School Board Asks Bids on Property, Seven-Room House

Bills, auditorium rental at Carroll and disposal of school properties occupied by the Wayne School board Monday night.

After approving bills totaling \$1,775.61, the board discussed rates for auditorium rental for school use at Carroll, David Garwood, appealing as the Carroll village board told the board the usual rate for the building was \$10 per day.

After considering contracting on a yearly basis, the board approved rental on a use basis with the plan of using the figures to determine next year's action.

The board also approved advertising for bids on school properties including approximately an acre of land forming District 14 school a mile north and a mile east of Wayne. Other properties advertised include the seven-room house on the site of the new elementary school, an oil-burning furnace, electric water heater and a kitchen cabinet-sink, all of which are presently installed in the house.

Sealed bids should be at the office of Supt. E. W. Willert by 5 p.m. Feb. 2.

In other action the board discussed insulated metal wall panel construction for the new elementary school. Supt. E. W. Willert, Board Member H. E. Hein, and Board Secretary Ed Seymour went to Sioux City Tuesday to examine buildings using this type of construction.

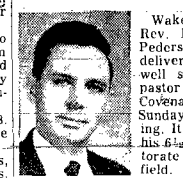

Parking Ban Will Start On Jan. 29

A new parking ordinance aimed at combating Wayne's congested parking problem was passed by the city council at a busy session last Tuesday night.

The ordinance, which will go into effect Jan. 29, involves all or portions of 11 streets in the city's residential area. The Herald will print a map showing the streets where parking is prohibited in its Jan. 29 issue.

Streets on which there will be no parking include:

- The south side of Seventh street across the entire city;
- East side of Sherman street from First street to Seventh;
- Both sides of Tenth street from Windom to Walnut;
- North side of Twelfth west from Walnut to the east side of WSTC;
- East side of Main from Fifth to the north city limits;
- North side of Eleventh from Main west 150 feet;
- South side of Tenth from Main west 50 feet;
- North side of Tenth from Main west 150 feet;
- East side of Pearl from Fifth to Seventh;
- East side of Logan and Nebraska from Fifth to Tenth, and
- East side of Windom from Fourth to Tenth.

Persons violating provisions of the ordinance are subject to a maximum fine of \$100 upon conviction.

The council also heard an explanation of the gas rate system from Warren Ruskell, manager of the local People's Natural Gas office. When asked why consumers in the Kearney area pay less for gas, Ruskell stated the rate is determined by usage.

"Since the area served by the local gas outlet is much heavier populated and is growing at a much faster rate," Ruskell explained, "Northern Natural Gas must buy more gas reserves at a higher rate."

Gas rates are fixed by the Federal Power commission. It is a group, to protect the consumer has a provision that the gas company must have enough gas on reserve to supply everyone not for one year, but for as many as 20 years in a growing area the rates would naturally be higher because the gas companies must be buying gas for the future, Ruskell said.

The local manager also said that rates in Wayne compare with any area that is experiencing growth and is growing at a rate with rates charged by companies east of Wayne.

Firemen Lee Swinney, Bill Kugler and Ted Ambruster also were present at the council meeting and discussed new fire alarm systems. Swinney explained only 12 firemen are living within a three-block radius of the present station, heard the alarm at the time of the Surber fire. The other nine firemen who fought the blaze were notified by telephone.

Among the systems discussed was a radio alarm, with a radio receiver in each fireman's home. Cost of such a system would be about \$5,000, but the firemen have the money on hand.

Biggest problem for such an alarm, the council pointed out, would be maintaining a base station. It would necessitate having an operator on duty 24 hours a day and should not add any extra duty to light plant or police personnel.

The council recommended the firemen appoint a committee to investigate such an alarm system and prepare suggestions for manning the base station.

Police Chief R. H. Hansen reported to the council that his force made 82 arrests during 1958, issued 204 warning tickets and a CITY COUNCIL—See page 2

Bids on the hard surfacing of Highway-35 west from Wayne to Winside were opened at a State Highway Wednesday, letting in Lincoln Wednesday. Results were not available at press time.

