## Winside School Plan Hearing Set Mar. 10

### County Assessment to Start Monday; Up Cattle Values

#### Landlords to Share Grain Tax in 1959

Wayne county deputy assessors will take the field Monday to determine 1959 assessments, County Assessor Henry Arp reminded this week.

Assessing will be done in the same manner as 1957. Taxpayers will not have to report. Fourteen Arp assistants will call on the home farm or business in person. The deputy and taxpayer will fill out schedules on the spot. Valuation figures obtained will be cut to 35 percent for taxing purposes.

Assessment will be completed by Apr. 20. Detailed depreciation schedules will be used to determine values of farm machinery and equipment. That purchased in 1959 will be valued at 85 percent of new cost.

Similar tables will be used for household and personal items. They vary from 85 percent of cost for items purchased in 1959 to 30 percent for those purchased in 1950. Values for items purchased prior to that time will be determined by the county assessor.

A new regulation will be used in determining the taxes on grain and seed. This specifies that the grain tax be shared by the tenant and landlord on the same basis as crop profits are shared. Last year the entire grain tax was paid by the tenant.

Producers will pay four mills per bushel for all corn, soybeans, dry edible beans and flax produced. The tax on other grain produced, including velvet, will be two mills per bushel. Seed produced will be taxed at 15 mills per 100 pounds.

Arp explained that valuations for grade cattle have been increased for the 1959 assessment. The table below shows a comparison of the 1958 and 1959 rates:

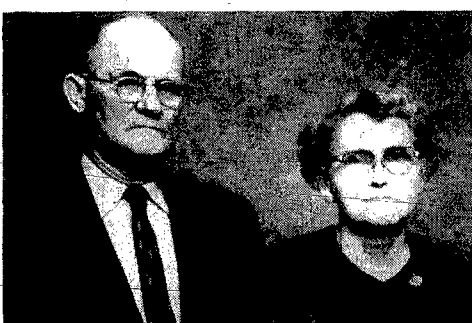

Reflecting the lower hog market, valuations on swine have been reduced from the 1958 figures. Arp added. However, purebred hogs will be valued as a separate item this year. Last year they were grouped with butcher hogs.

The purebred rate will be \$18 per hundred weight. Butcher hogs will be valued at \$14 per hundred as compared to \$18 in 1958. The value for sows is \$12 as compared to \$16 a year ago.

Three new deputies will be used in this year's assessment, Arp said. J. M. Strahan will assess Wayne businesses, Charles Heikes

#### WSTC Hits 1,090 in Spring Enrollment

WSTC's spring semester enrollment has increased to 1,090 students in final tabulations. Registrar M. B. Childs said today.

This includes all resident students in day, night and Saturday classes. Full-time students (those taking 12 or more credit hours) number 1,014.

There are 72 enrolled in extension classes, which are not included in the 1,090 total. Veterans enrolled under the GI bill total 119.

By classes, the enrollment is 425 freshmen, 238 sophomores, 139 juniors, 138 seniors and 30 graduates.

Wayne Prep's enrollment is 293-185 in the elementary grades, 69 in junior high and 48 in senior high.

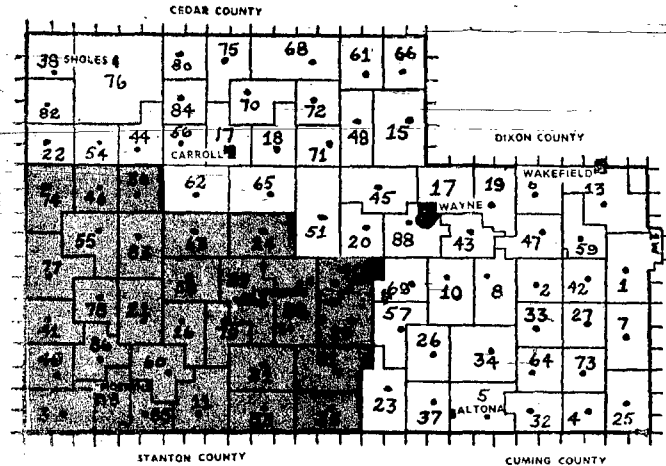

DISTRICTS INVOLVED in the school reorganization plan proposed for Western Wayne county are shaded in the school map shown above. The proposal includes 29 districts in the Winside area. Proponents of the move say a new junior-senior high school building would be constructed at Winside to serve the area, which had an assessed valuation of about \$7 1/2 million dollars in 1958. A hearing on the reorganization proposal will be held before the County School Redistricting committee at Winside Mar. 10, Chairman Gordon Nuernberger announced this week.

