### Peoples Gas Asking Light Plant Raise

Three new ordinances regulating traffic and a proposed gas rate increase at the municipal light plant provide the main business at a Wayne city council meeting Tuesday night.

The council passed the three ordinances, but took the gas proposal under advisement for further study.

The ordinances will go into effect Apr. 30. The first forbids making U-turns with any vehicle at the intersections of Pearl Street and Main, Second, Third and Fourth streets, the intersection of Third and Logan and any Main street intersections.

Parking was banned at all times in four places. They are the south side of Fifth street from Main to Logan; north side of Tenth from Main to Logan; south side of Tenth 50 feet east from Main, and the north side of Second 75 feet east from Pearl.

Also included in the no parking ordinance were provisions for early morning clearing of Main street and side streets one block each way to allow the Street department to clean the streets.

Parking would be banned Fridays and Sundays from 3 to 6:30 a. m. on the east side of Main from Second to Fourth and both sides of Second and Third streets from Main to Logan.

The ordinance also bans parking on both sides of Main from First to Second streets from 3 to 5:30 a. m. Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays.

The third ordinance authorized erection of stop signs at the following locations: First and north approaches at South and Pearl intersections, all four approaches at Ninth and Winslow and the east and west approaches at Eleventh and Lincoln.

### Gas Company Manager Warren Ruskel appeared to ask the council for a six percent increase in the gas rate at the municipal light plant. He said the rate, but since 1956 would cost the city about \$1,400 per year. He said Peoples Gas had absorbed a 25 percent wholesale increase during the same eight-year period.

Park Chairman Gordon Shupe told the council that the swimming pool will be managed again this year by William Kern. His assistant will be John Bernthal.

A delegation from Grace Lutheran church appeared to request that the no parking ban on the east side of Logan street from Eighth to Tenth be lifted during the periods the church holds services. The council agreed to study possibilities for correcting the problem.

Plans to hire an engineer to develop plans for sanitary sewer improvement and development were discussed and referred to Mayor Willard Wilts for study and recommendation. Councilman Wayne Marsh pointed out that construction of new dormitory facilities at WSTC will necessitate remodeling the sewer system to accommodate the additions.

Bear licenses were granted to Harlan Farrens, Lester Hotfeldt and Waifred Carlson, Jr. after no objections were filed at hearings on their applications. Similar hearings are scheduled Apr. 14 on applications of Gerold Eulberg, Frank Woehler and Norris Weible.
