Wayne citizens are asking voters to approve a \$42,000 bond issue to build such a school for us-their children. This picture, taken in the fifth grade room during a cless session, shows only part of the 37 pupils crowded into a single room, far too many for one teacher to instruct adequately. In 1955 the Wayne school board tequest-ed the State Department of Education to survey. the lacal school and make recommendations to better conditions. At that time the state sug-gested the school acquire a site and begin plans to build an elementary unit. In 1958 the school board requested a second survey. This time the recommendation was essentially the same, except the need was described as more urgent. The surveyors explain-ed that the newly acquired site would be more desirable for an elementary unit. The school board was wise in asking pro-fessional advice. Any individual does the same , when he needs legal assistance he visits a lawyer; when he needs medical help he sees. a physician. Does it seem wise to visit a doctor, then tose bigs dwice aside because it does not happen to please us? Building the new school would hore other benefits other than added classroom space. Pri-mary purpose of any school construction pro-ject is to insure our children of the best education possible. We must do this to insure their future.
