BUSINESS OUTLOOK BETTER BUT NO BOOM IN SIGHT

Business activity in the nation will be greater in 1959 than last year. Recovery from the 1957-58 recession will continue. A quick return to boom conditions with strong inflationary pressures is not dikely unless the foreign situation should get worses. Improvement will be gradual and seems to be solidly based rather than speculative. Business in Nebraska, which improved during 1957 and 1958, may again run counter to national trends because of the expected decline in net farm income.

In the year ahead we can expect the gross national product, the value of all goods and services produced, to rise from last year's \$435 billion to at least \$470 billion. Consumer spending, which is about two-thirds of total expenditures, will go up by \$10-12 billion, reflecting higher wages, salaries and profits.

and profits

and profits.

Government spending on goods and services will be at least \$5 billion higher than in 1958. The main reasons for expecting-gradual growth in our economy rather than rapid expansion are; our ability to produce the rate of family formation; and credit restrictions.

Unless offset by greater productivity per worker, the 1958 and 1959 wage increases will mean that both consumer and production items will cost more this year.

Consumers' incomes, except farmers', will be higher this year and total spending will also go up. The gain for food and services will be roughly proportional to that of income and could be greater.


Our large crop of "war babies" is now reaching the stage of rapid growth with high food and clothing consumption and greater need for medical, dental, educational and recreational services. This means a strong demand for food and other "mondurables."

Credit will be tighter and more costly in 1959

Credit will be tighter and more costly in 1959 than in the past year. The Federal Reserve Board is trying to encourage economic recovery and expansion and at the same time control inflation. Rediscount rates to commercial banks were raised again last fall after having been lowered earlier to stimulate twoivers.

In 1959, Nebraska business conditions will be less favorable than in the nation generally. Farm, income will decline only moderately if crop production is high again but more severely if drouth should recur

Costs of state and local governments have risen every year since the end of World War II and recently have gone up about \$3 billion annually. Their purchases of goods and services amounts to \$40 billion or nearly 10 percent of gross national product. Governmental costs will also rise in Nebraska.

The national Congress can be expected to provide additional tax breaks for small businesses, including farms, Labor legislation has a better chance of passage, since 1959 is not a Congressional election year. Federal aid to education may be broadened and extended.

NET INCOME FOR FARMERS WILL BE LOWER IN 1959

Net farm income, the keep-home pay of farm families, will be lower in both Nebraska and the U.S. in 1959 than last year.

The improvement in consumers' income, and our growing population will provide a strong and expanding domestic market for farm products in the year ahead.

Here in Nebraska, as in other Plains States, weather uncertainty must be added to the factors affecting farm income. In 1958, Nebraska farmers enjoyed an especially favorable combination of excellent crop growing and harvesting conditions and high hog and cattle prices. Odds are heavily against a repetition of such a combination this year. Topsoils were generally dry over the state as 1958 neared its end.

FARM COSTS UP AGAIN FOR 1959 PRODUCTION

Farm costs are expected to increase again in 1959. Total farm production expenditures were about 6 percent greater in 1958 farm output about 8 percent greater than 1957, costs per unit of farm production were slightly lower. It is not anticipated that farm output will rise enough in 1959 to offset the expected increase in farm costs. As a result both absolute and relative farm costs seem certain to increase.

The greatest farm cost increase was for feeder and replacement livestock. While the cost of almost every vlass and kind of livestock increased, the major share of the increase can be attributed to sharp price advances for milk cows and feeder cattle.

Farm real estate prices continued to rise. The general trend of rural land prices has been upward since 1934 and there is no evidence that this trend will not continue in the forseeable future.

In the first half of 1958, any inclination to increase farm labor rates was dampened by the business recession. For a time farm, wages, showed considerable stability, but in the lafter part of the year the long term upward trend in wages was resumed.

Higher steel prices and industrial wages and higher farm incomes pushed prices of farm machinery and motor vehicles to record highs.

Only a slight increase in building and fencing materials costs occurred in 1958. Other farm cost tems exhibiting only minor increases or decreases were fertilizer, motor supplies and feed.

The Nebraska farm cost situation usually follows the national pattern quite closely. Little or in decline in feeder cattle prices is expected in 1959. Feed grain prices will be lower next year.

Wholesale list price increases and improved income positions of both dealers and farmers mean further increases in the prices paid for farm machinery, automobiles and trucks. A rise is likewise anticipated in the cost of building and fencing materials as industrial wages increase and building activity expands. Relatively stable prices are again expected for motor supplies and fertilizer.

Land and property taxes in Nebraska will increase in 1959. Increasing demands for more services by local and state governments coupled with the property tax as the chief source of revenue make land and property tax increases in Nebraska inevitable.

FEED and LIVESTOCK

FEED SUPPLIES LARGE AND STILL GROWING


A record production of feed grains in 1958, added to the largest carryover on record, has resulted in the largest total supply of feed concentrates that the United States has ever had.

