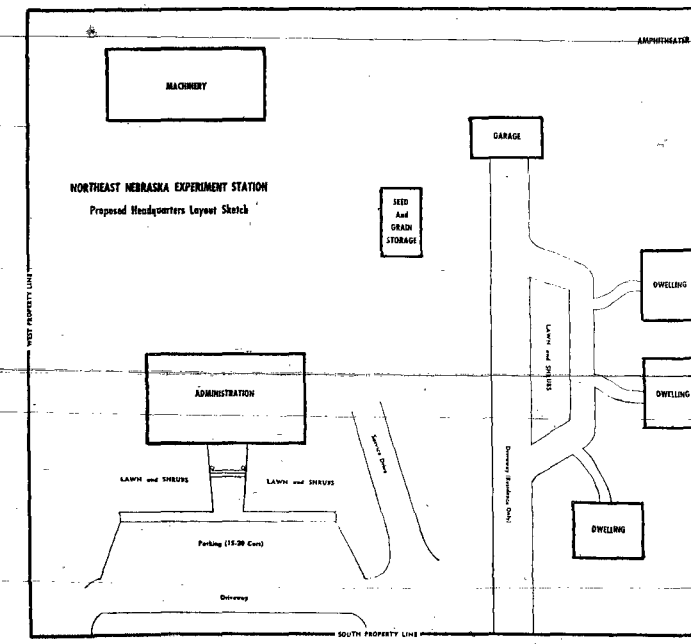

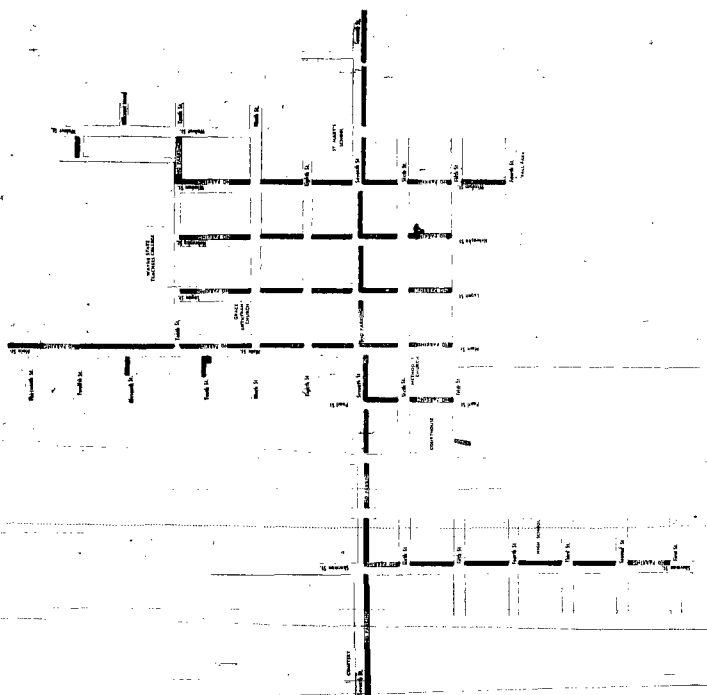
### Fremont Rites Held for Former Dixon School Head
