

School Board Asking Bids on New Building

Hoskins Residents Voicing Opposition to School Plan

A majority of the 100 persons attending a special meeting at Hoskins last Tuesday night voiced opposition to the proposed Western Area school reorganization proposal, spokesmen said this week.

The meeting was called by Vernon Behmer, Hoskins school board president, to discuss the proposed re-districting plan, scheduled for a vote in 27 western Wayne county districts April 28.

Hoskins banker Ed Kollath said a majority of the persons attending expressed the belief the plan will not offer Hoskins children any better education than they have at present.

In addition, he said it will turn the area into kindergarten-to-sixth grade school and "taxes will go up tremendously, no one being able to guess how high."

Supt. Lawrence Ratliff, Winside, explained the re-districting proposal. He said the \$134,000 budget published earlier in The Wayne Herald was for the 1959-60 school term only. He also said that the school unit would be operated in Hoskins for the 1959-60 term. After that the board of the new district, if created, would decide which grades would be taught at Hoskins.

Representatives of District 3 expressed concern that their district was included in the plan. Spokesman Fred Brumels said the district was left in the plan despite the fact district patrons voted 11-4 not to be included.

H. Brauer, Stuart, president of the Nebraska School Improvement association, told the group: "Let us be realistic about our school problems and quit dreaming." He added that in the three years he had been working with the re-districting problem, "in no instance has it proved to be what people were led to believe it would be."

He said that in all places where re-districting was passed, the district with 195 mill levy proposed by Winside and after the second year "the taxes climbed every year, and it looked like the sky was the limit."

In every case, he said, the small town was back up to the high tax levy and in addition the rural areas were carried right along. He said the \$134,000 budget as proposed by Winside could not be an absolute guarantee, figure as "it is humanly impossible to tell at this time what unexpected expenses would arise in the way of operating a new school."

Hoskins has no high school. There are 11 eligible students this year, six go to Winside and five to Norfolk.

Some Hoskins residents favor the re-districting plan. Herman Opper, implement dealer and member of the County Reorganization committee which drafted the plan, said "We'll definitely lose our high schools, but it will mean better education."

He said re-districting probably will raise taxes in rural districts, but taxes in Winside and Hoskins would be lower or about the same. Richard Miller, a farmer and also a committee member, agreed with Opper's views.

ASC Chairman Urges Prompt Filing of '58 Wool Applications

ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell today urged Wayne county wool growers who marketed their clip between Apr. 1, 1958 and Mar. 31, 1959 to be prompt in filing applications for payment under the national wool program.

Deadline for applications is Apr. 30. The payment rate will be announced as soon as possible after that date.

Growers can speed up the payment program by prompt filing of applications, Sundell pointed out. He explained the information contained in the applications is needed by the USDA in computing average wool price received by growers during the 1958 marketing year.

That price must be calculated before the rate of payment to growers can be determined.

Under the wool program, payments are made to growers as an incentive to increase wool production. The payment rate is the percentage necessary to bring the national average price received by growers for wool up to 62 cents a pound.

The percentage method of payment encourages a good job of marketing, since the grower who receives the highest price for his wool also receives the largest payment.

Anderson New Carroll Village Board Member

Norman Anderson is the newest member of the Carroll village board of trustees. He ran third among four candidates for three board posts in Tuesday's village election.

Anderson, who received 36 votes, will succeed Claude Bailey, who did not seek re-election. Incumbents re-elected and the votes they received were Maurice Hansen, 51, and E. L. Pearson, 41. The fourth candidate, William Swanson, received 31 votes.

Dean Pierson, Wayne, received two votes for the village board when his name was written in on the wrong ballot. He received 35 votes for a Wayne school board post in a write-in campaign at Wayne.

Only 133 Voters Cast Ballots in Election Tuesday

All incumbents were returned to office in Wayne's annual city election Tuesday. The turnout at the polls was the smallest since 1953. Only 133 ballots were cast. The 1953 total was 113.