This established a new annual record, exceeding the 1957 total by about nine percent. Brugger said December was the biggest month in plant history from the standpoint of gross generation and peak load. The 1958 peak (maximum demand for a five-minute period) was 2,650 kilowatts. The previous high, established in December, 1957, was 1,890 kilowatts.

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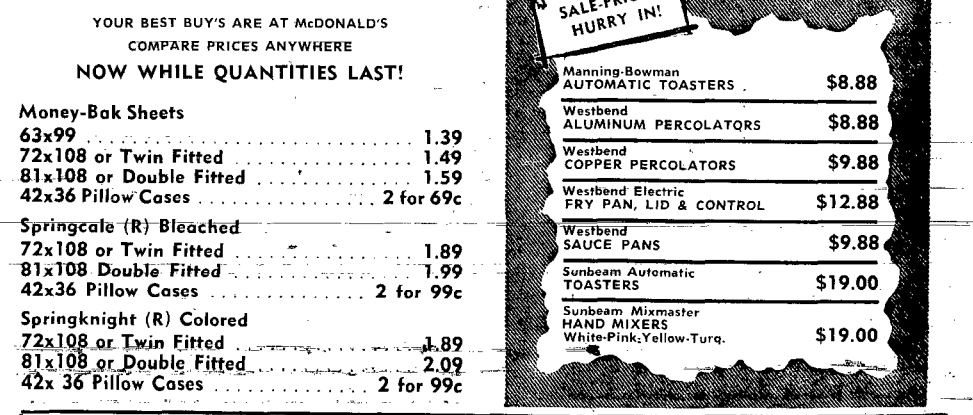

Denesia Hits Final Basket In 54-53 Win

The final quarter was all Denesia as far as Wayne's scoring was involved. He hit 12 of the Blue Devils' 15 points and the lead changed hands nine times.

Big credit in the victory should go to Dick Hammer, Doug Finn and Bill Koeber, who did a tremendous rebounding job, particularly in the first half.

In addition, Hammer hit four of his five shots as the Blue Devils gained their second quarter lead. He finished with 10 points and Koeber added 11, eight of them in the last half.

Wayne used a pressing defense with top efficiency to rout Bloomfield Saturday night. Pete Guern led the scoring with 24 points and Denesia added 20. Coach Harold Maciejewski substituted freely after the Blue Devils took a 26-9 lead in the opening quarter.

Thursday night Wayne downed another undefeated team, Wausa a Vikings, who carried four victories into the tourney. Wayne held 19 to 13 point leads throughout the game and finished with a 58-50 margin.

Dennis Johnson kept the Vikings in the game with his deadly shooting from the corner. He led both teams in scoring with 24 points. Denesia hit 21 for Wayne.

Offensive rebounding spelled the difference in the two teams as both hit 31 percent of their shots. Wayne out-rebounded the Vikings 23-15 offensively and 24-23 defensively.

Wayne High's Blue Devils ended Plainview's unbeaten string at five Monday night to gain the championship of the NE Nebraska conference basketball tournament at Laurel.

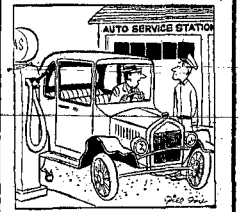

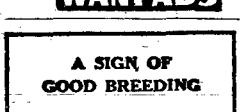

Double Chocolate Chips
(Makes 3 1/2 Dozen)
1 1/2 cup butter
1 1/2 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 6-ounce package semi-sweet chocolate pieces, melted
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
1 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 6-ounce package semi-sweet chocolate pieces
1 1/2 cup chopped black walnuts

Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs and vanilla. Stir in melted chocolate. Add sifted dry ingredients, mixing well. Fold in chocolate pieces and nuts. Chill dough. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto a lightly-greased cookie sheet. Sprinkle with granulated sugar or chopped nuts. Bake at 375 degrees for 12-15 minutes.
