

Rural Areas Backing Winside School Plan

Feb. 18 Letting Scheduled On Sale of School Bonds

Bonds to finance construction of the new Wayne elementary school will go on sale Feb. 18. Wayne school board members approved the move at a meeting Monday night.

Sealed bids will be accepted for the \$424,000 issue. Bids will be opened at a noon meeting at Hotel Morrison, Feb. 18. The Wachob-Bogard company, Omaha, will handle the sale as fiscal agents for the board.

Bill Daily, representative of the Wachob-Bogard company, recommended the board sell as soon as possible to take advantage of a favorable market.

In other business, the board discussed contracting with District 51 approved bids totaling \$2,337.25 and approved bids on school property offered for sale last month.

District 51 officers appeared to learn costs of contracting their 13 pupils for a year with the Wayne school. President Don Carlson, Secretary Marvin Gunderson and Treasurer Jason Preston said their school will be moved to make room for construction of Highway 35 west of Wayne.

The Wayne board said it would take whatever steps necessary to help the school district, but they were not actively seeking more students on a contract basis. Because of an emergency situation, however, and the fact that the students are well scattered through the grades, they felt the additional students could be absorbed in the school.

"Do you know its subject matter?" asked the document clerk.

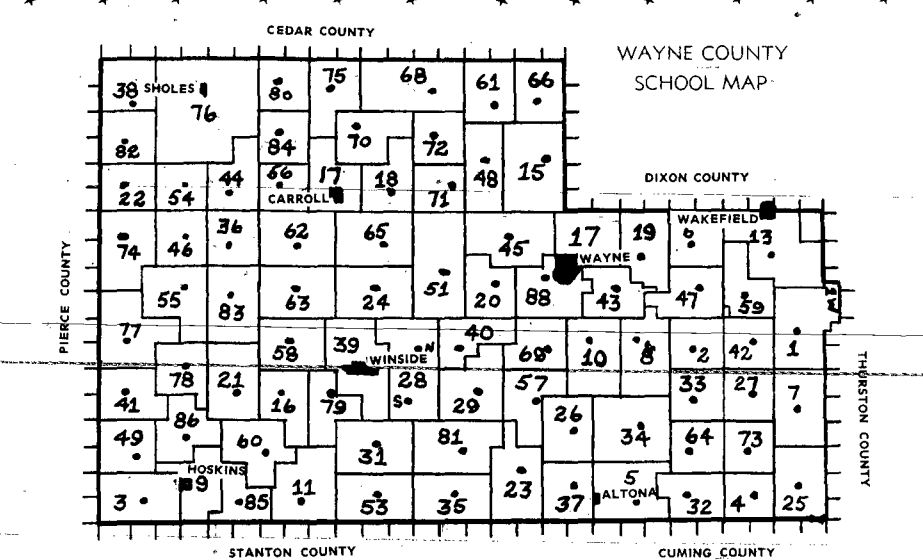
"It has something to do with outer space," she volunteered brightly.

130 Attend Meeting on Proposals

A proposed consolidation of 31 school districts in the Winside community won almost overwhelming approval at a meeting Monday night at the Winside high school auditorium.

The meeting was called by the Winside school board to discuss the proposed reorganization plan with representatives of each of the districts involved. About 130 persons attended.

Representatives of 29 of the 31 districts were present for Monday's meeting. Five other districts also had representation and signified willingness to join in the consolidation.

Winside Supr. Lawrence Retzlaff presided over the session. Don Wacker and James Troutman, Winside board members, also took part.

It is proposed to reorganize the districts into three districts, one of which would have a central school for both high school and grades in the Winside vicinity.

A standing vote of representatives of the involved rural districts favored proceeding with the reorganization 78-21. Winside district patrons did not participate in the voting.

Expect 400 Students for Career Day Session Today

About 400 NE Nebraska high school students are expected in Wayne today for the annual Hooker conference career day sponsored by the Wayne Kiwanis club and WSTC.

Representatives of 12 conference schools will attend. They are Pierce, Plainview, Wayne, Stanton, Madison, Neligh, Oakland, Wakefield, Lyons, Wisner, West Point and Pender.

Representatives of about 35 different vocations and 21 colleges will be present to acquaint the students with career opportunities in their specified fields.

The day's program will open with an introductory period at 9:30 a. m. at the Rice Memorial auditorium. WSTC President W. A. Brandenburg will give the welcome. Dr. Don Twiford, guidance director for the State Department of Education, will give the address.