#### 29 Districts Involved in Area Plans

A public hearing on the proposed reorganization of 29 school districts in and around Winside was announced today by Gordon Nuernberger, Wakefield, chairman of the Wayne County School Reorganization committee.

The hearing is scheduled at 7:30 p. m. Mar. 10 at the Winside village auditorium. Any person interested in the reorganization plan is entitled to attend.

The redistricting proposal includes the Winside and Hoskins districts and 27 rural districts. Proponents say the plan would include construction of a junior-senior high school at Winside with an anticipated enrollment of 225 students. Valuation of the reorganized district would be approximately \$7 1/2 million.

Four main topics will be considered by the County committee at the hearing. They are: (1) the merits of the proposed reorganization plan; (2) the value and amount of all school property of whatever nature involved in the proposed action; (3) the amount of outstanding indebtedness of each district and proposed disposition thereof; and (4) the equitable adjustment of all property, debts and liabilities among the districts involved.

Two districts have been eliminated from the Winside plan as originally proposed. They are Districts 62 and 65 south of Carroll. Those remaining in the proposal as scheduled at the hearing are: 3, 9 (Hoskins), 11, 16, 21, 24, 28, 29, 31, 35, 36, 39 (Winside), 40, 41, 46, 49, 53, 55, 58, 60, 63, 74, 77, 78, 79, 81, 83, 85 and 86.

If the plan is approved by a majority of the County Reorganization committee, chances are good that the proposal can be submitted to a special election yet this spring, Nuernberger said.

If approved by the County committee, the County Committee sent to the State Reorganization committee for study and recommendations.

If the State committee approves the reorganization, it will be returned to the County Committee for the election. The county group must call the election not less than 30 nor more than 60 days after receiving the action of the State committee.

In the special election there would be two voting units - Winside and Hoskins would comprise one, the other would be made up of all the rural districts. Approval would require a majority of all electors voting within each unit.

If approved, the reorganized district would be formed and a school board appointed by the county superintendent from among the qualified electors of the new district.

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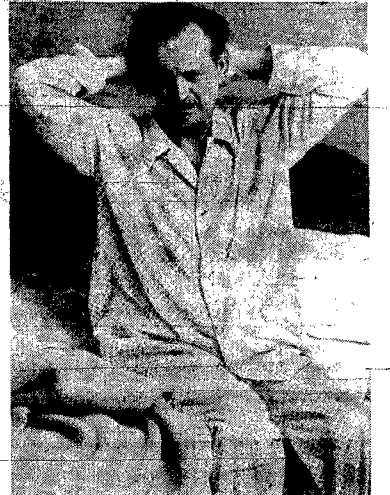

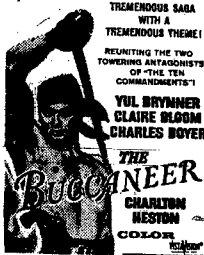

### Best Season Since 1948 Possible for Local Quint

WSTC's Wildcats will end their basketball season Friday night against Dana College at Blair. A win will give Coach Mae Radovich's quint their best season in years.

Two victories this weekend—70-53 at Concordia and 82-45 over Midland on the home court—gave Wayne a 10-7 record and a 12-5 mark in the Nebraska College conference.

Only once before has Wayne won as many as 16 games in a season. That was in 1948 under Coach Don Meek when the Wildcats were 17-7. Not since that year has Wayne lost as few as seven games.

An individual record could also fall this season. Bob Moore, Clarkson junior forward, is near Carl Johnson's all-time Wayne season mark of 384 set in 1953. Moore has 370 points.

Moore, though shaken up in a first half collision Saturday, hit 20 points against Midland in one of his best performances of the year. Midland put up surprising little resistance for a team that has proved troublesome for the conference leaders most of the season.

Only once in the game did the Warriors pull even with the Wildcats. That was at 9-9 with 12 minutes left in the first half.

