

## Annual Spelling Bee Slated Here Saturday

### Early Reports in Chamber Drive 'Very Satisfactory'

Early reports in the 1959 membership drive of the Wayne Chamber of Commerce are "very satisfactory". Secretary K. N. Parke announced Wednesday morning.

The drive got underway Tuesday morning with a breakfast for 50 campaign workers at Hotel Morrison. Another breakfast is planned Tuesday so that workers may report on their contacts. It is hoped the drive will have achieved the \$10,000 goal by that time.

In his report Wednesday morning, Parke said nearly \$5,000 has already been pledged in 1959 dues by 31 members.

Some have voluntarily increased their support of the Chamber in amounts from 50 to 100 percent. In three cases the amount was tripled. Between 180 and 200 Chamber members are expected to be enlisted in the campaign, Parke said.

The membership dues structure established by the Chamber finance committee is: Major businesses, \$200 to \$265; average, \$100-\$190; small, \$25-\$90, and individual \$12.

### Experiment Farm Group Slates Annual Meeting

As vivid proof of the bustling activity on the town's main street at the turn of the century, Johnson has a quilt made of silk handkerchiefs, each depicting a business in the town in 1905.

The quilt is made up of 25 handkerchief blocks, each about 17 inches square. Names of the businessmen or firms are fancily hand-embroidered in each block.

The quilt was won by Mr. Johnson's wife in a 1905 raffle before her marriage. Mr. and Mrs. Johnson were married in 1907. She died in 1946, shortly after they had moved to town from their farm.

Mr. Johnson has been a resident of the Concord community since 1886, coming to Nebraska from Illinois, where his parents settled after immigrating from Sweden.

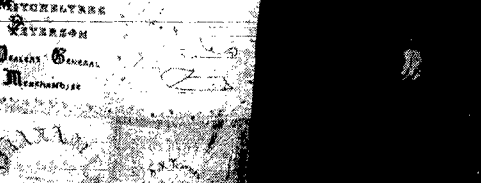

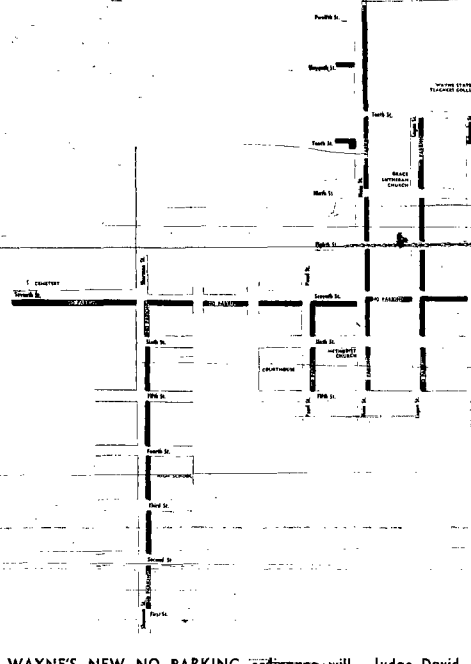


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### New No Parking Ordinance Effective Jan. 29

A traveling trophy will be presented to the school which the grand champion attends. Any school whose students win the trophy three consecutive years will get permanent possession of the trophy.

The contest will open at 10 a.m. with written tests. Ten-word groups will be given until the number of words is reduced to a workable number for an oral spello-down.

An added feature of this year's contest is the use of the public address system for all oral spelling. This is to acquaint the students with procedures used in the Omaha contest and also to allow the audience to hear the spellers.

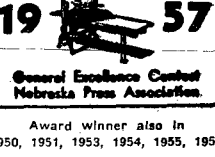



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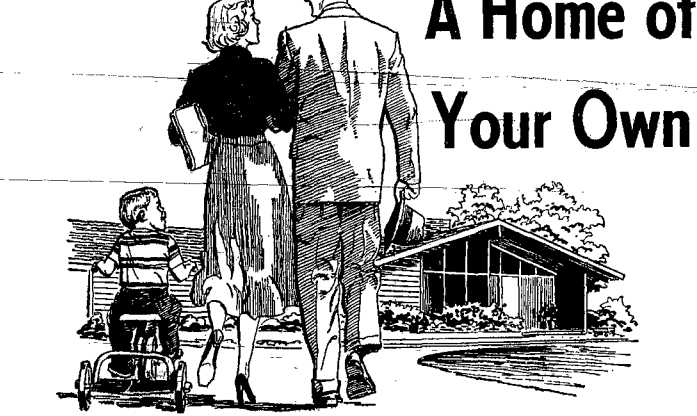

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Capitol News

Voice from Home Vital Word For State Solons in Hearings

Lincoln — First public hearings of the new session of the Legislature got underway this week. They are an important part of the legislative process in Nebraska. It is here Nebraska solons have a chance to "speak their piece" on proposed legislation. This is done before a regular standing committee of the Legislature.