Students will then attend sessions on various vocations they have shown interest in. Four of these sessions will be held throughout the day. They will start at 10:35 and 11:30 a. m. and 1:15 and 2:10 p. m.

College representatives will be available for contact at the student union ballroom.

Supt. E. W. Willert, Wayne, has been in charge of planning the event. Career counselors will be guests of the conference, college and Kiwanis club at a noon luncheon.

Area Towns Organized to Back Hodtwalker Retention

Randolph—Randolph Community club directors started a telephone campaign Tuesday urging neighboring towns to send delegations to Hurlington Monday for the hearing of traffic charges against two State Safety patrol officers.

The campaign followed the directors' decision to seek retention of Trooper LeRoy Hodtwalker in Knox, Cedar, Wayne and Pierce counties. The club also sent a letter to Gov. Ralph Brooks asking him to investigate.

Hodtwalker gave Capt. Ervin Schottler and Sgt. William A. Clark, Fremont, traffic tickets on charges of using fictitious license plates and failure to display a registration certificate or to present an operator's license while investigating. Patrolman Hodtwalker's coverage of his area.

Randolph spokesmen praised Hodtwalker as "one of the best patrolmen we've seen in this area for a long time." Schottler refused to discuss the investigation, but Hodtwalker has said charges against him included the high number of traffic accidents in the area and lack of radio contact with the Norfolk patrol office.

Hodtwalker said Sunday that about 60 percent of his patrol area is outside the 50-mile radio range of the Norfolk office.

In its letter to the governor, the Community club said: "We sincerely question whether or not any one man could lower the accident rate in this particular case."

They cited the fact that most accidents at the junction of Highways 20 and 81 involved out-of-state travelers and also that a Pierce county grand jury ruled construction of the intersection was the primary cause of the accidents.

\$3,000 Available For Student Loans At Wayne College

More than \$3,000 has been made available for loans to WSTC students during the current semester. Dean of Students Don Merriman announced today.

The loans are available through establishment of the National Defense Student Loan Fund. It includes a grant of about \$2,900 and a contribution of about \$325 by the college. Colleges are required to supply one-tenth of the total fund to get the remainder from the government.

"Special consideration" will be given to students with a superior academic background who express a desire to teach in elementary or secondary schools and to those whose background indicates a superior capacity in the fields of science, mathematics, engineering or a modern foreign language, Dr. Merriman said. In general a 1.75 (C-plus) average will be required to qualify for a loan.

Dr. Merriman also stated that entering freshmen will be required to have ranked in the upper quarter of their high school graduating class and to have good potential for college-level work as indicated on recorded aptitude test scores.

Applications for loans may be made to Dr. Merriman on forms now available at the office of the dean of students. Deadline for current semester loans is Feb. 28. All applications must be in by that date, Dr. Merriman emphasized.

Consideration will be given to the applications of those students who are in need of the loan to pursue a full-time course of study at Wayne State.

The loan program provides that loans may be repaid to the college over a 10-year period and that one-tenth of the loan will be considered repaid for each year that the borrower is in the field of active teaching for a period of five years after leaving college.

Theme for this year's observance is "Lord, I Believe".

association turned thumbs down on joint drives. March of Dimes also firmly declined. In May, 1957 Dr. Robert W. Wilkins of the Heart association sounded the battle cry: "Divided we stand, united we fall."

The fury of a contributor scorned, however, can pack quite a wallop. This was demonstrated two years ago when the Women of Gates Mills, Ohio, decided to stage a combined drive for all health agencies.

The ladies of Gates Mills rebelled and the revolt spread to other towns in the county. Women volunteer workers simply stopped volunteering for individual health agency drives and instead demanded a combined drive in the Gates Mills style.

As long ago as the mid-1940's the National Health Council sponsored a survey of its members. The report called the existing fund-raising situation "preposterous"; money was being wasted in duplicate campaigns; the public was confused by the multiplicity of appeals; fundamental scientific research was being slighted because of overemphasis on the "conquest" of specific diseases.

The situation is growing acute. Today the TB associations, for example, raise and spend more money than ever, although TB mortality has been cut from 200 to eight per 100,000 and health departments everywhere conduct TB-control programs.

The turning point came in 1934 when the President's birthday balls were launched. The response exceeded all expectations and when the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis was formed in 1938, its March of Dimes soon snow-balled into a kind of national Mardi Gras.

It is generally agreed that, within the organizations' chosen fields, the money has been wisely spent. Almost all the agencies split their revenues with their state and county chapters. Research is generally financed out of the national "share".
