

Proponents say the plan would in-clude construction of a junior-senior high school at Winside with an anticipated enrollment of 225 students. Valuation of the reor-ganized district would be approxi-mately \$7'<sub>2</sub> million. Four main topics will be consid-ered by the County committee at the hearing. They are: (1) the merits of the proposed reorganiza-tion plan; (2) the value and amount of all school property of whatever nature involved in the proposed action; (3) the amount of out-standing indebtedness of each dist. rict and proposed disposition there-of, and (4) the equitable adjust. ment of all property, debts and liabilities among the districts in-volved.

If approved by the County com-mittee, the proposal will then be sent to the State Reorganization committee for study and recom-mendations.

The county group must call the election on less than 30 nor more than 60 days after re-ceiving the action oo the State committee. Ap-proval would require a major-ity of all electors voling within each unit. If approved, the -reorganized district would be formed and a school board appointed by the county superintendent from among the gualified electors of the new district.

**BRIEF AND** IMPORTANT

### CATTLE

Prices of better grades will fol-low a more seasonal pattern this year. With 11 percent more on feed this Jan. 1 than a year ago, we expect a decline of \$1-2 cwt. by early summer. Price gains in summer and fall will be limited by increasing pork production. Average prices will be about the same as 1958 but seasonol move-ment will be different.

HOGS

Lower prices ahead down to a spring low of about \$15, prob-obly in March. There'll be a little impraxement-by summer, then the 59-million spring pig crop will \$12-13 coming in late November or December. We'll have 100 mil-lion pigs to market in 1959, about 3 million more than in 1955 but also have-more people; more in-come, less beef, and more even farrowing.

Value of farm assets hit a record of \$187 billion in 1958 and own-ers' equities reached \$167 bil-lion, also a new high. The in-crease as in other years was mainly due to higher farm real estate values. Rate of return on farm capital has declined every year since 1947, from about 10 percent then to 37 percent in 1958.

You Can't Afford To Be Without It The law imposes upon an individual the duty of using reasonable care in his behavior to-wards other people and their property. Failure to use such care might result in injury to some person, or damage to his property. Here is an-other field in which indges, juries and talented attorneys give the word "negligence" a fine round meaning. Many nowadays don't see stars. They see dollar signs!

Until a few years ago, it took a half-dozen policies to cover the great variety of home and family liability situations---sports, dogs and even children. Now they are covered in a single policy usually called "comprehensive personal liabil-ity"--worked out to meet unpredictable hażards of high speed, high risk, high value modern liv-ior.

A liability policy protects you against al-most endless claims. It pays medical costs. for personal injuries and damage to other people's property. But probably the best feature is the provision on legal expense. Any legal action is brutal to all parties. Insur-ance will take the sting out of it for the defendant, but it can't absorb the bitterness that follows in the wake of any trial.

Every farmer runs hundreds of risks of damage suits. Judgments of \$1000 to \$40,000 against farmers are becoming more and more common these days. One reason is that the use of more machinery increases hazards. There are more visitors to the farm. The farmer and his family get around more, exposing themselves and others. But most important is the fact that "the farmer can pay." Judgements against him can be collected!

A farmer is liable for many different kinds of accidents that may occur on his farm and about his buildings, for injuries caused by his cattle, or machinery, or by the personal negligence of bimself or his family. He is often hable for injury to his employees.

The farm liability policy protects against liability to the public for damages arising

from ownership and operation of a farm, the use of farm machinery and livestock.

use of farm machinery and newspook. It covers "personal" liability to the public for the farmer, his wife and members of his household. It covers liability to employees, pays medical expenses regardless of finality, and even protects his livestock. It takes care of his moral as well as his legal responsibility. It can include medical protection for the farmer and members of his family over 10 years old.

of his family, over 10 years old. If you own a home, a family, a dog, or a pair of feet, you should have personal liability coverage, whether you are a farmer or not. Premiums are relatively low because of the small chance that any particular individual will be-come involved in such accidents with ensuing faw suits. But when he does, he faces large, enfastro-phic losses, which can easily result in lifelong impoverishment. The policies, incidentally, pro-tect you if anything happens while you are on a trip anywhere in the world. Bear in mind, though, that they do not cover accidents involv-ing your operation of an automobile, aircraft and certain boats, for which there are other policies available.

How can you protect yourself against cost-ly suits brought against you?

(1) Be Careful! Use common sense, Don't give the hired man a rickety stepladder. Keep Junior's wagons, bikes and assorted toys off the walks. Don't leave lawn mowers around where intrigned youngsters can start them and cause trouble. Always lock your car, Keep a biting dog leashed. Know that your livestock are not on the hielway. highway.

(2) Be insured! Available are comprehensive personal liability policies for both farmers and non-farmers which shift the worry from your shoulders to those of the insurance companies. In many companies you can be covered for \$10, 000 plus \$250 in medical payments (regardless of whether or not you are at fault) for a very small amount.

A word to the wise -be careful, and be in-sured: You can't afford to be without personal liability insurance.