Wayne forged to a 40-22 lead at intermission, hitting 52 percent of its field goal attempts. For the game, Wayne completed on 48 percent. Midland's percentage was a chilly 21.

It was Concordia that started the Wildcats. The Bulldogs hustled from the opening whistle. Two late baskets gave them a 34-31 lead at halftime. Concordia fans went wild at this point.

Wayne roared back after the intermission but the stubborn Bulldogs held on. The lead changed hands four times before the Wildcats took a 41-39 lead with 14:40 left. Radovich did not risk major substitutions until less than two minutes remained.

Chuck Rachow topped Wayne's scoring with 18 points. The two victories improved Wayne's team defensive record.

### Winnebago Indians Upset Prep 52-41 Monday Night

Winnebago's Indians upset second-seeded Wayne Prep 52-41 in the first round of the district Class C basketball tournament Monday night at WSTC's new Rice fieldhouse.

The Indians will meet Allen, 50-36 winner, over Ponca at 8:30 p.m. semi-final tonight. Top-seeded Wakefield, a 61-41 victor over Walthill Tuesday night, will oppose Emerson in the other semi-final tilt. Emerson edged Dakota City 65-63 in a Monday night thriller.

Superior height and rebounding strength enabled Winnebago to down Prep Monday night. The Indians effectively bottled up Ponca, which shot only 12.5 percent in the last half to pull away. The winners held a narrow 22-21 advantage at the halftime intermission.

Kingston was the game's top scorer with 16 points. John Tompkins paced Winnebago with 15. Emerson rallied from a 30-25 halftime deficit to nip Dakota City in Monday's opening game. The winners evened the count with a 22-point third quarter and outdied the Wildcats 18-16 in the final eight minutes.

Bob Schroeder was tops for Wakefield with 15 points. Mike Keegan had 12 for the losers.

Allen took an eight-point lead in the first half Tuesday night but Ponca battled back to trail 38-34 after three periods. Gary Jones then paced an Allen surge in the final quarter for the win.

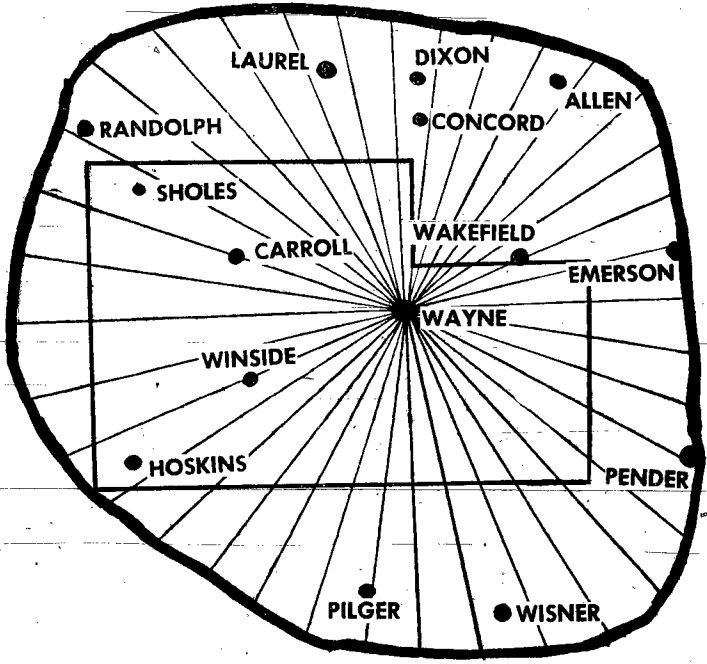



### Nebraska Revenue Laws:

- **77-409** County assessor shall examine and check all returns of personal property for taxation. He shall have the power to examine under oath the person making the return to determine that all personal property of the taxpayer is listed for taxation at its actual value.
- **77-1229** Every person owning personal property is required to make out and verify a statement of all such property, which shall be delivered to the county assessor on or before April 20.
- **77-1235** Where any person fails, or refuses to make out and deliver the statement required, the county assessor shall evaluate the article of property belonging to that person and shall add 50 percent to the value returned.

