos above depict some of the scenes at the demonstration. Farm Supt. Dale Flowerday is shown at left explaining preliminary planning which

went into the construction of the new shelter for a livestock feeding project at the farm. University of Nebraska Engineer E. A. Olson explains forming and reinforcing of the 9 by 12-foot wall sections in the second photo. In the third photo, Larry Donegan, Lincoln, Portland Cement Association representative, explains cost

figures on the tilt-up construction and its possible uses for grain storage, bunker silos, machine and livestock sheds and other farm buildings. The final two photos show one of the wall sections being tilted into place through use of a tractor and tripod boom. Forms for the wall sections are made of 2x4 lumber. A sand bed

is made smooth and level and a sheet of polyethylene stretched over it. The form is then set over the polyethylene and staked into place. Reinforcing rods are placed and concrete poured into the horizontal forms. After curing, the wall sections are tilted into place and joined by concrete pilasters.

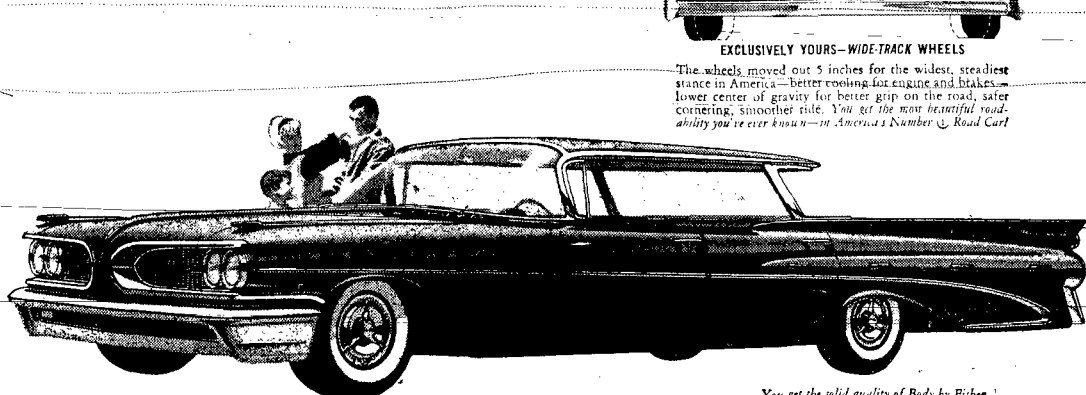

All Corn Sharers Eligible in Nov. 25 Corn Referendum
Any Wayne county resident who produced corn in 1958 or was entitled to share in the 1958 corn crop will be eligible to vote the Nov. 25 national corn referendum. ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell reminded today.

Purpose of this month's vote will be to determine whether the present corn program should be changed for 1959. The district campaign program in which there would be no acreage allotments and price supports would be determined on a different basis.

Any owner-operator, cash tenant, standing rent or fixed rent tenant, share tenant or sharecropper or the landlord of a share tenant will be eligible to vote. The landlord of a standing rent, cash rent or fixed rent tenant will not be eligible.

In addition, Sundell said, there will be three other groups of eligible voters: (1) Any operator or landlord of a crop for which 1959 corn allotment was established, even though corn was not planted; (2) Any persons who planted corn in 1958 but did not harvest it; and (3) Anyone who placed corn allotment lands in the 1958 soil bank.

If the new corn program is adopted by farmers in the referendum, price supports will be required to be offered each year on oats, rye, barley and grain sorghums, Sundell added.

In the past, generally speaking, the price of grain has been on the permissive list, Sundell explained. This means the secretary of agriculture was authorized but not required to make price supports available on them.

If these supports become mandatory as a result of the referendum, price support for each year will be at a level determined to be fair and reasonable in relation to the price support for corn, taking into consideration relative feed values, the ability of producers to keep supplies in line with demand and other factors considered in previous years.

