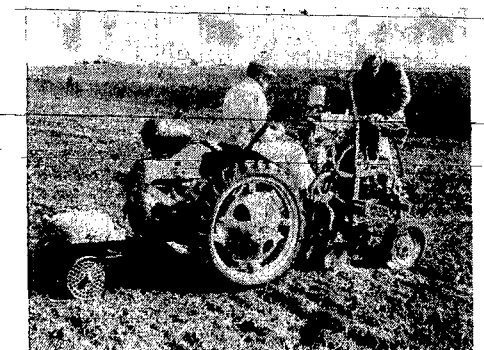

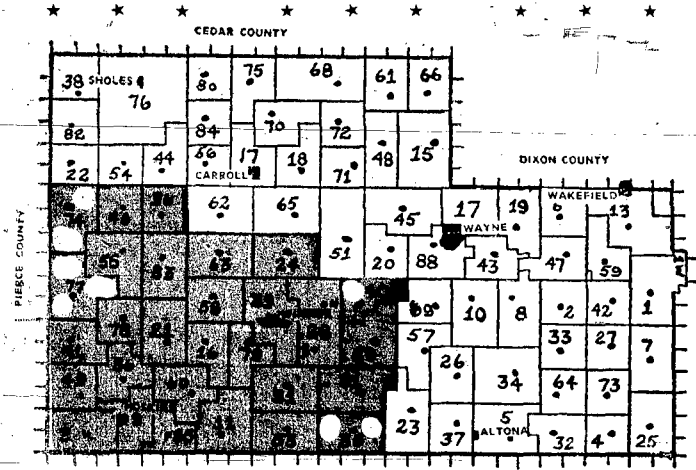

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### Apr. 17 is Earliest Date For Election

The Western Wayne county school reorganization plan was approved by members of the State Reorganization committee at a meeting Friday in Lincoln.

The plan was returned to the Wayne County Reorganization committee Wednesday with recommendations. Chairman Gordon Nuernberger, Wakefield, said his committee will have to make thorough study of the state plan's recommendations before announcing any decision.

The State committee recommendations were: 1. That more thought be given to public opinion of patrons of the fringe areas in the northwest and southwest sections of the proposed district.

2. Questioned the advisability of the proposal that several rural attendance units be operated for smaller children.

The State group praised the County committee highly for its efforts in trying to bring about better educational opportunities for children in the western portion of Wayne county.

The plan as submitted to the State committee involves 25 districts with a combined taxable valuation of slightly over \$6,490,000 in 1958.

It will be at least 30 days before any further action can be taken on the redistricting proposal. The County committee has 30 days to consider the recommendations of the State committee and make a decision on whether or not to accept them.

This means the earliest possible date for the election could be Apr. 17. The final date would be May 18. In such an election there would be two voting units, Winside and Hoskins would comprise one. The other would be made up of all the rural districts. Approval would require a majority of all electors voting in each unit.

Information developed by proponents of the Western area plan shows the districts have a total enrollment of 426 students for the present term. The total was estimated at 500 by 1960-61.

A budget estimate for operation during 1959-60 shows a tax levy of 24.50 mills. This includes 19.12 mills for general operation and 5.38 mills for retiring bonds used to construct a new junior-senior high school and purchasing school buses.

A breakdown of the contributions and the area chairmen is as follows: Wayne, Mrs. Otto Vernon, \$608.30; Winside, Mrs. Vernon Hill, \$73.79; Hoskins, Mrs. Ed Kollath, \$144; Carroll, Mrs. Everett Davis, \$61.23; and rural, Maryann Claus, \$792.72.

County Agent's Column University of Illinois Tests Show Corn Doesn't Wear Out Soil, Even in 83 Years

University of Illinois tests show that corn does not wear out soil, even in 83 years. A machinery investment of near \$15,000 is required to operate the average 240-acre farm. This, plus the fact that farm homes are now as well equipped with modern appliances as city homes, has forced many farmers to join the ranks of installment buyers.

Soil Doesn't Wear Out The famed University of Illinois has dispelled the idea that you can "corn" land to death. One field that grew corn continuously for 83 years got its first fertilizer (nitrogen, phosphate and potash) treatment three years ago. The yield this year, 130 bushels per acre. However, land can wash away. Adequate soil conservation measures are required on sloping lands.

Crop Pedigree The pedigree of crop seed is just as important as that of livestock. The idea that you can improve the chance of getting better stands and higher yields. Seed production has become a highly specialized business. Generally costs very little more than common seed. The discriminating seed buyer asks the variety name, where grown, whether certified, the germination, purity and whether treated for some diseases and insects. Germination and purity (weed free) are particularly important.

It is also helpful to know how many generations away the seed is from the foundation of registered seed. All seedling diseases of oats, covered and loose smut and scab diseases of barley can be controlled by seed-treatment.

The seed disease can carry over from year to year and usually increase if seed isn't treated. Infected fields of grain have poor stands with reduced yields. Chemical seed treatment may be made in several ways. Commonly used are: 1) liquid method; 2) dust or slurry treatment; and 3) formaldehyde sprays or dip. The dusts and slurry are usually mercury compounds. Since they are poisonous, neither dust nor the fumes should be inhaled. The chemicals should not come in contact with the skin and must not be used with food or feed. The mercury fungicides commonly used are Geresan M., Argo X, and Pura-seed, but others are available.