William Pfeil, Everett Rees and Dr. W. A. Koerber were returned to seats on the city council. All were unopposed. Pfeil and Rees received all of the votes cast in the First and Second wards, respectively. Eight write-in ballots were cast for councilman in the third ward.

Lynn Robert Carroll farmer, is a new member of the Wayne school board. He received the largest total, 163, in the school election. Al Kern, Wayne, was also returned to the board for another three-year term. He received 136 votes.

A write-in campaign for Dean Pierson, Wayne, as a school board member was apparent in the balloting. He received 35 votes. Two other votes for him were voided at Carroll when his name was written in for village trustee rather than school board.

Others who received write-in votes for the school board were Bob Johnson, Carroll; Perry Johnson, Carroll, 1, and Dr. James Brown, Wayne. Dr. Brown also received a write-in vote for Third ward councilman. Single votes were also received by Harold Ingalls, Alfred Kopin and Rev. S. K. de Fresse, all P. O. boxes.

'57 Grain Sorghum May Be Resealed

Farm-stored 1957-crop grain sorghum now under price support loans in Wayne county may be kept in farm storage for another year, ASC Chairman Carl Sundell announced today.

Under the resale program farmers earn storage payments for the time the grain is under resale. The storage payment on grain sorghums is 30 cents per hundredweight for a full year's storage.

Farmers who resell the grain at this time will receive the storage payment for last year's resale period and will begin to earn the payment for the new loan period.

Sundell urges farmers who wish to resell their grain sorghums to make application to the county ASC office at once. While loans matured Mar. 31, a farmer may resell up until the time he is notified to deliver his grain sorghums in settlement of his loan.

Wisconsin Man Named New Wayne State Grid Mentor

Gwynn Christensen, a Wisconsin high school coach and former University of Wisconsin football player, will be the new football mentor at WSTC. He will come to Wayne in August, succeeding Russell Young, who resigned to resume graduate study.

Christensen, 33, will also take over Young's duties as baseball coach and physical education and health instructor. President W. F. Brandenburg announced Wednesday.

Christensen currently is head football coach at Muskego high school, a Milwaukee suburb. His 1958 team won the Bravaland conference title with a 7-1 record. Over a five-year span his teams compiled a 33-7-1 mark.

The new coach played three years of varsity football at Wisconsin. He was a starting right halfback as a senior in 1949 and played in the 1950 senior bowl game. After graduation he played semi-pro baseball with the Chippewa Marines and Wausau Muskies. He received a master's degree in physical education from Wisconsin last summer.

Christensen is married and has one daughter, 5.

Apr. 30 Set For Opening Of Proposals

Wayne's school board will open bids for construction of the new elementary school and alterations on the present building Apr. 30.

Board President Mrs. Don Wightman said Wednesday the bids will be opened at the high school study hall. The board is asking a lump sum proposal for the complete job, including construction, mechanical and electrical work for the new building and remodeling of the present building.

Wayne district voters approved a \$424,000 bond issue to finance the construction and remodeling in December.

At their Monday night meeting the board acted on teacher contracts, approved bills totaling \$7,580.96, set the 1959-60 school year and heard teachers' committee recommendations on salary schedules and professional growth plan.

J. William Mullydyk's resignation was accepted and extension of time until Apr. 17 for signing contracts was granted to Mildred Agler and Earl Green. Mullydyk, speech and debate instructor, resigned to accept an assistantship at the University of Nebraska. Miss Agler teaches seventh grade. Green is band and orchestra instructor.

Bills allowed included \$3,180 to Wachs-Barsky, fiscal agents for the bond issue, and \$2,550 to Martin Ringer for additional lots purchased for the site of the new school. Both amounts came from the bond issue.

The committee on salary schedules and professional growth set up last month as an outcome of an effort to require teachers to improve their professional standards.