Reseal Program Extended Year on Farm-Stored Grain

An extension of the reseal program on farm-stored price supported crops for an additional year was announced by County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell.

The early announcement, Sundell said, will give farmers an opportunity to plan for reseal for another year following the 1959 maturity date of certain commodities.

Producers who reseal will earn substantial storage payments for the additional storage period and at the same time, help to ease the overall storage situation in a year of record grain supplies, he added.

The table below lists the grain eligible for reseal by county and the storage payments. All payment rates are per bushel except grain sorghum, which are per hundredweight.

Under the farm storage facility loan program, farmers may borrow up to 80 percent of the cost of constructing new storage. These loans are repayable over a five-year period and bear interest at four percent.

If a farmer redeems his resale grain prior to the new maturity date (1960), his storage payment will be provided for the period under resale.

Producers who have 1957-crops and 1958-crop corn under extended resale will receive the full storage payment for the storage period ending in 1959 at the time they extend their resale for the additional period. They will receive another payment at the end of the extended period for storage earned during that period.

Storage payments on grains under resale will provide supplemental income to producers who have available storage or build new storage. Since the new method of pricing grain in Nebraska, producers will retain a considerably greater portion of storage payments than they have under resale programs prior to last year.

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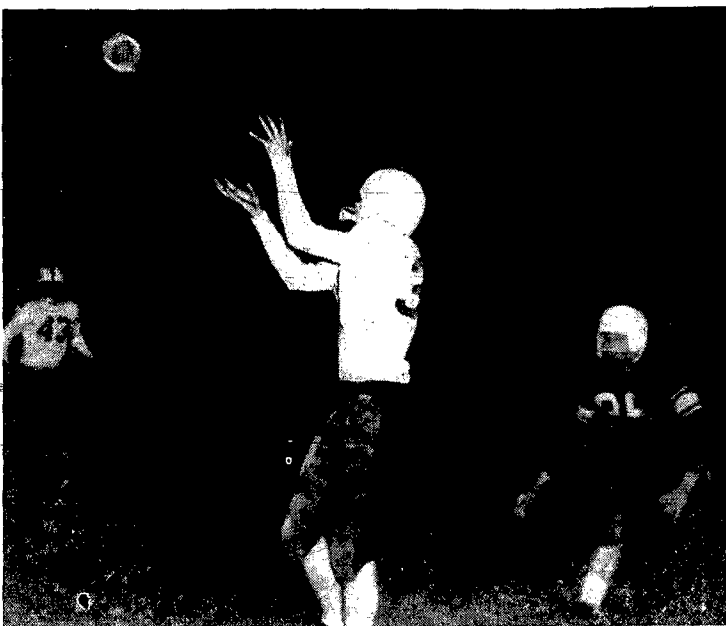
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Bill Witt Snares Denesia Pass for Touchdown

Hastings Stunned 21-13 as Potter Sparks Young 'Cats

Wayne State's Wildcats discarded their role as underdogs Saturday night to whip Hastings 21-13 at the college's Memorial stadium.

The victory was the second straight for Coach Russ Young's crew and gives them a 3-4 record in Nebraska College conference play. The Wildcats will close their loop season against Midland at Fremont Saturday afternoon.

The accurate passing of Don Potter, moved into the starting quarterback role when Bob Hoese was lost with injuries, provided the spark for Saturday's upset. The Columbus junior hit nine of 13 pass attempts to score one Wildcat touchdown and set up the other two.

It was midway in the final period before Hastings mustered its power to score two quick touchdowns. Bob Ditman blocked Eldon Pequette's first extra point kick, however, to stifle any hopes for a Bronco victory.

Wayne moved 84 yards for its first touchdown after Bob Schnitzler returned Tom Osborne's punt to the Wayne 16 midway in the first quarter. The march covered 100 yards in 11 plays, including three passes for 43 yards. Potter was given the honor of scoring on a sneak from one yard out. Skeeter Mahler made it 7-0 with the first of his three extra point kicks.

