Jan. 31, 1959 is the deadline for obtaining price support on wheat, barley, grain sorghums, oats, rye and soybeans in most areas. Since Jan. 31 occurs on Saturday, a non-business day, the deadline is automatically extended to Feb. 2.

Wayno county loan rates and eligibility standards for 1958-crop commodities are as follows:
Grain sorghuin — \$1.80 per hundredweight for grade No. 2 or better (except mixed grain sorghums). Discounts for lower grades down to No. 4, No. 4 smutts or No. 4 discolared and containing not more than 13 percentions and the second containing and more than 13 percentions.

smutty or No. 4 discolored and eentianing not more than 13 percent moisture.

Oats — 57 cents per bushel for grade No. 3; premiums for higher quality; discounts for garlicky. Soybeans — \$2 per bushel for No. 2 or better, green and yellow. Premium for low moisture; discounts for grade and quality factors below No. 2 through No. 4. Soybeans containing more than 14 percent moisture are ineligible. High Court Upholds **Dixon Court Jury** In Friday Opinion

Lincoln—The State Supreme Court ruled Friday a Dixon County District Court jury acted correctly when it found Thomas Shellington, Wakefield, had been indifferent to the safety of his passengers when his car rammed into a bridge near Wayne the night of June 29, 1952.

The accident occurred when Shellington, who was 16 years old at the time, was taking members of the Wakefield Junior Legion baseball team home from a game at Wayne.

In affirming the District Court decision, the high court said proof permitted the jury by the lower court allowed the jury to find an absence of care in the operation of Shellington of his car.