The tentative proposal made by the committee set up a pay schedule based on amount of college credits each teacher has, coupled with the number of years experience. Salary proposals range from \$3,100 per year for a teacher with 60 hours credit and no experience to \$6,250 for a teacher with a master's degree plus 18 additional hours.

Points would be given each teacher under the professional growth plan for college credits earned, special classes or workshops, membership in professional educational organizations and extra committee work in school.

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Term of the 1959-60 school year will be Aug. 31 - May 26 with a week's Christmas vacation. Another plan considered would have extended the term a week with an added week of Christmas vacation.

An orientation day for next fall's freshmen was approved after Supt. E. W. Willert proposed the plan. Willert said about 80 students will be entering ninth grade next fall, 40 of whom will be from rural districts. Willert set May 7 for the program.

C. N. Olson Buys Fanske Jewelry

C. N. Olson, Wayne Photo owner, this week announced purchase of the Fanske Jewelry store on Wayne's Main street. He will take possession of the store Wednesday.

In making the announcement, Olson said he will start construction of a new 25x75-foot building on the Fanske tract about May 1. He will operate the jewelry store and his photo store in the new building.

Olson purchased the store from the estate of the late Louis A. Fanske, who operated it from 1908 until his death last month. The new owner has operated his photo studio here 21 years.

Tax Reform Policies Problem For Study by State Senators

Lincoln—The Legislature is trying to solve the problem of whether it is going too fast along the tax reform road. And, if this is so, what should it do about it? Those items have been aired by the lawmakers and undoubtedly will again be discussed during the session in progress.

So far the only major controversial legislation passed by the senators concerns reformation of tax laws. Basically, they give more authority to the tax commissioner and otherwise tighten tax laws.

Debate is becoming more heated on the tax question and some senators say this is the result of the pressure being applied by interests who will be affected by stiff statutes passed earlier in the session.

Other lawmakers contend the senate is hurrying too fast with tax bills and can do great harm this way.

The tax reform program that has emerged into law so far has been that resulting from the legislative council tax study committee.

This was headed by Sen. Jerry Carpenter, Scottsbluff, who generally is one-man hearings.

Carpenter is the pushing force behind the tax bills and was instrumental in drawing them up, although this was done at a conference of interested officials.

Gov. Ralph G. Brooks also said he has reappointed C. V. Price as chief of the state resources division, a job Price has held since 1950.

The post pays \$8,400 per year. Brooks said he made the appointment in January and thought he had announced it, but apparently had overlooked the matter during the busy days following his inauguration.

Herrington said that there is some concern among businessmen that laws are getting so tough they may have to report their intangible property 100 percent of value while large out-of-state corporations could get by with a lesser figure.

What is needed, Herrington said, is a bill or an amendment requiring out-of-state firms doing business in Nebraska to keep records readily accessible in Nebraska for inspection by county assessors.

Brooks said he nearly vetoed LBR levying a \$3.50 per person head tax on all Nebraskans between 21 and 60 years old. The reason, Brooks said, was that this law takes about \$430,000 from the

state yearly from the current head tax and gives it to local government. Herrington also said the new law did not abolish the poll tax as lawmakers apparently intended.

These are the statements that irked Carpenter. He said the views should have been presented to the Legislature instead of in the newspapers. But Herrington said he only answers questions when they are asked by senators and no one asked him. Earlier he had been criticized by Sen. Michael Russillo, Omaha, for divulging information which Herrington said he was required to give out since it was public.

The Legislature this session passed a rule that states no executive officials can testify at public hearings on bills unless asked by the committee involved or a senator.

New Officials

Frank Golden, Lincoln, a former U.S. marshal, is the new chief of the state cigar tax division in the Agricultural department. He succeeds H. L. Wichman, retiring after nine years as head of the division.

