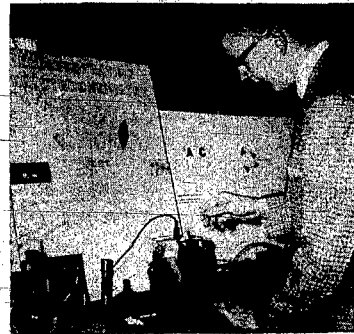


# Postpone Western Area Redistricting Vote

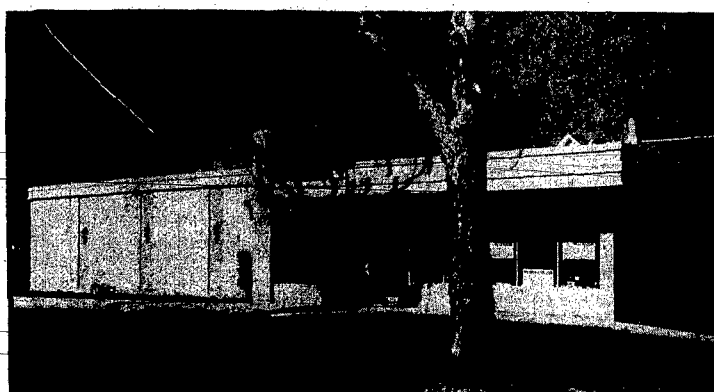

## Benthacks Moving into New Clinic Building



NEARING COMPLETION this week is the new Benthack clinic located just west of the Wayne postoffice. The clinic will be occupied by Drs. Walter and Robert Benthack, who are expected to move into the building this week. The city of Wayne will take over operation of the local hospital when Benthacks move out. The new clinic measures 56 by 69 feet. The structure, built by Karl Orte and sons, Wayne, includes six examining rooms, two treatment rooms, laboratory, pharmacy, minor surgery, X-ray and pediatrics rooms, three private offices and a reception room. Lounges for the doctors and employees are located in the basement.

if by magic when their sentinels gave a signal of threatening danger. Even in the early days, tourists went out to see Dog Town. Then, as if sensing the intrusion of outsiders, the prairie dogs vanished, almost overnight. The land called Dog Town is now the Wayne golf course.

Living costs were no problem in these early days. Milk sold for five cents a quart. The Sewell children sold dressed chickens at 50 cents each. Mrs. Sewell made and sold butter pats and glasses of grated horseradish. Mr. Cutler made furniture from black walnut lumber he had purchased in Iowa.

Early settlers not only had to guard against wolves which roamed the prairies, but prairie fires as well. Many of the early pioneers plowed firelines around their homesteads for protection. Old oaken buckets were familiar sights in those days, as were deep wells from which one could draw clear, cool water. There were severe windstorms, tornados and cattle stampedes. Worst of all was the blizzard of Jan. 12, 1888. Miss Sewell recalls her grandfather was janitor of the little school she attended. When the blizzard struck, he led her from the schoolhouse to his home across the road by following the barbed wire fence.

What an occasion when the first merry-go-round came to Wayne. It was located where the city hall is now. And there are those who remember when the Savidge carnival tent show's seats came down during a windstorm.

**Horse Owners Indignant**  
The first automobile, driven by Dr. H. G. Loisinger, which started terror in the hearts of the community at 15 miles an hour. Many runaways were reported and horse owners held an indignation meeting to organize against the menace. A law evolved requiring a car driver to stop and shut off his engine when seeing a horse and lead the horse by the car if necessary.

The first school building in Wayne was built just across the road east from the Sewell land. Miss Sewell recalls there were just 20 other schools in the county at that time. There are now over 80. Early attempts to found colleges were made at Fremont, Neligh, Plainview and Wayne. In the summers of 1889 and 1890, James Pile, a teacher at the Fremont Normal, came to Wayne as instructor at teacher's institutes. He returned in 1891 and conducted school in a farm building located where the Central Meat market now stands.

The first new building on the hill was completed that fall and the school was opened as Nebraska Normal college in November. From this beginning came WSTC. Miss Sewell and her older sister attended this school.

Miss Sewell's father helped to build both the old and new Methodist churches here. She recalls camp meetings were well attended and it was at them that the early settlers learned about and became acquainted with their neighbors.