Wayne missed a second touchdown shortly after the second quarter, opened on a questionable fumble call. Claire Casper made a 16-yard dash to the Hastings 1 and was nailed from behind. After he hit the ground he bobbed the ball and Hastings recovered. The Wildcats moved 77 yards from their own 23 with Potter again successful on three of three passes.

Hastings mustered its first serious threat at this point. The Broncos moved 98 yards to the Wayne 11 on a fumbled punt. Casper's 44-yard punt put Wayne out of danger a few plays later.

Wayne threatened again early in the second half after Frank Hane recovered a fumble on the Hastings 10. Three running plays moved the ball to the 10 but Jake Moser intercepted Potter's second down pass in the end zone to prevent a touchdown.

Hastings punted seven plays later and Wayne started its second quarter march from its own 25. Big play in the move was a 40-yard Potter-to-Ditman pass which put the ball on the Bronco 11. Merlin Miteis crashed over right guard two plays later for the tally. Mahler added 18 yards on the next play.

Only two minutes later, Wayne moved the ball to the Hastings 10 on a 46-yard touchdown pass from Potter to Rod Tietort, who raced the final 35 yards down the east sideline.

Hastings then reacted swiftly as Coach Tom McLaughlin put in his second backfield unit. Jim Page and Pequette sparked a 65-yard march which was climaxed by Pequette's four-yard excursion around right end. His extra point kick was blocked by Ditman.

Only two minutes later, the Broncos had a second touchdown and Wayne fans were feeling less secure. Jim Pettit recovered Ken Peterson's short on-side kickoff on the Wayne 46. Page slanted over right tackle for 15 yards and then Pequette got 18 on the next play over the same hole. He then took a pitchout around right end for the final 14 yards. Page's placement made it 21-13.

The losers had another opportunity in the final three minutes but Tietort ended any hopes by intercepting Osborne's pass and returning it 29 yards to the Hastings 16 with a minute left. Wayne then ran three line plays to kill the clock.

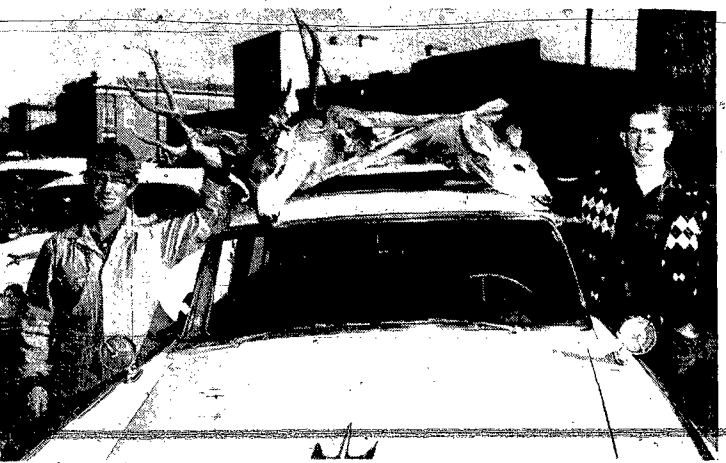

Exact Interstate Route May Be Announced Soon by Ress

Lincoln—The exact route of the interstate highway west from Lincoln will be announced soon, possibly this month. State Engineer L. N. Ress had tentatively set December as the time for announcing the route, but this could be advanced. It is anticipated the segment from Lincoln to Grand Island will follow a straight line between the two cities.

From there on is the question. There has been controversy over whether the four-lane road should go north or south of the Platte river. A stretch of the highway between Gretna and Omaha is now usable, but it is not connected to the city by hard-surfaced roads.

The cost of the interstate per mile runs from \$300,000 in some rural areas to a staggering \$7 million in Omaha. An average per mile will be about \$600,000.