The solons hear the arguments, look over the bill and then decide whether to send it to the floor for full-scale debate and action, amend the proposed legislation and then report it to the floor, kill it outright or just let it lay in committee.

Some of the best news copy of the session comes out at the public hearings. Lobbyists, either for or against a bill, will bring out pertinent points.

However, solons pay a great deal of attention to the common citizen who represents no one but himself and gets up in an unprofessional way and says what he thinks. High on the priority list also is the matter of mail from home.

Communications from a legislator's district are among the most influencing things on his attitude on a measure, especially if the mail is large.

Sometimes of course this can be "planted" by a lobbying organization with a large membership. But it still is headed by the "home folks" think.

Budget Committee — The makeup of the Legislature's budget committee has been the subject of much talk in the Unicameral. Not the caliber of membership, but the likely effect on the state budget.

The committee of two years ago was ultra conservative. Some observers had said it was "backed" to go along with Gov. Victor Anderson's "hard tack" budget theories.

Even if so, the committee was more liberal than the governor. The session's group is headed by Otto Liebers, Lincoln, and has two other holdover members, Speaker Harry Pizer, North Platte, and A. A. Fenske, Sunol.

Five new members are Sens. Don Thompson, McCook, Richard Marvel, Hastings, William Moulton, Omaha, Davy Fensholt, Norfolk, and Harold Stryker, Rising City. Generally speaking, the committee will be more liberal than its predecessor.

alone, but neither will there be any free spending of the tax dollar. Lawmakers noted that the new committee is devoid of the ultra conservatives of the past two sessions.

The budget committee is the most powerful in the Legislature. It is probably the only committee which gets little opposition on the floor on recommendations. The committee's recommendations generally are accepted by the Legislature as the spending policy of the state of Nebraska for the coming two years.

There have been times, especially involving the University of Nebraska, when controversies have come up. But, by and large, the committee usually puts through the budget bill it recommends.

Sewage Funds — At least nine Nebraska cities probably will request Federal funds for sewage treatment plants from the 1959 allocation for the state.

Last year, Nebraska got \$685,000 in Federal money for matching locally to set up treatment plants. The allocation for 1959 will not be known until July 1, although it is expected to be larger.

Kearney, Columbus, Gering, Scottsbluff, Nebraska City, Bellevue, Hicman and Sargent are among the towns that likely will seek the Federal money if they have not already done so.

County Agent's Column . . . State Certified Seed Growers Produce New Minhafer Oats; Swine Meet Monday

Twenty-three certified seed growers produced the new Minhafer oats in Nebraska during 1958. Minhafer, developed by the Minnesota Experiment station, is the newest oat variety recommended by the University of Nebraska Experiment station and college of agriculture for Northeast Nebraska.

Minhafer is a light yellow, early maturing oat of medium height and has good straw stiffness. It shows superior resistance to stem rust races 7 and 8 as well as crown rust.

The names of the growers producing Nebraska certified seed Minhafer oats are listed in the new winter edition of the Nebraska certified seed directory, which is now available. Certified seed growers of hybrid corn, hybrid sorghum, sorghum varieties, sudan grass, soybeans, alfalfa and clover, as well as oats, barley and sweet clover, are listed in this directory.

Copies of this new directory are available at county extension offices throughout the state. Governor's Recount

The recount proceedings in the Legislature on the governor's election and two legislative contests slowed opening days of the Unicameral.

There were more bills introduced the first two weeks of the session than two years ago, but the activity on the floor was subdued after the initial burst on opening day.

However, with the size and type of problems confronting the solons this session, any slowdown in debate and controversy, could at best be only a temporary "lull before the storm."

In two legislative contests, involving Sens. William Skarda, jr., Omaha, and Willard Waldo, De Witt, the matter was simple—the ballots automatically had to be recounted under the law.

But, in the case of the election of Democrat Ralph G. Brooks over Victor Anderson, Republican incumbent, a recount was another thing. It involved depositions, political maneuvering on the floor and final arguments before the Committee on Committees which investigated the matter.