Any early settlers will recall the first Fourth of July celebration. It also brought the first major fire. A drunken man was arrested and, for lack of a jail, was shackled to a ring bolt in the floor of the judge's office. The prisoner set fire to the courthouse and almost lost his life. The courthouse, located where the Witse chapel now stands, was burned to the ground.

The second major fire in Wayne occurred on Thanksgiving night, 1891. It destroyed six frame buildings in the half block on Main street south from the present Firestone store. It was thought to have started from an untended cook stove.

And so the old Sewell farm home vanishes and the new grade school will take its place. Along with the Sewell home will go some of the history of the community. It is gone, but not forgotten. As Miss Sewell philosophically states, "The old must make way for the new." Progress in the future should mean better opportunity for the children of the early settlers.

Dear Sir: We understand that an invitation was extended to a group of people to take an all-expense paid trip to Henderson to see their beautiful schoolhouse. We hope they viewed this building with some of the following pertinent facts in mind.

First, we appreciate the fact that Henderson has a beautiful building, and we hope that all that accepted the invitation had a nice trip. At the time that they were touring this beautiful building we hope that they viewed it with the thoughts of how much tax money it will take us to duplicate, or even try to duplicate this type of building.

Remember they built this structure at least six years ago and we all know that construction costs have gone up considerably since then. Nevertheless they started in 1952 with a 13 1/2 levy and are presently paying 30.46 mills. They have nine high school teachers and 140 high school pupils, 12 elementary teachers and 383 pupils, more than Winside can ever hope to have.

I hope they realized that many farms have an irrigation well, which is a stabilizing influence in their financial set up, assuring them of a good crop each year. One farmer who had a 14-mile school levy before now pays 30.46 mills, a difference of 16.48 mills.

The people of Hoskins feel that they have a very good building here, yet look what has happened to their high school! It is not the beautiful building alone that assures one of a good education. We think we should be more concerned as to whether we will be able to afford the high quality teachers that will be necessary to maintain a good school.

We know of several beautiful buildings in Iowa that are standing idle because of high operating costs and too few students. They have re-consolidated with larger districts, but are still paying taxes on the empty buildings.

We believe in reorganization if it can be done without endangering the financial status of the

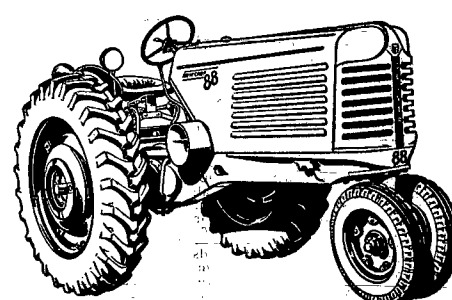



# Labor-Management Tiff Now In Open in State Unicameral

Lincoln—The labor-management fight has broken out into the open in the Nebraska Legislature. The scrapping revolved around basically the measure to outlaw secondary boycotts until Gov. Ralph G. Brooks stepped into the picture. Brooks introduced a measure calling for a State Labor Relations Act governing both employe and management situations.

Labor and management has been fighting strength on several bills of this importance over all these past years. Most of the primary maneuvering has been the right to join or refuse to join labor organizations without punishment by management or by labor unions. Also, the chief executive commented, it would define "fair" practices by both management and labor.

A commissioner of elections would supervise and administer elections involving union problems. Said the governor: "This proposal also seeks to substitute orderly procedure for economic combat and provides that an employer and a union can agree to submit to arbitration any issue which is a proper subject of collective bargaining."

There is no question but what the Brooks proposal will provoke some heated discussion among state senators. Brooks said all persons involved in a State Labor Relations Act had publicly stated a need for it, but that a Legislative Council committee studying the problem could not come up with a proposal that it felt would be fair to everyone.

The governor said he introduced the legislation since both management and labor publicly had expressed a need for the law.

**Legislature Sessions**

The Legislature should swing into its spring session in about two weeks. This will start taking a healthy bite out of the heavy load of bills backed up awaiting first debate.

Thirty-one measures were slated for public hearing this week. Some committees have completed their work. The Legislature's budget committee expects to wind up its calculations in about two weeks.

Roughly, the Nebraska Legislature is half through the session. Most observers do not hesitate to say it will be the last week in June before the lawmakers can go home. Of the first 708 bills introduced, 47 have been killed in committee.

or on the floor, as against 116 for the same period two years ago when there were only 615 bills introduced. This, however, was the record until the current session.