Comments Ress: "These costs are considered average or below average in a comparison with costs of interstate construction in other states, because we have no extremely mountainous regions to contend with and our miles of right-of-way in heavily populated urban areas are few."

The route is fast taking shape between Omaha and Lincoln and travel over that segment is expected in 1960.

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County Agent's Column

Agent Advises Thorough Watering of Evergreens in Fall to Prevent Damage

Unless you have several good rains before freezing weather are likely to suffer from lack of water before spring. Evergreen needles are really small leaves that give off moisture all winter. When the surrounding soil is dry the evergreens have no way to get water once they have used the available moisture. Severe damage may result. It is important that the plant be watered thoroughly during these late fall days. If you have a pressure water system, let the garden hose run slowly under the tips of the branches for several hours. The area occupied by a mass of feeding roots should be thoroughly soaked.

If you must carry water to the trees, pour several large pails of water around the base of the evergreen. To keep this water from running off rapidly, build a small circular earth dam around the tree. This will hold the water long enough to allow it to soak into the ground around the tree where it will do the most good.

Hog Futures Plan A revival of trading in hog futures, a market plan tried out in the 1930's and abandoned because of the depression, is being considered by the Chicago Board of Trade.

The idea is to establish a market on which hogs can be bought and sold for future delivery. It would be similar to the operations on grain and lard. Such a hog futures market—the first and only market of its kind on record—existed at the Chicago Exchange building from 1930 to 1932.

Proponents of hog futures trading assert that it would offer a free market which relies upon supply and demand to set prices, and all parties involved in the meat industry—and establish more stable pork prices for consumers.

Hog futures trading might prove rewarding to hog producers. Hog prices would tend to be established by total supply and demand and futures prices thus established would have a direct effect on daily hog prices. Hedging would allow hog producers to transfer some of the market risk, guaranteeing

them a specific price for hogs, as has long been done in the grain market.

Sorghum Fields Caution Turning cattle into harvested sorghum fields is risky until two weeks following a killing frost. Stunted or second growth is usually high in prussic acid which can cause poisoning and sudden death to cattle.

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Farm News and Views

Increase in Hog Numbers Points to Less Profit Margin; Choose Large Litter Sows

INCREASE IN HOG numbers points to smaller profit margins in 1959. More efficient production from your present breeding herd is your best bet to maintain income. Selecting sows that produce large litters and drop pigs that convert feed most efficiently will return more money than increasing your sow herd. Call out sows that are not performing well this fall. Select gilts on the basis of type and litter size.

And don't forget the boar—he's half the pig crop. Your best bet is to buy only production-tested boars. Records are the best basis for judging boar value.

MILK PRICES will reach their peak this month, say price specialists. To receive the full benefit of higher prices, you'll want to increase production as much as possible. Low-quality hay and other inferior roughages will need to be supplemented with liberal amounts of concentrates. Liberal concentrate use, in view of low cost corn and other feed grains, could mean a considerable increase in your milk check during November.

CROP HARVESTING will soon be completed. Before you put your machinery in storage, check it over and make repairs. Replacing worn parts and checking for proper operation now will reduce bottle-necks at the outset of next season's harvesting period. Much time and even a crop can be lost waiting for parts and deal-

er service at that time. Also, prior to storing, don't overlook the use of grease, oil and paint. This is good insurance on a large investment.

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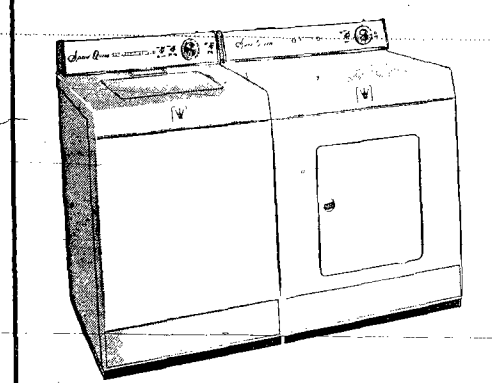
