History shows the best time to build is now. "Now" be henever the need arises. The longer building is delayed, ore the school will cost when it is built. Surely no one can re need a new school now.

In Fremont a few years ago, voters rejected by a narrow margin a bond issue to build a complete senior high school. Plans colled for a building complete with boys' gym, girls' gym and an indoor swimming pool. About two years later the bond issue was approved, but costs had increased to the point where the girls' gym and the swimming pool had to be lopped from the plans to Reep casts within the original estimate.

Much information—and some misinformation—has been disseminated about the Wayne plan. A group of women interested in seeing Wayne become a better town with better schools plan this week to distribute a pamphlet telling of conditions at Wayne High. An ad in this issue of The Wayne Herald also urges voters to approve the issue. Both the ad and the pamphlet contain good, factual information about our common problem.

There are other factors to consider, too. Factors which separate progressive towns from backward lowns Good schools are integral parts of any community . . one of the most important factors considered by potential newcomers to a city. Without good schools no town can be progressive and grow.

Would you have moved to Wayne if the school system had been second-rate?

The reason schools have been good here is because someone in years past had the foresight to build for the future. Now that future has come and gone and we must again build the future. and we must do it now before costs increase more and mare and we find the present bond issue is too small to do the job.

Good schools mean much to a community and today's schools must be much more advanced than the schools of even 20 years ago. Increased emphasis on sciences, engineering and mathematics call for more intensive study in these fields. Universities continually complain that the average high school graduate isn't ready for college, yet many communities insist their children attend school in buildings that were made to handle classes of 50 years ago. Crowded classrooms, poor lighting, poor facilities are foisted on the child who is expected to progress and prosper in an age of Sputniks, space travel and other scientific marvels.

The three "K's" were sufficient education for the average person 25 years ago. These fundamentals have lost none of their importance today—but they must share top honors with the sciences, specialized training in fields of business, intended to the sciences, specialized training in fields of business, intended to the sciences of the sciences of

All these seem like high falutin' words written to create an emotional appeal. Perhaps they are ..... but think them over. They are solid truth. We can speak of pride in our schools, pride in our community and the necessity to keep up with other towns for appearance's sake, but it is a cold, stark reality that if we do not provide our youngtsers with good schools now, they will suffer in the near future.

Our present Wayne High is crowded from the sixth grade down. There is no indication that enrollments will drop—the opposite is true. Students now in the primary grades may have to go to school in split shifts so that each child can get the basic parts of an education if we do not provide more room soon.

Wayne High now is in a healthy financial condition with one of the lowest school tax levies in the state—paying about half what similar towns in Nebraska are paying. The Carroll district was annexed without an increase in taxes and the district joined Wayne free of debt and with a bank account of more than \$1,000. If we can ever afford to build it is now. Two surveys by the State Department of Education have recommended Wayne begin a building pragram. The lost survey, taken this year, urgently suggested we begin immediations.

According to the school board's plans and the recommendations of the State Department, the best and most ecanomical way to get more space is to build a new elementary unit and convert the present building into a junior-senior high school.

Cost of this program to the individual taxpayer is surprisingly low. Best estimates for the building levy are for any increase of less than six mills. Thus, a property assessed at \$3,500 would pay only \$21 more per year and the new school would enhance the resale value of that property.



## 1. Speed Up Student Progress

## 11. Provide Shop and Home Ec for Junior High

Shop and home ec. courses could be made available to junior high students if the new school is built.

## 12. Improve Guidance-Counseling Program

Space for a better guidance-counseling program with storage for materials would improve our program.

## 13. Provide A Projection Room

Films are becoming increasingly important in teaching. A projection room with storage for equipment and films is desperately headed.


