61 Percent Okay Plans

Wayne School district voters Tuesday approved the \$224,000 bond issue to build a new elementary school in Wayne and remodel the present building into a junior high school unit.

Over 61 percent of the voters approved the measure. A total of 929 votes were cast at the polls with 569 registered "for" and 359 "against." Only one ballot was spoiled.

Eight absentee and disabled voter ballots remain to be counted.

The board makes its official election canvass tonight. The eight votes could not change the outcome of the election.

Voting on the question Tuesday were residents of District 17, composed of the Wayne district and Carroll and District 14 units added to Wayne this year through consolidation.

Tentative plans for the six-story elementary school include 12 classrooms, kindergarten room, library, multi-purpose room and other rooms necessary for operation and maintenance.

Estimated cost of the building is \$11.60 per square foot or a total of \$332,700 for the building proper with an additional \$15,000 for a new kitchen and serving equipment.

About \$33,000 will be spent on site improvements such as grading and excavating storm drainage, sidewalks, parking areas, etc.

Following is a breakdown on costs on the new building:

- Building, 28,700 sq. ft. \$332,700
- Kitchen and serving equipment 15,000
- Architect's fees and miscellaneous 19,500
- New furnishings and equipment 10,000
- Additional site 2,500

Total estimated cost for new school and related site improvements — \$412,500

Estimated cost of altering present building to convert it to a junior-senior high school unit is \$11,000.

The mill levy necessary to retire the bonds in 20 years is about six mills based on present valuation of the district.

Turnout for the election was about the same as for the swimming pool bond issue which was held as part of the 1954 city election.

Soloists Named for Sunday's 'Messiah' Program at WSTC

Presentation Scheduled at Rice Building

Wayne's twenty first presentation of Handel's "The Messiah" will be presented at 8 p. m. Sunday at WSTC's new Rice Memorial building. A dress rehearsal is set at 2:30 p. m.

Wayne's choral and orchestra, augmented by dozens of area singers, will present the classic oratorio. It comes only two weeks before the start of the 1960 bi-centennial year honoring the American composer, George Frideric Handel.

A brief dedication of the new WSTC building will precede the oratorio. President W. A. Brandenburg will speak. Fred Dale, chairman of the dedication committee, will present a memorial in honor of the late Dr. John D. Rice, WSTC president from 1951 to 1956.

The new auditorium-feldhouse was one of Dr. Rice's major goals in development of the college, a goal he guided through early planning stages.

As in previous years, the Wayne Kiwanis club will join in sponsoring the presentation. No admission will be charged but a free-will offering will be taken. Kiwanis will use the money left after expenses to furnish a music scholarship for some talented and needy WSTC student. Any remainder will go to support club youth projects, and a foreign student the club hopes to sponsor here next year.

Dr. Russell Anderson, director of the oratorio chorus, said about 260 singers will take part. He announced the following soloists:

Soprano — Doris Ganz, Gibbon, a Hastings college graduate with a master's degree from Columbia university. She has taught at Mary Hardin-Baylor college, Belton, Tex., Nebraska Wesleyan university and Hastings college. She also sang one season with the Dallas, Tex. Light Opera.

Contralto — Darlene Anderson, 1955 WSTC music graduate now teaching vocal music in the Wichita, Kan. elementary schools. She sang with the Colorado university choir in 1957.

Tenor — Gailford Ryan, Ewing superintendent of schools. He is a 1947 WSTC music graduate with a master's degree from Drake university.

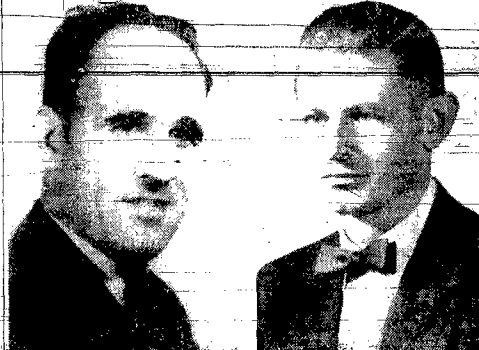

Staffing with Competent People Biggest Problem of Administration—Brandenburg

The greatest problem in college administration today is the problem of staffing with competent people — not of providing expanded physical plants, great as that need is.

This was the statement by Dr. W. A. Brandenburg, WSTC president, speaking Saturday in Lincoln at the annual meeting of the Nebraska Association of Colleges and Universities.

"The matter of salary remains the heart of the problem of attracting persons for college level training," Dr. Brandenburg told educators at the meeting.

"Unless the colleges and universities of Nebraska keep pace with surrounding states on the matter of salary, they will find themselves with positions unfilled or filled by the unqualified."

Increases have been made by all, increases which all believed to be adequate, but which experience has shown otherwise, Dr. Brandenburg said.

"I venture to say that within the next year not a college or university in our state has been spared the painful experience of losing staff members of real excellence because of salary."

But there are hopeful signs, he added. Competition of government, business, industry and the professions appears to have eased. Colleges are now receiving expressions of interest in teaching from sources virtually closed to them in the past three to five years.

"However, unless we are able to hold teaching loads within reasonable limits and to provide the salary and fringe benefits available elsewhere, our new-found colleagues will not come — and if they remain with us," Dr. Brandenburg said.

Tie and separate letter mail into local and out-of-town packages. Labels for this purpose can be obtained by asking at the postoffice window.

The roses may be used as field barriers, along fence lines, and around odd areas, along new or old shelterbelts, along terraces, etc. They grow best in dry, fertile soil. However, they will grow in most any soil if cared for and cultivated. The area to be planted in the spring should always be plowed in the fall.

