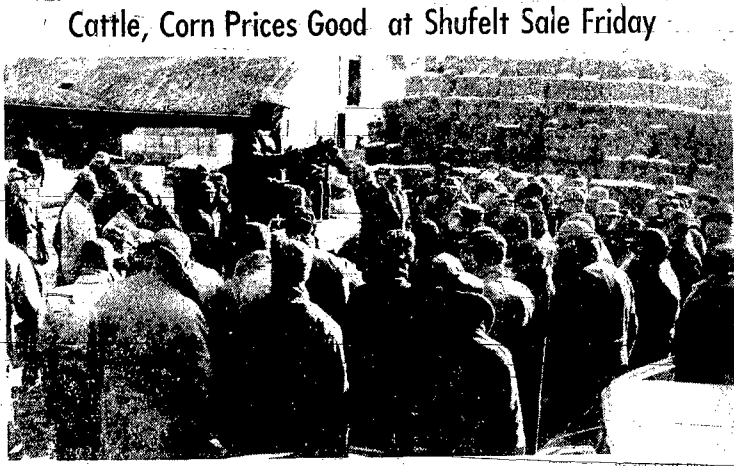


Cause Unknown for Saturday Store Blaze

The blaze was the first major fire in the downtown business district since the McDonald department store was damaged about 20 years ago. A \$10,500 blaze destroyed the Charles Meyer sale barn in July 1954.

'Messiah' Attended by 2,000 At College Sunday Evening

Stirring music of Handel's "The Messiah" and dedication of the newest WSTC campus building attracted a crowd of nearly 2,000 persons Sunday night at Rice Memorial building. The audience and chorus of about 250 singers were the largest in the 21-year history of the Kiwanis club-sponsored event. In a brief dedicatory talk, WSTC President W. A. Brandenburg eulogized the late Dr. John D. Rice, college president from 1937 to 1956. "In his work as an educator Dr. Rice influenced the lives of countless thousands of people. Three Fire Units Battle Surber Fire

Investigation was still underway Wednesday to determine the cause of a Saturday morning fire which destroyed the two-story building and contents of Surber's furniture store at 115 West Third street. Exact estimates of the loss have still not been completed. The two-story building owned by Edward Seymour is considered a total loss. It was constructed in 1949 at a cost of \$27,000.

Only the walls of the 50-by-80-foot building were left standing. It is believed they will have to be razed. The building was partially covered by insurance.

None of the furniture stock owned by Ray Surber was saved. It included a large amount of new merchandise recently received. Surber's sons, Charles and Harold, operate the business. Surber said they are still checking on the amount of new furniture before establishing a loss estimate. The stock was also covered partially by insurance.

Secretary of Surber's are still indefinite about plans for the future. Three persons notified the telephone company to have the fire alarm sounded almost simultaneously. Bob Johnson, who was

first to call from the bakery phone booth. Seconds later a call from Policeman S. C. Thompson. A third unidentified person knocked on the door of the phone office to signify the alarm. Wayne firemen answered the call and summoned assistance from Wakefield and Winside a short time later. Volunteers were also recruited from the large crowd which gathered.

Firemen battled the flames in below zero weather. They poured about 100,000 gallons of water onto the flames in the futile attempt to save parts of the store or its contents.

Prompt action prevented the blaze from spreading to the adjoining Rinchart supermarket when its roof caught fire. The firemen also put a continuing stream on a telephone cable which runs along the east side of the Seymour building. Had the cable been downed, it would have disrupted phone service on the north end of Wayne and all long-distance service to the east.

The east wall of the supermarket building owned by R. G. Fuebler cracked and burned through in one place. There was no damage to the grocery stock, however, as these fighting the fire moved the stock away from the threatened wall.

A check of the Seymour building heating plant has removed any possibility of its being the cause of the blaze, Seymour said. He pointed out that the plant is a gas burner enclosed in a boiler with asbestos insulation. These remained intact and electrical connections to the plant wiring were not destroyed by the flames.

The fire was the first major blaze in Wayne's downtown business district since 1954 when a \$10,500 blaze destroyed the Charles Meyer sale barn on South First. Other major fires in the business area have included:

May 23, 1908: Brown-McDonald store, \$24,000.

Apr. 19, 1932: Petersen billiard hall, (now the Mint Bar), \$4,200.

Mar. 8, 1931: Jeffrey's style shop (now Gene's cafe), \$8,600.

Aug. 6, 1930: Howard Hrabak store (now Bill's produce), \$9,100.

Nov. 1, 1927: B. W. Wright and W. C. Corryell garage (now Wayne Foods-co.), \$28,000.

Thanksgiving, 1891: One of the biggest fires in Wayne history. It destroyed six buildings in the half block on the west side of Main street south from Third street to the alley.

President Outlines Long Range Building at WSTC

A long range building program for WSTC is being studied by the State Normal board. President W. A. Brandenburg gave the board a list of 11 proposed building or remodeling projects at a meeting Monday in Lincoln. The proposed projects would cost an estimated \$2,127,500. Dr. Brandenburg described the need for the buildings as ranging from desirable to critical.

Six of the 11 projects are for new buildings: fine arts, elementary school, swimming pool, two dormitories and a maintenance shop-supply house. Four of the other projects are for remodeling present buildings.

The college presented this survey of physical plant needs at the request of the board. Only Wayne of the four teachers colleges offered a comprehensive survey, although all did propose dormitory projects.

The board authorized WSTC to retain an architect to draw preliminary plans for two dormitories. Dr. Brandenburg said an Omaha firm will begin the plans soon.