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County Agent's Column

Hog Producers Report Severe Losses in Young Pigs from Diarrhea and Vomiting

Hog producers over Nebraska are reporting severe losses in young pigs from diarrhea and vomiting, according to Dr. E. Crosby Howe, extension animal hygienist at the University of Nebraska.

The cause is a virus disease called transmissible gastro-enteritis, commonly referred to as "TGE".

It is a highly contagious disease that affects hogs of all ages. However, it is characterized by 100 percent mortality in pigs three to 10 days old. Unfortunately there is no effective control except sanitation and avoiding introduction of hogs to the herd.

Dr. Howe suggests the following practices for preventing the disease:

- 1. Do not add more gilts or other swine to the herd near farrowing time. Sows or gilts that go through an outbreak and recover two weeks or more before they farrow, frequently produce litters that have little or no trouble with the disease.
2. Persons handling hogs should change clothing and wear clean, disinfected boots when caring for the breeding herd. This practice is particularly important when returning to the farm after visiting another farm, sale or meeting place of farmers.
3. Keep the dog at home. In addition, dogs should be kept away from the hog lot.
4. Do not allow outside persons to enter the hog lot without taking precautions of changing clothes and footwear.
5. Do not allow trucks or other vehicles to enter the hog lot.
New Hybrid Corn Variety
A new variety of hybrid corn, Nebraska 603, that combines high yields, strong stalk and ear quality has been announced by the University of Nebraska Agricultural Experiment station.

State Agriculture Director Pearle Finigan announced that Mrs. Lillian Kozisek, David City, is a new state restaurant inspector, replacing John H. White, Silver Creek. Finigan said Mrs. Kozisek is the second woman inspector in the department, the only other being Mrs. Lois Slater, Omaha, who handles the Omaha region.

Bill Introduced

A bill has been introduced in the Legislature designed to allow Nebraska to negotiate a water compact with Kansas involving the Big Blue river and its tributaries. Kansas already has authority to negotiate a compact, according to Dan Jones, state water resources chief. A compact would concern usage of the water by the two states.

Liquor Fight

There will be a strong fight on the floor of the Legislature over a bill to authorize retail price fixing in the liquor business. The Legislature's banking, commerce and insurance committee, by a 4-2 vote, reported such a measure to the floor for debate. Under the proposal, LB429, wholesalers could set minimum retail prices on liquor and beer.

Proponents of the measure at a public hearing said the bill would keep the small retailer from being run out of business by price cutters. Main opposition is expected to be led by Sen. Carpenter, himself a liquor dealer.

NEBRASKA 603 probably is best adapted to east central Nebraska and the Platte Valley," reports Dr. John Lonnquist, professor of agronomy at the College of Agriculture. "The new variety matures at mid-season and probably is too early for southeast Nebraska and too late in the north," the agronomist points out.

Nebraska 603 has been tested the past four years in field trials and has averaged around 132 bushels per acre. The ears are short and thick, well adapted to mechanical picking.

Another attribute of the new hybrid is good stalk quality. The plants grow to medium height. Dr. Lonnquist said the characteristics of Nebraska 603 combine to make it a most attractive variety.

Seed of the new hybrid was released this year. Corn producers interested in obtaining seed may contact county agents or the Foundation Seed division, College of Agriculture, Lincoln.

Farm News and Views... Continued Improvement in Hog Prices is Seen by Economist Through April, May

HOG PRICES will continue to improve through April and May, says an agricultural service economist. You'll be able to increase profits this month by extending your hog finishing program to take advantage of advancing prices and low discounts. As for feeder pigs, the economist suggests you consider buying them only if reasonably priced and if you have them ready by July.

OFFSET APPLICATION of starter fertilizer will benefit both corn and soybeans. Researchers have found that by placing the starter fertilizer about 1 1/2 inches to the side and 1/2 to two inches down from the seed, germination will be improved and the plants will be better able to use the fertilizer. Most new planters can be purchased with this type of fertilizer attachment. You can buy kits for converting the split-boot applicator of your old planter.