Veteran observers say the reason for so many more bills each year is that annually lawmakers are representing more people than they did 10 years ago and also that government is becoming more complicated.

**Harr Resigns**

State Aeronautics Director Rollie Harr's resignation caused considerable fussing. He quit his \$10,200 per year job with a blast at Gov. Ralph G. Brooks, stating that the governor's "indecision" in announcing who would be aeronautics director "hurt" the department.

The governor was told in a letter from Harr that the aeronautics chief could not obtain and keep qualified personnel because he did not know "from day to day" whether he was in or out of office.

Harr also charged Brooks had asked him to fire Asst. Atty. Gen. Rush-Clarke of North Platte, who with Harr, helped bring Nebraska into national prominence in the local airline service picture.

"If the situation continues much longer," Harr warned, "the state will certainly lose some of the air-line service which has been granted it on a trial basis."

Brooks said he has assured members of the aviation industry that Harr's replacement would be made "only in the interest of advancing aviation in Nebraska," and denied he asked Harr to remove Clarke. Harr was appointed two years ago by former GOP governor Victor Anderson.

A bill was recommended for introduction to remove the aeronautics department from the jurisdiction of the governor. The bill had been prepared long before the Harr resignation, however. Under the proposal, the aeronautics commission would appoint the air chief and set his salary.

**Budget Matters**

Gov. Ralph G. Brooks notified the Legislature in a personal appearance that he will veto any spending bills that require general fund tax money above his recommendation.

A short time later, the governor announced he had increased his recommendation for the University of Nebraska. Brooks originally suggested a \$2 million tax fund hike for the school, but he has raised this to \$4 million. Brooks said additional information was presented to him which showed the need for the change. Sen. Otto Liebers, chairman of the Legislature's budget committee, said he thinks the governor had misunderstood that cash funds were available to meet salary problems at the University.

County Agent's Column . . . **Price Tag Not Always Best Way to Judge Feed's Value for Production**

The price tag on a bag of feed may not be the best way to judge the value of the feed for egg production.

That's the conclusion drawn from research at one of the agricultural experiment stations. In these tests, a mash that cost only \$3 per hundred pounds maintained egg production just as well as a more potent ration that cost \$4 per hundred pounds.

Thus, the feed cost of producing eggs was only 11.6 cents a dozen compared to 13.2 cents for the more expensive diet.

On a ration extremely low in protein and energy, costing only \$2.50 per hundred pounds, the researchers found that more than five pounds were needed to produce a dozen eggs, compared to less than four pounds of the \$3 feed, which means that the cost of feed was higher when the low energy ration was used. The studies further showed that egg production, egg size, fertility, and hatchability could be maintained by all the tested rations.

"Nebraskans would be vitally interested in this type of comparison in view of today's cost-price squeeze on the egg producer," points out M. L. Vaughn, University of Nebraska extension poultryman.

**Lawn Diseases**

Fungi cause most of the common diseases of lawns in Nebraska. These organisms produce spores that spread by wind, water, mowers and numerous other ways. The fungus seeds need moisture to cause infection. Fungus diseases of lawns are, therefore, most common and harmful during wet humid seasons, although they can be started easily by too frequent watering during dry summer months.

These conclusions and other information are found in Extension Circular 58-1818 "Control of Lawn Diseases in Nebraska," recently published by the Nebraska Agricultural Extension Service.

**Urge Caution in Grazing**

Farmers and dairymen tempted to turn their cows out on pasture as soon as the first green grass appears are urged to slow. Caution is especially important in the case of newly established pastures.

Cattle should be kept completely off newly-established pastures until later in the season for best results. If moisture continues to be plentiful, it may even be necessary to keep cattle off the well-established pastures to prevent excessive trampling.

Permanent pastures such as bromes or bromes and alfalfa are well suited for grazing before May 1. Pastures made up of tall grasses and legumes should not be grazed until the growth is eight to 12 inches high.

Since early spring pastures are watery and quite laxative, it is desirable to have dry roughage available to the cattle. This dry roughage may be fed on the pasture or it may simply be made available to the cattle each day before they go to pasture. Generally, cattle will consume the more roughage if they can eat it along with the pasture.

This is the time of year to set up a definite system of pasture rotation and follow it throughout the season.