Dormitories are financed only through money from revenue bonds that are paid off by dorm rental fees. No tax money is involved. The other building projects would be financed from the state institutional building levy, if approved by the Normal board. Here are the projects outlined by Dr. Brandenburg:

A fine arts building to house music, art, speech and drama departments, now scattered among several buildings with improved facilities. Estimated cost with equipment: \$450,000.

An elementary school to relieve crowding in Wayne Prep and to provide modern facilities for elementary teaching. The Prep Building would then be converted at small cost for use by the high school and division of education and psychology. Cost of the grade school: \$325,000.

Two dormitories for 150 students each, one of them to be built for use by men or women in any given year. Present dorm capacity is \$45, all full now. Cost: \$475,000 for each dorm.

Swimming pool oratorium to be added as a wing to the Rice Memorial building. Originally planned with the Rice building, this was eliminated for lack of money. Cost: \$150,000. The present

Budget Requests by Agencies Could Boost Levy Two Mills

Lincoln—A big problem for about every household in Nebraska is looming now in the Capitol. That is, the state budget.

The state budget in administration of the Legislature will be faced with two budgets—one by outgoing Governor Victor E. Anderson and the other from the new Governor, Ralph G. Brooks.

Budgets are had enough for the average family, but in state government they are doubly difficult. The reason is state agencies must project and decide how much money they need for a two-year period which ends 2 1/2 years from the time they make the decision.

The pattern on a budget begins when an agency makes a calculation on funds required. This is submitted to the governor who holds a hearing and calls in the agency to defend why it must have the money.

The governor makes his recommendation to the Legislature where the subject is assigned to the budget committee which holds a hearing also, calling in the agency, then recommending to the Legislature which makes the decision.

Despite the involved process, it is rare that an agency runs out of funds before the two years is up. This has been one of the big arguments against changing legislative sessions to yearly instead of biennial.

A final tally of requests for tax money by 41 agencies that use it was appropriated by the Legislature two years ago. This could boost the state property tax levy to \$9.79, instead of the present \$9.47, if all the requests are granted.

Interstate highway will be shuffled over to the Democratic administration of Governor-elect Ralph Brooks for decision. Gov. Victor Anderson, outgoing Republican, made an error in a state question of the four-lane highway west of Lincoln would be announced.

The chief executive said first of all, work on figures obtained during a survey of two possible routes for the road—one north, the other south of the Platte river—is not complete. It will be after Jan. 1 before the job is done, Gov. Anderson said.

Gov. Anderson commented that a Gov. policy decision should be left to the Brooks administration. Actually, what his action does is push to the Democrats the tough job of telling people where the road will go, with the end result that someone will be angry.

The State Highway department has been working on the two routes for the past two years.

Nebraska's four-year drive for a local airline network has paid off. The Civil Aeronautics Board in Washington awarded a minimum of two round trips daily on Nebraska routes with Lincoln and Omaha hubs of the new system.

State Aeronautics Director Roland Harr says the new service will go into effect Feb. 16. The CAB expressed extreme confidence in the ability of the Nebraska department and went along with the state's entire air plan.

This makes Nebraska the focal point in the nation in a system of local air lines where traffic is stimulated by a well planned promotional program.

Commented Harr: "We all fought together until we got it. We made up our mind what was needed, tried to be reasonable about it and got all cities to agree on the route pattern."

"Then," Harr continued, "we received the unanimous support of our Congressional delegation. Working together did it."

The network will shorten the distance between Nebraska cities, many of which are now as far away from the state capital in air miles as Chicago.

Opponents of bingo legislation in the next Legislature are working hard to get a suitable law. Voters approved a Constitutional amendment which gives the Legislature authority to enact legislation.

State VFW Adjutant Robert Robert Lowe called a meeting to iron out details of a proposed bill. The Eagles co-sponsored a successful petition drive to put the question on the ballot. Leading the opposition was the Rev. Carroll Lemon, executive secretary of the Nebraska Council of Churches.

The factions tentatively agreed to proposals to limit operation of bingo games to non-profit organizations, permitting a maximum of 20 games in a 24-hour period and with no consumption of liquor in the same room as the game is held.

A limit of 25 cents per card was recommended as a charge with no one person playing more than two cards at a time in a game. The prize would be limited to three-fourths the total amount paid by players of the game.

Although it takes time to make it, according to Beatrice Cooke, director of the test kitchens in Chicago where the recipe was created, it is a lot of fun too.

Apricot Braid  
(Makes a large braid)  
1/4 cup milk, scalded  
1/4 cup butter  
1/4 cup sugar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup warm water  
1-ounce package active dry yeast  
1 egg, beaten  
4 to 4 1/2 cups sifted flour

Apricot Filling  
1 cup chopped cooked dried apricots  
1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed  
2/3 cup water  
1/2 cup chopped nuts  
1 tablespoon lemon juice

Glaze  
1 egg yolk, slightly beaten with 2 tablespoons milk  
Crumb Mixture  
2 1/2 tablespoons flour  
1 tablespoon sugar  
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon butter

Combine milk, butter, sugar and salt; stir until dissolved. Cool to lukewarm. Combine yeast and water; stir until dissolved. Stir in milk mixture and the egg mix well. Add flour gradually; beat until smooth. Turn out on lightly floured surface and knead until smooth and elastic. Put in greased bowl, brush top with melted butter, cover and let rise in warm place until double in bulk. Punch down and turn out on lightly floured surface. Roll out in shape of rectangle 8 by 18 inches. Place on greased cookie sheet
