Council, College Seeking Cut In New Gas Contracts Offered

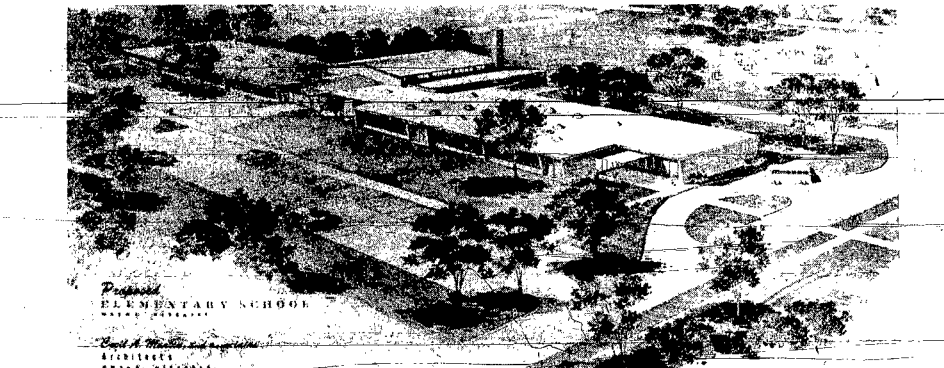
Proposed gas rate increases for the city auditorium, high school and WSTC provided the main topic of discussion at a Wayne city council meeting last Tuesday night.

State Democratic Future May Hang on State Tax Problems

LINCOLN—How much should state agencies spend during the next two years? This is the problem that will face the 1959 Legislature which meets Jan. 6. Spending has always been a state problem and Nebraska has no corner on it.

Legislatures in recent years have professed to be economy minded—yet the overall budget has been increased steadily. This, however, does not necessarily mean state senators have been spendthrifts.

The last Legislature, before the session, showed indications of being the tightest money-wise in recent years. Yet the budget for 1958 was more frugal than that of Gov. Victor Anderson and surpassed his recommendations.

One of the big headaches was Federal money which came into the Highway department in bushel baskets. Figuratively speaking, that was the result of accelerated programs on the Interstate highway, and other state roads. This allocation is determined in Washington.

The problem of state taxes will loom heavy in the 1959 session. Pinned to the problem will be the future of the Democratic party in this state. Most observers close to government will agree the state must spend more money to meet the demands of the public for services.

1. Speed Up Student Progress

Elementary students now cannot do their best because overcrowding gives teachers little time to help individual students.

2. Provide Adequate Phys Ed Program for Elementary

Larger playground space would allow organized play for all the grades. A physical education program could be instituted in the new building.

3. Provide Hot Lunch Program

A hot lunch program would permit shorter noon hours, more children to eat at school and have hot, well-balanced meals.

4. Provide Adequate Locker Space

Three and four children now must share one locker, with the resulting confusion and loss of apparel.

5. Expand Junior High Program

Enrollment figures show additional space will be needed in junior high.

6. Improve Junior High Curriculum

Home economics, laboratory and shop facilities are some of the subjects needed in the junior high program.

7. Expand Laboratory Facilities

Laboratory facilities should be expanded to include both junior and senior high, plus having better facilities available for senior high grades.

8. Improve Home Ec Program

Home economics studies now are carried on in widely separated rooms. Consolidation would improve learning in this subject.

9. Expand School Library

Library now is crowded. Plans call for remodeling and enlarging to include a study hall.

10. Provide More Shower and Locker-Room Space

Locker rooms are now crowded, damp and soggy. By clearing the building for junior and senior high pupils, separate rooms can be provided for showers and dressing.

11. Provide Shop and Home Ec for Junior High

Shop and home ec. courses could be made available to junior high students if the new school is built.

12. Improve Guidance-Counseling Program

Space for a better guidance-counseling program with storage for materials would improve our program.

13. Provide A Projection Room

Films are becoming increasingly important in teaching. A projection room with storage for equipment and films is desperately needed.