In a nut shell, the final summation by the GOP said there were "thousands of errors" that would change the result of the election. Democrats, briefly, argued there were not sufficient errors to make any change in the outcome and furthermore the Republicans failed to justify charges of error.

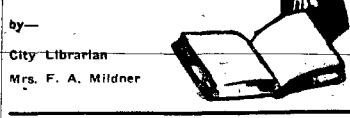

YOU HAVEN'T TIME TO READ? IF YOU CAN find just 15 minutes a day, you can read two books a day. Think how your interests will widen and your conversation sparkle if you include books on new discoveries, space travel, biographies of interesting people. Start at once to spend 15 minutes a day on books which you can borrow free from your library.

YOU MIGHT BEGIN ON A BOOK BY JOHN GALBRAITH, "The Affluent Society." It is written by a literate and versatile economist who closely scrutinizes current ideas and attitudes in economics. He shows that they were worked out for a world far different from our own. We are committed by adolescent thought to a tense and humorless pursuit of goods and to a fantastic and potentially dangerous effort to manufacture wants as rapidly as we make goods. We are impelled to invest too much in things and not enough in people. It is meant for people who want to understand American and Western society. This book was chosen as a memorial for Charles Craven by the Chamber of Commerce. We recommend it as well worth reading, and one which will not bore you as the author has used criticism, irony, ridicule and humor to make his case. The language has been kept simple even though the problems are not. It is a book to read and discuss, well worth more than 15 minutes a day.

YOU MAY WANT SOMETHING IN A LIGHTER vein for your 15 minutes when you are tired and wish to relax. If so, read "Amid the Alien Corn" by Hugh Willoughby. An Englishman who comes to the United States for a year's advanced study of American farming methods at an Indiana university gives his impressions of our way of life. He had never met any Americans other than the soldiers he met during World War II and his only other impressions had been obtained from magazines and American movies. He writes a series of letters home, charming, witty and original. They were the impressions recorded for English eyes alone, with no thought of their ever reaching an American audience. The effect is rather like hearing what your guests have to say about your party when they think you are out of earshot. You will richly enjoy seeing our America through the eyes of this charming stranger. It will give you more than 15 minutes of pleasure while you are reading it and a great deal of conversational material while you tell your friends about it.

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Survey of Farm Managers Forecasts Fed Cattle Markets Weakness in 30-45 Days — WEAKNESS IN FED CATTLE markets can be expected within the next 30 to 45 days, based on indications of a survey of agricultural service farm managers. General consensus of reports from major Corn Belt feeding areas was that short-feds will start moving in volume by the end of February, forcing prices lower. In view of this, you'll want to push your cattle for sale by early February if possible. But don't carry too heavy. There'll be more of these heavyweight cattle than needed and discounts could be quite large. RURAL PEOPLE in part-time farming who have hopes of eventually making farming a full-time job seldom reach this goal, according to an agricultural digest editor. In fact, he points out that

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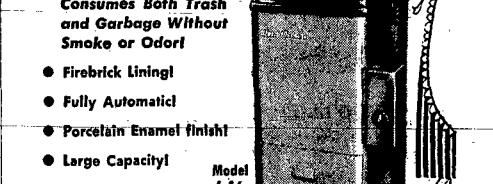

What Mr. Baruch is advising is about like telling us we ought to burn down the Capitol to get rid of some of them Congressmen that got to Washington by mistake. We're getting entirely too many strange ideas in this country. If Mr. Baruch wants to work harder, let him do it. It's a free country, and I'm all for him. 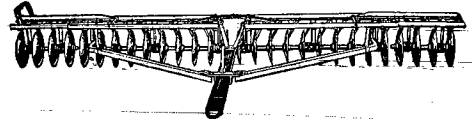

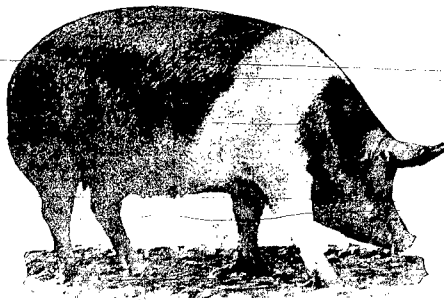

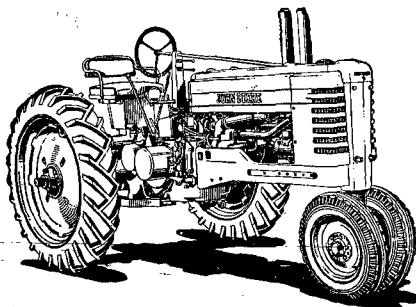
