





"The turning point came in 1934 when the President's birthday balls were launched. The response exceeded all expectations and when the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis was sormed in 1938, its March of Dimes soon snow-balled into a kind of national Mardi Gray. From three million dollars in 1941 the Joundation's annual take zoomed to 66 million dollars in 1954, nuch of it collected in a door-to-door drive known as the 'Mother's March'.

"There was much to be learned from the March of Dimes. In due course a different spirit engulfed the old-staid health agencies as well as the upstarts. The Heart association, a mere \$100,-000 operation in 1946, shed its inhibitions, hired some new tolent and today garners about 20 million dollars a year. By similar means the Cancer society, which collected only \$800,000 in 1944, took in 30 million dollars in 1957.

"It is generally agreed that, within the organizations' chosen fields, the money has been wisely spent. Almost all the agencies split their revenue with their state and county chapters. Research is generally financed out of the national office share. The problem is that in these crusades, built largely on pity and terror and ballyhoo, basic statistics have been ignored. We contribite, for example, about the same sum in behalf of 200,000 victims of muscular dystrophy as for the nine million who are mentally ill-Arthritis and rheumatism—more than 10 million coses—get less. The real question is whether the scope of research into a particular malady, or the funds available for patient care, should be determined by the relative prowess of its fundroisers. The siphoning-off of 170 million dollars a vear by the big health agencies—on the basis of zeal rather than need—seems a dangerous form of fiscal anarchy.

Their experiment became a cause celebre when the Notional Foundations for Indantile Paralysis ordered its Cleveland chapter to give back \$1,322 which the ladies had collected for polio.

They collected an impressive total: some \$200,000.

"As long ago as the mid-1940's the National Health council sponsored a survey of its members. The report called the existing fund-raising situation 'preposterous': money was being wasted in duplicate campaigns; the public was confused by the multiplicity of appeals; fundamental scientific research was being slighted because of overemphasis on the 'conquest' of specific diseases.

"The essence of the problem we face today was summed up 40 years ago by Dr. George E. Vincent, then president of the Rockefeller foundation. The health of a community is essentially a single interest, he said. To exalt one aspect at the expense of other essential factors is unscientific, wasteful and misleading. No one would seriously undertake to defend this practice on the score of efficiency, economy or public wolfare."