Roses should be planted one foot apart in a row. Thus for roses to go 1,000 feet, a thousand roses should be ordered. Those interested should place an order immediately with Game Commission office, Karl Stefan Field, Norfolk.

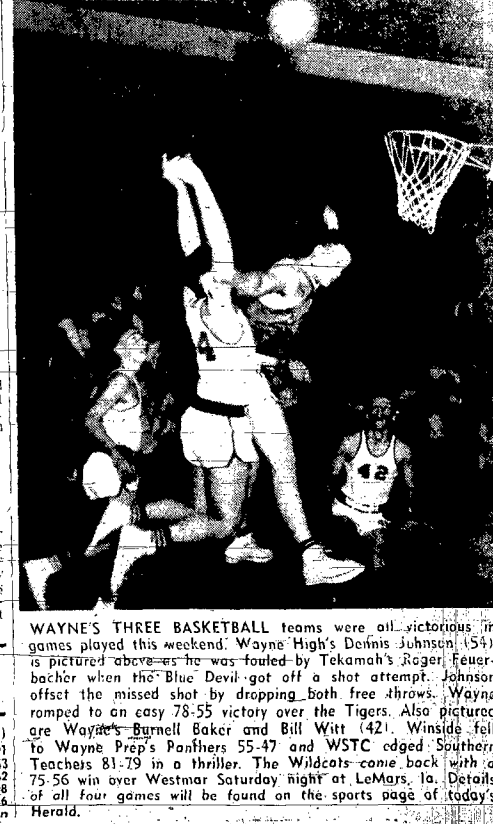

Capitol News 9,000 Voters Didn't Vote In November Race for Governor

Lincoln—The State Trade school, Milford, has prospered in recent years under the State Board of Education. Created by the Legislature in 1941 to teach trades, the school has been the focal point for much controversy in the Legislature.

Two strong attempts were made to abolish the school, after opposition which included some unions in Omaha.

In 1955, the newly-created State Board of Education was given the task of supervising the school. This had been done in the past by the State Board of Vocational Education, a group composed of the governor, state superintendent of schools and three members named by the governor to represent agriculture, industry and labor.

When voters authorized a State Board of Education it assumed functions of the vocational board. After the status of the school was definitely determined, it was cut in for a share of the state building fund, a property tax levy. Money began coming in to upgrade a run-down physical plant, aggravated by tornado damage.

In its recent action relative to the school, the board went on record in favor of legislation to change the name of the institution to the Nebraska Vocational Technical School.

School Director Lowell Welch said students "are tired of being asked how much more time they have to serve because the school's name changes."

Other action of the board was allowing the school to reduce its school year from 40 to 38 weeks. This is because Welch said there is a 45 percent drop in enrollment the final two weeks when students return to farms or seek summer employment.

Election Figures
Some of the final figures on Nebraska's Nov. 4 general election proved interesting.

The total vote, which is measured by the number of ballots, was 430,769. The total vote in the governor's race was 421,293. This means 9,000 persons who took out ballots did not vote in the governor's race.

Also the further down the ballot a name was, the larger was the number of persons who failed to vote. Secretary of State Frank Marsh topped the Republican ticket with a 27,069 win, but 28,228 persons still did not ballot on the race.

As a result of the State Canvassing Board's Nov. 4 general election, the following are the results:

Normal Board
The State Normal board, which governs the four teachers colleges, has outlined its spending requests for 1959-61. Wanted is \$2.4 million more from the property tax-supported state general fund.

Further, the University of Nebraska went on record for a \$5.8 million increase in tax funds. The total from these two big spending agencies is \$8.2 million more.

Details of what is wanted by the schools specifically will come out at budget hearings. Basically, however, officials of both groups say salaries will account for the lion's share of the boost. The Normal board supervises colleges at Wayne, Chadron, Peru and Kearney.

Traffic Trouble
The state of Nebraska had big traffic troubles in the first 10 months of this year.

Robert Pease, chief of the state accident records bureau, said the state registered the fourth worst traffic death increase in the nation, compared with the same period in 1957.

The National Safety Council, Pease reports, listed Nebraska with a 15 percent increase in fatalities over 1957. November high-way deaths in Nebraska were up 18 percent from the same month last year. Nebraska's increase was topped only by South Dakota, Maine and Idaho, in that order.

Corporations
An annual task has been performed by the Secretary of State's office that is dissolving of domestic and foreign corporations for failing to pay delinquent occupation taxes. Dissolved were 177 domestic and 30 foreign corporations.

Next move by the office is filling of liens against properties in Nebraska in an attempt to collect back taxes, owed over a two-year period. Most of the corporations owed \$11.50, but some had bills as high as \$207.

County Agent's Column

New Certified Seed Directory Available Through County Agent with Descriptions

A new directory listing all certified seed growers in the state is available at the county agent's office. A brief description of each variety is given.

Varieties are eligible for certification only after thorough testing by the Nebraska Experiment Stations. They must be adapted and superior under Nebraska conditions.

Seed eligible for certification, must be of approved origin, must grow in fields which pass official field inspections, must be free from noxious weeds and must meet certain grading requirements including germination.

Following is a list of 1958 Wayne county certified seed producers and the variety grown:

Farm Breeds
The first wool clinic and registered breed sale will be held Dec. 13 on the college of agriculture campus in Lincoln. The event is sponsored by the Nebraska Sheep Breeders and the Animal Husbandry department at the college.

Dairy record keeping is not only important to the large dairyman but is as important if not more so to the smaller farmer. With
