Both Parties Stir Political Water in Appointments Fuss

Lincoln—Complications of state government have been a source of concern to most newcomers in the Capitol. Gov. Ralph G. Summers has no exception. He said he can see the need for a Constitutional convention to get rid of the "hodge podge" that now exists.

Anderson named Lee Laurenberg, Columbus, a Republican. But after the appointment another vacancy occurred and Brooks selected a new man, plus another commissioner to replace Laurenberg on grounds the Columbus man had not taken office.

Brooks also told the Legislature his recommendation of former Sen. Leroy Balfensky, Palmer, filled legal requirements that at least one member of the commission be engaged in farming.

Well-Balanced Ration Critical for Ewes During Six-Week Period Around Lambing

The three weeks before and the three weeks after lambing are the most important periods for both ewe and lamb. An adequate, well balanced ration for the ewe during this period is critical.

That's the word from M. D. Weldon, extension agronomist at the University of Nebraska, who says nearly 1,200,000 soil test samples were processed through Midwest state and county laboratories in 1957.

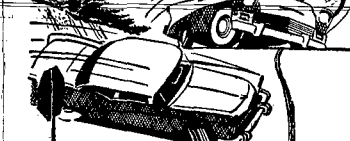
Farm News and Views... Market Analysts Forecast Continued Hog Price Declines for At Least Two Months
