Capitol News

Plenty of Fuss Expected on State Highway Commission

Lincoln—There will be plenty of fuss in the 1959 Legislature over the Advisory State Highway Commission. This is a seven-member, bi-partisan group appointed by the governor to advise the state engineer on policy. By law it has no executive authority and cannot hold executive sessions (those closed to the public and press). It will be presented to the lawmakers Tuesday to establish an executive commission that would have power to decide road problems, thus removing considerable authority from the engineer and governor.

Soil Tests Show Phosphate Most Needed Soil Improver on Farms in Wayne County

We have considerable evidence that phosphate is needed in much greater quantities than any used in this area. Several farmers report surprising response from phosphate applications much heavier than usually recommended.

Board of Control

The important Board of Control is the subject of much study in the Unicameral. A move is underway to abolish the board and replace it with a five-member commission appointed by the governor. This group would decide policy and appoint heads of various fields, such as mental health and children's services.
