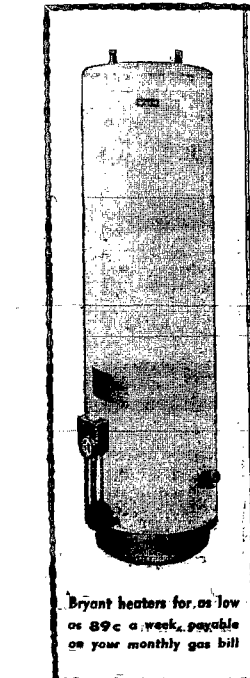

Progress Painful for Senators In Passing Tax Reform Bills

Two bills were passed by the Senate to change the tax law and give more power to the tax commissioner. Both bills were passed by a one-man margin.

Senator Terry Carpenter, who put up stiff opposition to the bill, said he was not satisfied with the measure.

Senator Fred G. Gifford, who introduced the bill, said he was confident it would pass.

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Interstate Highway

State Engineer Roy Cochran said the hearings must be on the proposed north-of-the-river route for the Interstate since this route already has been approved by the Federal government.

The engineer said although the hearings will be on the northern route, this does not stop supporters from appealing to plead their case.

Commission Chairman Ray Ogier, North Platte, said he feels all information on the Interstate should be available to the public at the hearings.

A much-amended bingo bill finally got out of the Legislature's government committee.

There was some criticism of the proposal on grounds there is no state agency provided for state enforcement of provisions of the law.

County Agent's Column Loss of Leaves Can Substantially Reduce Protein Feeding Value, Yield of Alfalfa

Good alfalfa has 50 percent or more of its weight in leaves. A significant difference in feeding value has been shown between hays containing 50 percent as compared to 30 percent.

However, a loss which reduces the amount of leaves to 40 percent by weight substantially reduces yield. Assuming a crop of three tons of dry hay when cut in the early stage with 50 percent leaves, yield would be cut to 2 1/2 tons if content of leaves is reduced to 40 percent.

To replace protein and total digestible nutrients it would take the equivalent of 550 pounds of linseed oil meal and 200 pounds of corn and cob meal. As much as 38 percent of the leaves may be lost by exposure to one shower.

Drill Box Survey Again this spring, as during the past two springs, a drill box survey will be conducted to determine the quality of seed oats being planted in NE Nebraska.

Farmers should assure themselves of quality seed by having their oats tested for purity and germination or request an analysis tag before buying seed from his neighbor or seedsmen.

The Nebraska seed law is for your protection. Any seed that is advertised in any way must have an analysis tag on each parcel or bag of seed sold.

When you receive your seed test report from a laboratory or when buying seed, be sure to check the analysis for weed seed content. It is unlawful for anyone to sell oats if they contain over five percent weed seed.

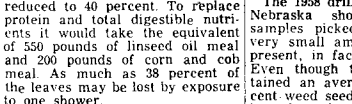

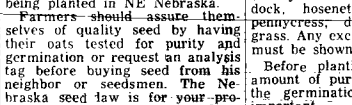
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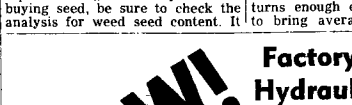

It has other good ingredients too, points out Miss Cooke, such as whipped cream, semi-sweet chocolate pieces, rice cereal and coconut. A spoonful of whipped cream atop each serving makes it party fare.

Chocolate Crunch Dessert

(six servings)

- 1 6-oz. package (1 cup) semi-sweet chocolate pieces
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 2 cups crisp rice cereal, crushed
- 1/2 cup moist shredded coconut
- 1 tablespoon plain gelatin
- 1/4 cup chocolate milk or dairy drink
- 1 1/2 cups scalded chocolate milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup whipping cream, whipped

In top of double boiler, melt chocolate pieces and butter over hot water. Remove from heat. Stir in cereal and coconut. Press firmly on bottom of buttered 8-inch square pan; chill until firm. Soften gelatin in 1/4 cup cold chocolate milk for 5 minutes. Add scalded chocolate milk and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Chill until slightly thickened. Beat with rotary beater. Fold in whipped cream. Spoon into chocolate crust. Chill until firm. Cut into squares.

It is unwise and sometimes even dangerous to repeatedly take sleep-producing remedies without a physician's supervising care. Sleep is needed, but of greater importance is the curing of the cause of sleeplessness. Only a physician has the knowledge to prescribe the proper medication to accomplish this.

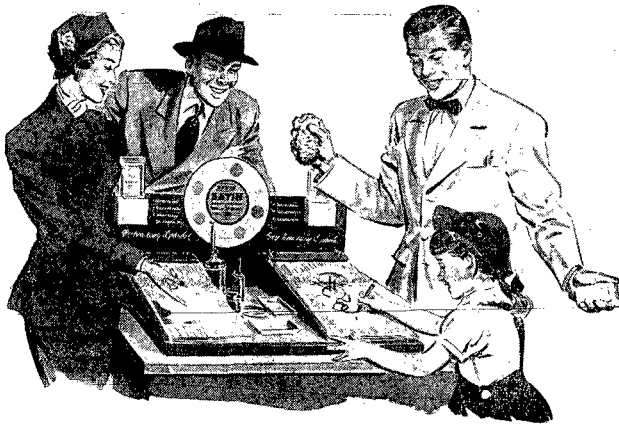


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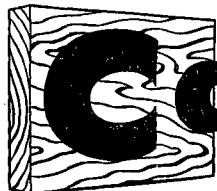
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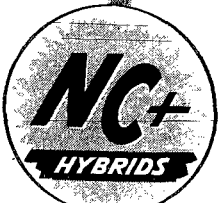
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