- Dash pepper
- 1/2 cup buttered bread crumbs

Combine cheese, soup and milk in top of double boiler. Heat until cheese is melted. Add lima, tuna, pimiento and seasonings. Pour mixture into a buttered one-quart casserole. Top with bread crumbs. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes.

# March Nebraska Farm Outlook

"Our Roots Are In This Land"

## FARM REVIEW and FORECAST

### BRIEF AND IMPORTANT

#### CATTLE

Prices of better grades will follow a more seasonal pattern this year. With 11 percent more on feed this Jan. 1 than a year ago, we expect a decline of \$1.2 cwt. by early summer. Price gains in summer and fall will be limited by increasing pork production. Average prices will be about the same as 1958 but seasonal movement will be different.

#### HOGS

Lower prices ahead down to a spring low of about \$15, probably in March. There'll be a little improvement by summer. Then the 59-million spring pig crop will start to market. Fall low will be \$12-13 coming in late November or December. We'll have 100 million pigs to market in 1959, about 3 million more than in 1955 but also have more people, more income, less beef, and more even fattening.

#### FARM INVESTMENT

Value of farm assets hit a record of \$187 billion in 1958 and owners' equities reached \$167 billion, also a new high. The increase as in other years was mainly due to higher farm real estate values. Rate of return on farm capital has declined every year since 1947, from about 10 percent then to 37 percent in 1958.

## Personal Liability Insurance

You Can't Afford To Be Without It

The law imposes upon an individual the duty of using reasonable care in his behavior towards other people and their property. Failure to use such care might result in injury to some person, or damage to his property. Here is another field in which judges, jurists and talented attorneys give the word "negligence" a fine round meaning. Many nowadays don't see stars. They see dollar signs!

Until a few years ago, it took a half-dozen policies to cover the great variety of home and family liability situations—sports, dogs and even children. Now they are covered in a single policy usually called "comprehensive personal liability"—worked out to meet unpredictable hazards of high speed, high risk, high value modern living.

A liability policy protects you against almost endless claims. It pays medical costs for personal injuries and damage to other people's property. But probably the best feature is the provision on legal expense. Any legal action is brutal to all parties. Insurance will take the sting out of it for the defendant, but it can't absorb the bitterness that follows in the wake of any trial.

Every farmer runs hundreds of risks of damage suits. Judgments of \$1000 to \$10,000 against farmers are becoming more and more common these days. One reason is that the use of more machinery increases hazards. There are more visitors to the farm. The farmer and his family get around more, exposing themselves and others. But most important is the fact that "the farmer can pay." Judgments against him can be collected!

A farmer is liable for many different kinds of accidents that may occur on his farm and about his buildings, for injuries caused by his cattle, or machinery, or by the personal negligence of himself or his family. He is often liable for injury to his employees.

The farm liability policy protects against liability to the public for damages arising from ownership and operation of a farm, the use of farm machinery and livestock. It covers "personal" liability to the public for the farmer, his wife and members of his household. It covers liability to employees, pays medical expenses regardless of liability, and even protects his livestock. It takes care of his moral as well as his legal responsibility. It can include medical protection for the farmer and members of his family over 10 years old.

If you own a home, a family, a dog, or a pair of feet, you should have personal liability coverage, whether you are a farmer or not. Premiums are relatively low because of the small chance that any particular individual will become involved in such accidents with ensuing lawsuits. But when he does, he faces large, catastrophic losses, which can easily result in lifelong impoverishment. The policies, incidentally, protect you if anything happens while you are on a trip anywhere in the world. Bear in mind, though, that they do not cover accidents involving your operation of an automobile, aircraft and certain boats, for which there are other policies available.

How can you protect yourself against costly suits brought against you?

(1) Be Careful! Use common sense. Don't give the hired man a rickety step-ladder. Keep Junior's wagons, bikes and assorted toys off the walks. Don't leave lawn mowers around where intrigued youngsters can start them and cause trouble. Always lock your car. Keep a biting dog leashed. Know that your livestock are not on the highway.

(2) Be insured! Available are comprehensive personal liability policies for both farmers and non-farmers which shift the worry from your shoulders to those of the insurance companies. In many companies you can be covered for \$10,000 plus \$250 in medical payments (regardless of whether or not you are at fault) for a very small amount.

A word to the wise—be careful, and be insured. You can't afford to be without personal liability insurance.

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