In 1958, yields of nearly all crops were substantially above average. Per-acre yields of corn, grain sorghum and soybeans were at record levels. Not only yields, but total production of each of these crops was at record levels. Total production of all feed grains, was about 7 percent above that of 1957, and approximately 25 percent above that of year (1952-56) average.

Even though the number of grain-consuming animal units is expected to be greater during the 1958-59 feeding season, the supply of feed concentrates per grain-consuming animal unit will be at record levels and more than ample. The carryover as of Oct. 1, 1959, is expected to be about 75 million tons—some 16 million tons, or roughly 25 percent, larger than it was this fall.

Little in the picture indicates any substantial or sustained weakening of feed grain prices durthe next eight to ten months. Moisture content of both corn and grain sorghum at harvest time this fall was such that storage will be no problem in most instances.

PRODUCTION AND STOCKS OF FEED CONCENTRATES AGAIN INCREASE

This likely will not be of much importance, however, and prices are expected to stay at or above present levels most of the time between now and the time whom next year's crop becomes available. Support prices for non-allotment corn will tend to serve as both a floor and a ceiling for feed grain prices. Feeding ratios for all types of livestock are unusually favorable at the present time.

Although hay production in the United States was not quite as high in 1958 as it was in 1957, the carryover was sufficiently large to make the total supply of hay even larger than it was a year ago. Supplies are generally good in nearly all areas.

Deterioration of range and pasture conditions this fall may result in a greater demand for hay than has been anticipated. In most instances, however, supplies of hay are sufficient to take care of almost any emergency. It does not seem likely that hay prices will change much prior to next year's growing season.

CATTLE PRICES-NO MAJOR CHANGE

Production of slaughter beef is expected to be smaller in 1958-59 than in the previous year, largely as a result of continued withholding of cows and heifers for breeding purposes. Although both the 1957 and 1958 call crops for United States were lower than that of the preceding year, the number

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
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of calves been in the 17 western states (principal beef producing states) was larger in each year than in the year before. It would appear that beef cattle numbers are on their way up.

On the basis of past experience, prices for cattle can be expected to stay high for another year at least-and probably two. Large supplies of porkare not expected to depress beef prices to any appreciable extent. As long as cattle numbers are relatively low, price spreads between grades can be expected to be narrower than usual. This will tend to be true of breeding, feeding and slaughter cattle.

Heifer prices will be relatively high compared to steer prices at the feeder level. Prices of feeder cattle in the fall-of-1959 will depend a great deal-on the feed situation which develops next summer. Feed grain prices are almost certain to be as high or higher during the 1959-60 feeding season than they will be in 1958-59.

A smaller production of feed grains would seem more probable in 1959 than another crop of record proportions. The number of grain-consuming animal units is expected to be larger. These factors would tend to raise the price of feed grains a year from now.

tend to raise the price of the prices of feeder cattle will be much higher a year from now than they have been this fall. Continued dry conditions in range areas and a short feed grain crop could result in lower prices for feeder cattle a year from now. Prices of slaughter cattle are expected to follow a more normal seasonal price trend in 1959 but changes will be minor.

HOG PRICES LESS FAVORABLE

The hog corn ratio has been unusually favorable for some time. Last June, farmers indicated their intentions to increase farrowings this fall by about 14 percent as compared to a year ago. The Dec. 1 pig crop report indicates that the number of pigs farrowed and saved during the months of June through November was actually 17 percent larger than a year ago. An increase of perhaps 10 or even 15 percent in the 1959 spring pig crop seems likely.

Hogs farrowed this fall will begin to hit the market soon after the first of the year; however, the bulk of the increase in marketing probably will not come until March or April.

Any increase in spring farrowings will begin to hit the market in early summer, although the big increase will come in October, November and Decem-





ber. The announcement of supports for non-allotment 1958 corn will tend to keep some of the "inners-andouters" out.

It does not seem likely that hog prices will go as high during the summer of 1959 as they did in 1958; an early top of \$18 would seem more likely. They can be expected to drop considerably in the fall of 1959—perhaps to as low as \$12 if earlier intentions are carried out. With corn at around \$1.05 + \$1.10 a bushel and supplement at \$5 or more per cwt, hog producers with no more than average ability would find if difficult to make ends meet at prices they are likely to receive next December. Such a situation is likely to lead to increased interest in feeding contracts or integration by hog producers.

Business of generally good condition of winter

Because, of generally good condition of winter wheat, seeded this fall, there was a good demand for lambs to go on wheat pasture. Slaughter prices have been working downward. Lambs going to market in early 1959 are apt to run into rather stiff competition from large supplies of cattle and hogs marketed by this time of year. Margins between selling and buying prices are narrow at hest,—about the same as a year ago.
