

Rural Districts Call Reorganization Meet

Patrol Brass Appeals Fines; Hodtwalker Case Still Aired

Patrolmen Plead Guilty, Fined \$90

Controversy over the transfer of State Safety Patrolman Leroy Hodtwalker continued this week as more NE Nebraska organizations asked Gov. Ralph Brooks to investigate the case.

Trooper Hodtwalker was transferred to Columbus and succeeded in the Randolph area by Trooper Erwin Pearson, Columbus. Hodtwalker was transferred after he ticketed Patrol Capt. E. L. Schottler and Sgt. Willard Clark for traffic violations.

Schottler and Clark were fined \$90 and costs Monday afternoon in Cedar County Court after pleading guilty to the three traffic violations. About 250 persons jammed the Harrington courtroom to hear the proceedings.

Judge Edward Hesse fined Hodtwalker \$90 for using fictitious license plates. Clark was fined \$20 each on counts of failure to exhibit driver's license and failure to show a registration certificate.

Patrol Commander Col. C. J. Sanders confirmed the fact that Schottler was conducting an investigation of Hodtwalker at the time of the ticketing. He said the transfer was due to the investigation and not Hodtwalker's ticketing of Schottler. Hodtwalker also got a six-day suspension.

Sanders confirmed Thursday that Sgt. Omar Young at Norfolk, the office to which Hodtwalker reported, also had been suspended. Young drew a three-day suspension.

Sanders said Sgt. Young was found in violation of rules. He added that the suspension was not a result of the ticketing, but noted that Young, after receiving Hodtwalker's ticketing report, called Sanders direct with the report instead of processing it through Schottler, who is in command of the area.

The officers pleaded guilty but appealed the severity of the penalties. Their bonds were continued pending hearing in the next session of District Court at Hartington. The troopers were represented by Assistant Attorney General Clarence Brubaker.

Film Seizure Order Denied By Brubaker

Further controversy resulting from the ticketing of two State Safety patrol officers developed Tuesday when Assistant Attorney General Clarence Brubaker denied he had ordered a photographer's film seized at the Harrington trial of the two officers.

"The first I heard about it," Brubaker said, "was when I was watching the news on TV."

The incident reportedly happened when film was confiscated from a Plainview News photographer, Harold Mauck, by Cedar County Attorney Max Goetz after Capt. E. L. Schottler and Sgt. Willard Clark, Fremont, pleaded guilty to traffic violations and were fined \$90 and costs.

Brubaker said after the trial ended he saw a flash. He said he suggested to Goetz that if a picture had been taken during the proceedings, it should be printed, it might get the judge in trouble with the State Supreme Court over violation of Canon 35.

Brubaker emphasized his remark was made in passing and was merely a suggestion. "I didn't order any one to do anything," he further explained no attorney has authority to seize film without the consent of the court.

The court bailiff took the film after Judge Edward Hesse left the courtroom.

Second Semester Enrollment Tops

WSTC has reached a new second semester enrollment record, Registrar M. B. Childs announced this week.

The total is 1,086, including all resident students. This is an eight percent increase over the 977-mark set last year.

The total does not include 57 correspondence course students, but does include evening and Saturday class enrollment.

This semester's enrollment exceeds all previous figures except last fall's 1,144. Men outnumber women by a 623-463 margin in the present totals.

Skating Rink, Truck Bids Main City Council Topics

Bids for purchase of the city's old ice skating rink tract, a new fire alarm system and bids on a new pickup truck were the main topics for discussion at a meeting of the Wayne city council Tuesday night.

The council received seven bids on the 150 by 261-foot tract north of East park. High bid was \$1,850 submitted by Lyle Sheppard. If the council decides to sell the land, the sale must be advertised three weeks. Objections by 30 percent of the number of voters in the last city election can prevent the sale.

Other bidders and their offers for the tract were: Cecil Wried, \$1,800; D. Hall, \$600; Merleford Lessmann, \$406; L. R. Cunningham, \$400; Leland Beckner, \$329; and French Penn, \$100.

Bids on purchase of a new pickup truck for the city street department were turned over to the city committee for checking and purchase.

Representatives of the Fire department were asked to contact the Rural Fire district about sharing the cost of a new fire alarm system to notify firemen.

The telephone company has offered a system which would ring only phones of firemen from a master panel located at the light plant.

A representative of the state fire marshal's office also presented reports on the purchase of a new fire truck. The move was taken under advisement.

Ask Wayne To Provide Information

Interest in school reorganization plans for the western portions of Wayne county heightened this week following moves by the County Reorganization committee and some rural school districts.

County committee members voted unanimously Saturday to consider a Western Area plan submitted by districts following a meeting at Winside last week.

It proposes to reorganize 31 districts in the western area and consolidate them into one, which would have a central school for both high school and grades in the Winside vicinity.

Following last week's Winside meeting, representatives of three districts met to discuss the proposed area asked for a meeting with Wayne school district board members to obtain further information on reorganization.

As a result, 10 rural districts have been invited to attend an information meeting at 8 p. m. Monday at the Carroll school. Representatives of the County Reorganization committee and the Winside school will probably be invited. Rural districts expected to attend are 18, 36, 44, 46, 54, 56, 62, 65, 70, 75, 80 and 84.

The County Reorganization committee agreed to consider the Winside plan. The committee worked on a map of the proposal and discussed possible division of District 40, which is included. They also discussed the possibility of rural grade school units within the area.

Leo Jordan, Carroll, a District 56 resident, was appointed to the county group to succeed Robert Johnson, Carroll, who resigned after the Carroll district was annexed by Wayne State law states that no two committee members may be from the same district.

Herbert Kollmorgen, Wayne, told the county committee that he should resign since his new work would hinder his attendance at meetings. The committee asked him to maintain his membership until a suitable replacement can be found.

In other action Saturday Glenn Lundahl, Glenn Granquist and Gordon Nuernberger were named to meet with the Dixon County committee to discuss reorganization plans. James Trout, H. Richard Miller and Herman Opler will hold similar discussions with the Madison and Stanton County committees.

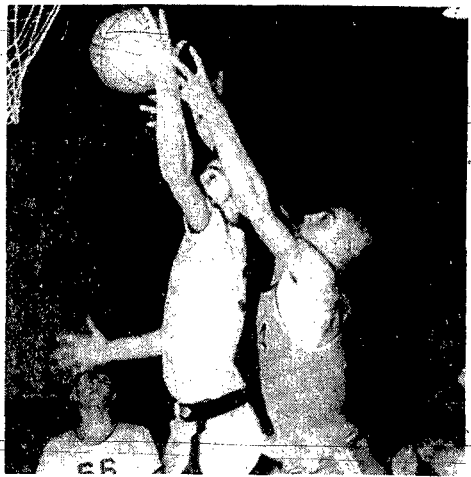

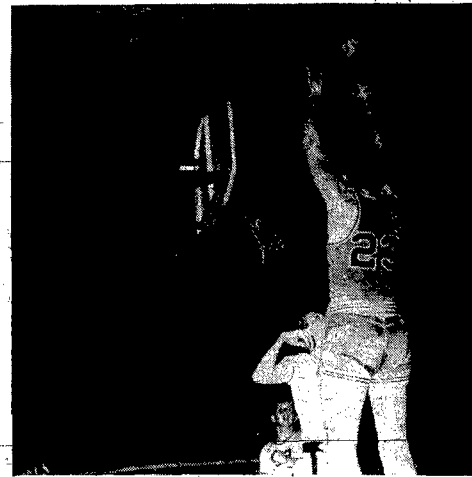
